To His Worship the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors of the Borough and Port of Folkestone.

Mr. Mayor, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I herewith submit the Annual Report on the medical aspect of the working of the Port of Folkestone for 1958.

During the year the regular boat services have been as follows:-

- (1) Folkestone-Calais.
 - (a) Daily passenger service by French steamer, Cote
 D'Azur, and reliefs by British Railways steamer
 from 1st January to 31st December, 1958.
 (Outward bound service took Golden Arrow passengers).
- (2) Folkestone-Boulogne. (British Railways steamers).
 - (a) Daily evening passenger service from 1st June to 28th September, 1958, inclusive.
 - (b) Daily morning passenger service from 11th July to 7th September, 1958, inclusive. An irregular service (four boats a week) was in force from 1st June until the commencement of the daily service and also during the period 9th to 28th September, 1958.

Four passenger boats were diverted to Dover (two because of the excessively high tides at Folkestone and the other two to allow Folkestone Harbour to handle the heavy outgoing traffic of winter sports enthusiasts). Two boats were diverted to Folkestone from Dover and on the 6th September, 1958 all boats were diverted to Newhaven as there had been a severe storm and the railway lines to London blocked.

Special excursion and "no-passport" trips were also run to France during the Summer season.

The usual cargo service was maintained to and from Calais and Boulogne.

A total of 725,503 passengers passed through the Port during the year; this figure showed an increase of 24,233 compared with 1957.

There has been a decrease in the number of aliens arriving - 4,924 less than 1957 - and 857 fewer aliens were medically examined compared with the previous year. A summary of the aliens arriving, medically examined, certificates issued, etc., during the past five years is given below:-

The Aliens continued to come mainly from Italy, Switzerland, France, Austria, Germany and Spain.

The men came to be employed in the brickyards, hotels, catering and for technical and professional employment with various firms; the women were mainly domestics, children's nurses and governesses, assistant hospital nurses, ward orderlies, textile and factory workers.

In view of the large number of Aliens coming to the U.K. for employment it is my opinion that each Alien coming to reside and work in the U.K. should be in possession of a certificate of health issued in the country of origin, and this should also apply to wives and children.

During 1958 the number of certificates issued on Form Port 12 was 169 compared with 148 for 1957. Of these 169 Aliens 126 were landed conditionally and 43 not permitted to land (2 of unsound mind or mentally defective, 23 undesirable for medical reasons and 18 because of their inability to support themselves or likely to require medical treatment). None of the Aliens was conditionally landed for further medical examination.

Eleven passengers were medically examined; one was a mental case returning to England, four were accident cases and six medical. Seven of the patients were treated at the local hospital.

Seven members of the ships' crews also received attention; three had deep lacerations and were sent to the local hospital, two medical cases were referred to their own doctors and a seaman, aged 35 years, found to be suffering from Chickenpox was conveyed by ambulance to his own home at Dover.

In conclusion I would like to express my appreciation of the efficient work carried out by the Medical and Nursing staff at the Harbour, and also to the unfailing and effective co-operation with us of the Immigration Officials, Customs Officials, British Railways Officials and Ships' staffs.

Routine samples of the water supply are taken by the Public Health Inspectors both from quayside hydrants and from storage tanks on vessels using the Harbour.

These samples were found to be generally satisfactory though on one occasion the bacteriological report on a sample taken from a tap on board a cross-channel steamer was not entirely satisfactory.

The matter was taken up with the owners of the vessel and as a precautionary measure the water tanks were opened up, emptied, and together with water pipe lines etc., thoroughly cleaned and sterilized.

Check samples following this operation proved entirely satisfactory.

Facilities exist for the bacteriological or pathological examination of rodents at the Public Health Laboratory Service, Preston Hall, British Legion Village, Maidstone. None of the rodents was sent for examination during 1958.

Harbour district treated as necessary by Rodent Operators of the British Railways Southern Region and assistance given by the Borough Rodent Operator as required.

It has not been found necessary over the past few years for work of disinfestation to be carried out on ships visiting this Port. If, however, such work were necessary the ships would be treated with Hydrogen Cyanide by the Fumigation Services Ltd., Barking, Essex, under the direction of the Dover Port Health Inspectors.

(4) Progress in the rat-proofing of ships.

The Port Health Inspectors made 548 visits to the Harbour during the year for the purpose of routine inspection of passenger and cargo boats and for the examination of all foodstuffs landed at the Port. This work entails considerable evening and weekend duty, especially during the summer months, as all passenger boats are met on arrival by an Inspector. Bacteriological Examination of Foodstuffs.

Chemical Examination of Foodstuffs.

(5) Pablie Health (Imported Food) Regulations, 1937 and 1948.

During the year action was taken under the above Regulations as follows:-

(1) A consignment, consisting of various foodstuffs said to contain percentages of meat, arrived from France without "Official Certificates".

Formal notices forbidding removal of the foodstuffs were served. Later it was established that the invoices accompanying the articles were incorrectly worded in relation to the alleged meat content and the notices were accordingly withdrawn and the goods released.

In these instances the foodstuffs also arrived without any Official Certificates such as are required by the Regulations Formal notices forbidding importation were issued in respect of each consignment and the foodstuffs were subsequently re-exported.
