Mr. Chairman, Lady and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting the Annual Report for 1966.

The Registrar General's figures for the year indicate a mid year population of 5,060 an increase of 230 compared with last year.

During the year there were 87 births and 78 deaths compared with 63 births and 49 deaths last year. The adjusted birth rate of the District of 23.38 compares favourably with the national birth rate of 17.7 per thousand population and the adjusted death rate of 10.95 also compares favourably with the national death rate of 11.7 per thousand population. There were no deaths of infants under one year of age.

On infectious diseases 82 cases of measles and 23 cases of whooping cough were notified during the year.

The Town's water supply continued as in previous years and 20 samples submitted for bacteriological examination all proved satisfactory. Sewage disposal also continued as previously, and during the year the conversion of 4 earth closets to the water carriage system cleared the last of these to be in use in the town.

On housing a further 129 new dwellings have been built by private enterprise making a total of 493 such houses being built during the last four years. Two new dwellings were built by the Council during 1966.

In presenting this report may I express my thanks to the staff of the Department for their work and help during the year, and also to the Chairman and Members of the Health Committee for their constant interest and support.

Mr. Chairman, Lady and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting the Annual Report for 1956.

The Registrar General's figures for the year indicate a mid year population of 7,000, an increase of 250 compared with last year.

During the year there were 1,100 births and 700 deaths compared with 1,000 births and 650 deaths in 1955. The estimated birth rate of the District of 20.5 per 1,000 compares favourably with the national birth rate of 18.7 per 1,000. The estimated death rate of 10.0 per 1,000 compares favourably with the national death rate of 11.0 per 1,000.

There were no deaths of infants under one year of age.

On 31st December 1956 there were 1,000 persons aged 15 years and above of whom 400 were males and 600 were females.

The Town's water supply continues to be in excess of requirements and 100,000 gallons of water are available for fire fighting purposes. All water mains are being replaced as they become worn and during the year the Corporation also spent £10,000 on the improvement of the drainage system.

Postally Midwifery Service

Health Visiting

One Health Visitor works in the Piquette area, her office being situated in the Conference Hall (telephone number 2282).

Home Nursing Service

This service is run in conjunction with the Midwifery Service as indicated above.

Substance Service

The County Council's Substance Service is situated on Ladbury Avenue, Piquette (telephone Piquette 2043).

Domestic Help

Home Help service which is provided in the District is administered at County Hall, Northridge, and all applications for the service are dealt with by the Home Help Organizer (telephone number 2282).

LOCAL EDUCATION AUTHORITY - SCHOOL HEALTH SERVICE

Routine medical inspections are carried out of all children attending Local Education Authority schools in the District. Head inspections of children in the primary schools is undertaken by the school nurse at the beginning of each term.

Immunisation against diphtheria, tetanus and poliomyelitis and B.C.G. Vaccination is made available to children in school.

OTHER LOCAL AUTHORITY SERVICES

Buckrose Health Division Co-ordinating Committee

Once every two or three months a co-ordinating Committee, under the aegis of the County Council, meets in Bridlington to co-ordinate the work of officers in the district who are concerned with the welfare of children. The primary objects of the Committee are the prevention of cruelty to children in their own homes and the prevention of break-up of families.

On the Committee are representatives of the County Children's Department, the County Health Department, the School Welfare Department, the County Welfare Department, the Housing Managers of the District Councils, the National Assistance Board, the National Society for the prevention of Cruelty to Children, the Women's Voluntary Service, Probation Officers, and a Marriage Guidance Counsellor. Representatives of other organisations are co-opted from time to time as the need arises. Your Medical Officer of Health in his capacity as Divisional Medical Officer takes the Chair of the Committee.

PUBLIC HEALTH LABORATORY

Specimens for bacteriological examination are sent to the Public Health Laboratory of the Medical Research Council at Hull.

VOLUNTARY ORGANISATIONS

Women's Royal Voluntary Service

The W.R.V.S. undertakes the sale of welfare foods for infants at the Conference Hall each Friday 9.30 a.m. to 11.30 a.m. and also at each Infant Welfare Clinic.

They also administer a Meals on Wheels service, a Chiropody service, a Darby and Joan Club and at 19 Queen Street an Old Persons Centre.

NATIONAL SOCIETY FOR THE PREVENTION OF CRUELTY TO CHILDREN

Filey lies within the North East Yorkshire Branch of the National Society for the prevention of Cruelty to Children and cases requiring the services of the Society are visited by Inspector White working from Scarborough. Inspector White's work is much appreciated by those of us in Filey concerned with child welfare.

LOCAL EDUCATION AUTHORITY - SCHOOL HEALTH SERVICE

Routine medical inspections are carried out of all children attending Local Education Authority schools in the District. Head inspections of children in the primary schools is undertaken by the school nurse at the beginning of each term.

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In the Committee are representatives of the County Children's Department, the County Health Department, the School Welfare Department, the County Welfare Department, the Housing Managers of the District Council, the National Assistance Board, the National Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children, the Women's Voluntary Service, Probation Officers, and a Marriage Guidance Counsellor. Representatives of other organisations are co-opted from time to time as the need arises. Your Medical Officer of Health is his capacity as Divisional Medical Officer takes the Chair of the Committee.

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Specimens for bacteriological examination are sent to the Public Health Laboratory of the Medical Research Council at Hull.

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They also administer a home on chronic services, a Childbody service, a Day and Night Club and at 15 Green Street an Old Persons Centre.

NATIONAL SOCIETY FOR THE PREVENTION OF CRUELTY TO CHILDREN

Every year within the North East Yorkshire Branch of the National Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children and cases requiring the services of the Society are visited by Inspector White working from Scarborough. Inspector White's work is most appreciated by those of us in this country with child welfare.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA

GENERAL

Building activity has continued at a fairly high level, and 131 new dwellings have been completed during the year. Two of these were old peoples bungalows built by the Council. The majority of the dwellings were bungalows but there was a good proportion of mixed development on the estate adjoining Scarborough Road.

Two business properties are still occupied in the area encompassed within the Providence Place Re-development scheme, but once a contract has been accepted there should be no hold up to the commencement of the scheme.

The conversion of the earth closets to the Water carriage system at the Station Cottages has been completed and no earth or pail closets are now in use within the built up area of the township.

REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL

The salvage scheme which was introduced in August has not met with the response from the traders that was anticipated. Indeed very few keep their clean paper and cardboard separate and little attempt has been made to compress the bulk and facilitate collection and handling. A separate collection is made from all premises who contribute to the salvage effort, and this reduces the pressure on the regular Refuse Collection teams. Over recent years more than 400 new houses have been added to the collection rota and as we are still employing the same number of men on collection and disposal, plus the fact that over the same period of time the hours of the working week have been reduced, some system had to be adopted, which aided the regular crews. The salvage scheme has helped in two ways (a) by collecting from many of the shops previously visited by the freighters and (b) by reducing the bulk to be disposed of at the tip.

Throughout the main part of the year two side loading freighters and six men are employed on the collection of refuse, but during the summer period an additional freighter with two men augments the regular team and is employed mainly on holiday camp collection, but also assists in collecting the town refuse. Very few complaints have been received in connection with this service and in comparison with many towns and districts who have no seasonal increase in refuse, but experience great difficulty in recruiting labour, we can count ourselves fortunate.

One man and an excavator are employed almost full time at the tip, where controlled tipping is the method of refuse disposal. Practically the only covering material we have been able to obtain has been clay, and this has led to considerable difficulty at the tip during wet periods. Periodic dusting with insecticides has reduced any nuisance from flies and other insects.
