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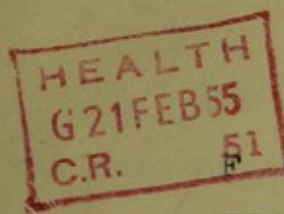

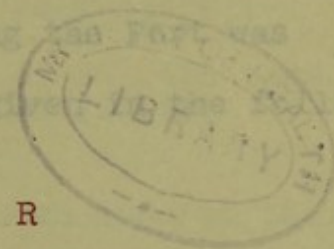

Embarkations to the number of 24 occurred during the year, majority having been to U.S.A. or Canadian ports. Medical inspections were carried out as necessary and re-vaccinations performed where necessary and International Certificates issued.

Water Supply .

The water for shipping is still supplied from the mains of the local Borough Council and bacteriological examinations have been carried out at regular intervals in order to be assured of the purity of the supply. The Reports were "satisfactory throughout the year.

In the dry months of the year (though these were negligible during 1954) there is always a shortage of water in the Borough. Means to remedy this state of affairs have been (and are) under very earnest consideration by the various parties concerned. The scheme which is awaiting approval involves taking water from the River Fowey above Lostwithiel, pumping it up to a reservoir to be constructed at a high point on the Fowey - Bodmin road, and piping from thence to the Fowey, St. Austell and Par area. However, even when the scheme is finally approved, it will be some considerable time before the area feels the benefit of the scheme.

There are no water boats used in the Port.

Notices served .

A total of 45 informal notices was served during the year calling attention to various nuisances and/or minor structural defects. When necessary owners were communicated with, but, in the majority of instances, the matters complained of were rectified in the Port.

From Jan. 1st '54 the crews of vessels engaged in coasting trade were supplied with bed and bedding under a National Maritime Board agreement. In the main the scheme is working reasonably well and

a considerable improvement in living conditions has been effected. On Ships :- The use of 'Warfarin' (.025%) ready-mixed bait has proved very effective on board ships, enabling action to be taken in holds and other places where the use of traps or dangerous poisons would have been impossible owing to the risk of non-recovery. 8 black and 3 brown rats have been recovered from ships.

Infectious disease.

There have been no cases of contagious or infectious disease arising in ships frequenting the Port during the year.

On 14/9/54 the M/V "Netta (Dutch) arrived at Fowey and reported that a sick man had been landed some days previously at Rotterdam, who was subsequently found to be suffering from para-typhoid fever. During the ship's stay the crew were kept under observation. The water tanks were cleaned out and the fresh supplies taken in were chlorinated. No further cases of sickness arose.

Harbours.

The S/S "Table Bay" was fined £25 on 22/2/54 for polluting Fowey Harbour with oil-fuel.

P.H. Shellfish Regulations. 1934 -38.

Fowey Shellfish Ltd.continue to market their oysters in season from the beds in the Fowey River estuary. Reports from the Fish-mongers Company show a 100% standard of cleanliness. In spite of exceptional flood-water and heavy mud deposits over the beds the shell-fish have maintained a good rate of growth during the year.
