To the Chairman and Councillors Urban District of Filey.

Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting the Annual Report for 1970.

The Registrar General's figures for the year indicate a mid-year population of 5,070, 70 less than in 1969.

During the year there were 53 live births and 88 deaths compared with 59 births and 99 deaths in 1969. The adjusted birth rate of 14.3 per thousand population is lower than-the national birth rate. The adjusted death rate of 11.7 per thousand population is the same as the national death rate. The high crude death rate in Filey (17.4 per thousand) is due to the high proportion of old people in the population.

Causes of death follow the expected pattern, with diseases of the heart and circulation and cancer predominating. There was one stillbirth, and no deaths of infants under one year of age.

No infectious diseases were sufficiently prevalent to merit special mention.

On housing, 67 new buildings were completed during the year on the Church Cliff Farm and Grove Hill Estates. A note-worthy achievement was the improvement of the potentially derelict property in Queen Street.

The Town's water supply continued as in previous years and was satisfactory in quantity and quality. Sewage disposal continued as previously. Refuse disposal is becoming a problem with the present tipping site rapidly becoming exhausted. Discussions have been held with neighbouring Authorities with similar problems with a view to a joint refuse disposal scheme.

In presenting this report may I express my thanks to the staff of the Department for their work during the year and also to the Chairman and Members of the Health Committee for their constant interest and support.

The primary objects of the Committee are the prevention of cruelty to children in their own homes and the prevention of break-up of families.

REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL

Two side loading freighters and six men which includes the two drivers carry out the collection of household refuse during the off season periods of the year and during the busier parts of the year an additional freighter and two extra men augment the regular teams. These are employed mainly on holiday camp collection and assisting in town collection.

Extra collections of trade refuse are made upon payment and during the winter months mussel shells are collected from the fishermens bait houses after payment for the season.

The tip has been maintained in good condition throughout the year and very few complaints have been received regarding collection or disposal.

Regular inspections and baiting for rats have been carried out and the surface of the tip has been dusted with insecticide at the appropriate times of the year to control fly and other insect breeding.

As mentioned earlier joint meetings have been held with the Technical Officers of adjoining authorities in order to formulate a joint report on disposal methods and typical samples of refuse have been pulverised and tested to ascertain the growing qualities after remaining inert for varying periods.
