The next thing that is here to be spoken of, farre exceeds all the ungodly actions that ever F heard report of before.

In the County of Essex, at a place called Tillingham, three libed one Mary Adams, who said that she was the Elirgin Mary, and that she was conceived with childe by the Poly Chost, and how all the Cosspell that had been taught heretofore, was false, and that which was within her, she said, was the true Herssias, for which blass phemous works, and wicked Opinion of hers, the Officers apprehended her, and cast her into Prison, untill the time came that she was to be belivered, to see what she would bring forth, but when the Hids wife and other good women of the Parish were brought to her, they did their best inbrake used to bring her to a safe delibers ance, but could not prebaile, so that there she lag in great miserg and much torment for the space of eight dairs and nights, and at last brought forth the ugliest ill shapen Monster as eber eits beheld, which being bead borne they buried it with speed, for it was so loathsome to behold that the womens hearts trembled to look upon it, for it had neither hands not fert, but claws like a Toad in the place wher the hands should have bern, and eberg part of it was contrary to the shape of other Christians.

And as for Mary Adams, which had na= med her selfe to be the Airgine Mary, she rotted and consumed as she lap, being from the head to the foot as full of botches, blaines, and boiles, and stinking scabs, as eber one could stand by another. But the end of her was in this manner, the wosmen and others that was about her, seeing there was no hopes of her life, desired her to pray, and to aske forgibenesse for her sins; shee answered them that her heart was so hardened in wickednes, that shee had no power to repent, but desired one of the women to lend her a knife to pare her naids, which when she had made use of, she laid the knif aside til such time the women were gone, and afterwards ript up her bowells with that same knife.
