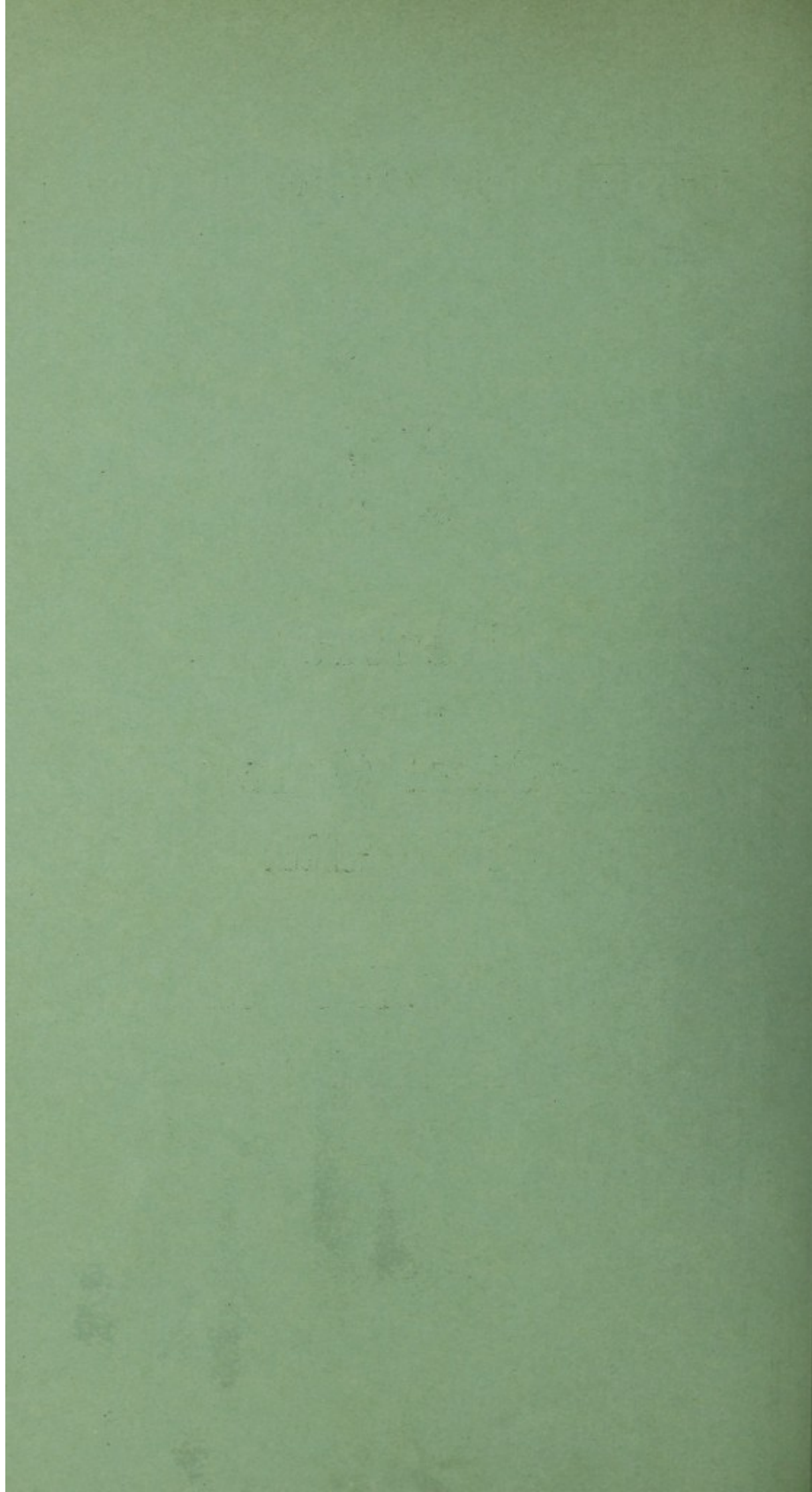

The Registrar General's figures for the year indicate a mid year population of 230 compared with 225 in 1954. There were 53 births in 1955 compared with 51 in 1954. The adjusted death rate was 11.5 per thousand population compared with 11.3 in 1954. The adjusted death rate of 11.5 per thousand population is slightly above the national death rate of 11.3 per thousand population. There were 26 deaths of children under one year of age.

On infectious diseases 11 cases occurred during May, June and July - 124 cases in 1954. 105 were children under fifteen years of age.

I have pleasure in presenting the Annual Report for 1965.

The Registrar General's figures for the year indicate a mid year population of 4,830, an increase of 250 compared with last year.

During the year there were 63 births and 49 deaths, compared with 56 births and 81 deaths last year. The adjusted birth rate for the District of 16.04 compares with the national birth rate of 18.0 per thousand population and an adjusted death rate of 8.21 compares with a national death rate of 11.5 per thousand population. There were no deaths of children under one year of age.

On infectious diseases an outbreak of measles occurred during May, June and July - 124 cases being notified. All but one were children under fifteen years of age.

The Town's water supply continued as in previous years and twelve samples submitted for bacteriological examination all proved satisfactory. On sewage disposal, schemes are still required for a few properties in the District, but attention was given during the year to the conversion of the four pail closets remaining in the Town.

142 new dwellings were completed during the year by private enterprise and two by the Council. Much private development has taken place during the last three years - a total of 364 houses being built and this, no doubt, is the principal factor in the increase in the Town's population.

Domestic Help

Home Help service which is rendered in the District is administered at County Hall, Beverley, and all applications for the service are dealt with by the Home Help Organisation (telephone number 01753 22121).

LOCAL EDUCATION AUTHORITY - SCHOOL HEALTH SERVICE

Routine medical inspections are carried out of all children attending Local Education Authority schools in the district. Head inspections of children in the primary schools is undertaken by the school nurse at the beginning of each term.

Immunisation against diphtheria, tetanus and poliomyelitis and B.C.G. Vaccination is made available to children in school.

OTHER LOCAL AUTHORITY SERVICES

Buckrose Health Division Co-ordinating Committee

Once every two or three months a co-ordinating Committee, under the aegis of the County Council, meets in Bridlington to co-ordinate the work of officers in the district who are concerned with the welfare of children. The Primary objects of the Committee are the prevention of cruelty to children in their own homes and the prevention of break-up of families.

On the Committee are representatives of the County Children's Department, the County Health Department, the School Welfare Department, the County Welfare Department, the Housing Managers of the District Councils, the National Assistance Board, the National Society for the prevention of Cruelty to Children, the Women's Voluntary Service, Probation Officers, and a Marriage Guidance Counsellor. Representatives of other organisations are co-opted from time to time as the need arises. Your Medical Officer of Health in his capacity as Divisional Medical Officer takes the Chair of the Committee.

PUBLIC HEALTH LABORATORY

Specimens for bacteriological examination are sent to the Public Health Laboratory of the Medical Research Council at Hull.

VOLUNTARY ORGANISATIONS

Women's Voluntary Service

The W.V.S. undertakes the sale of welfare foods for infants at the Conference Hall each Friday 9.30 a.m. to 11.30 a.m. and also at each infant welfare clinic.

They also administer a Meals on Wheels service, a Chiropody service, a Darby and Joan Club and at 19 Queen Street an Old Persons Centre.

NATIONAL SOCIETY FOR THE PREVENTION OF CRUELTY TO CHILDREN

Filey lies within the North East Yorkshire Branch of the National Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children and cases requiring the services of the Society are visited by Inspector White working from Scarborough. Inspector White's work is much appreciated by those of us in Filey concerned with child welfare.

LOCAL EDUCATION AUTHORITY - SCHOOL HEALTH SERVICE

Routine medical inspections are carried out of all children attending local education authority schools in the district. Head inspections of children in the primary schools is undertaken by the school nurse at the beginning of each term.

Immunisation against diphtheria, tetanus and poliomyelitis and B.C.G. Vaccination is made available to children in school.

OTHER LOCAL AUTHORITY SERVICES

Women's Health Division Co-ordinating Committee

Once every two or three months a co-ordinating Committee, under the chair of the County Council, meets in Maidstone to co-ordinate the work of officers in the district who are concerned with the welfare of children. The primary objects of the Committee are the prevention of cruelty to children in their own homes and the prevention of child abuse in families.

On the Committee are representatives of the County Council's Department, the County Health Department, the Labour Welfare Department, the County Welfare Department, the Housing Department, the District Council, the National Assistance Board, the National Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children, the Women's Voluntary Service, Probation Officers, and a Nursing Guidance Counsellor. Representatives of other organisations are co-opted from time to time as the need arises. The National Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children takes the chair of the Committee, especially as District Medical Officer.

PHYSIC HEALTH LABORATORY

Specimens for bacteriological examination are sent to the Public Health Laboratory at the Medical Research Council at Hill.

WOMAN'S VOLUNTARY SERVICE

The W.V.S. undertakes the sale of welfare foods for infants at the Conference Hall each Friday 9.30 a.m. to 11.30 a.m. and also at each infant welfare clinic.

They also administer a Malaria blood test service, a Physiotherapy service, a Nursing and Youth Club and at 15 Queen Street an Old Persons Centre.

NATIONAL SOCIETY FOR THE PREVENTION OF CRUELTY TO CHILDREN

They have within the North East Kent District Branch of the National Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children and cases regarding the welfare of children are visited by Inspector White, working from headquarters. Inspector White's work is much appreciated by those of us in this concerned with child welfare.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA

GENERAL

There has been considerable building activity during the year, and 142 new dwellings have been completed principally on the Grange Farm estate where there is now a total of 294 bungalows, and also on the estate adjoining Scarborough Road where 45 house and bungalow dwellings were completed.

In addition to the above mentioned properties which were built by private enterprise, two new Council Old Persons bungalows were occupied during the year and two more are nearing completion.

Two tenants still remain in the area encompassed within the Providence Place Re-Development Scheme and it is hoped that a start can be made in the foreseeable future on this Scheme which will be a great help in solving the housing problem.

The additional properties have added to the work of the Refuse Collecting teams and a certain amount of re-organisation has been necessary. The amount and bulk of refuse per household continues to rise and the full effect of this coupled with the shorter working week will be felt in the summer when the population is greatly increased and the holiday and caravan camps are open.

There has been little respite to the quota of new legislation during the year, and reports submitted under the Railway, Offices and Shops Act will no doubt result in set standards being applied by the responsible Ministry. This particularly refers to lighting standards.

FOOD HYGIENE AND SUPERVISION OF PREMISES

There are 131 food premises in the district, including catering establishments, boarding houses, retail shops, licensed premises, bakehouses and stores. Conditions were generally satisfactory and in the odd cases where conditions were not up to standard, informal action was sufficient to bring about an improvement.

PRESERVED FOOD - REGISTERED PREMISES

8 premises are registered in the district, 8 inspections were made and the standard was found to be satisfactory.

THE ICE CREAM (HEAT TREATMENT ETC) REGULATIONS.

43 premises are registered under the Food and Drugs Act, for the sale of Ice Cream. At the majority pre-packed Ice Cream is sold from freezing cabinets but there is a gradual increase in the use of "Soft" Ice Cream machines. One Establishment manufactures its own Ice Cream using heat treatment in accordance with the regulations. Regular visits have to be paid to the premises employing seasonal staff particularly where Soft Ice Cream is being sold. Fifteen samples of Ice Cream were submitted to the Public Analyst with the following results.

MILK SUPPLIES

The Registration of Milk Dealers and Producers is now carried out by the County Authorities and we are informed of any additions to, or deletions from the list. Nine samples of Milk were submitted to the Public Analyst and all proved to be satisfactory.

SLAUGHTERHOUSES

There are two licensed slaughterhouses in the district serving the needs of two local butchers. One is limited to the slaughter of sheep and pigs only. Both premises have been conducted in a satisfactory manner throughout the year and comply with the Slaughterhouses Act 1958.

MEAT INSPECTION

All meat slaughtered at the slaughterhouses has been inspected and all carcasses stamped in accordance with the Meat Inspection Regulations 1963. The quality of the animals slaughtered has been consistently good.

The rest of the meat sold within the district is principally slaughtered at either Driffield or the Public Abbatoir at Seamer.

MILK SUPPLIES

The Regulation of Milk Dealers and Producers is now carried out by the County Authorities and we are informed at any additions to, or deletions from the list. There is no dairy within the district and all inspections were made which revealed a high standard of cleanliness and efficiency. Some samples of Milk were submitted to the Public Analyst and all proved to be satisfactory.

REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL

Throughout the main part of the year two side loading freighters and six men are employed on the collection of both household and trade refuse, but during the summer period an additional freighter with two men augments the regular team and is employed mainly on holiday camp collection, but also assists in collecting the town refuse. Very few complaints have been received in connection with this service, and in comparison with many towns and districts who have no seasonal increase in refuse, but experience great difficulty in recruiting labour, we can count ourselves fortunate.

One man and an excavator are employed almost full time at the tip, where controlled tipping is the method of refuse disposal. The tip has been well controlled in spite of the fact that the changing character of the refuse makes it increasingly difficult to obtain sufficient covering material. Periodic dusting with insecticide has reduced any nuisance from flies and other insects.
