The first Cup, valued at One Hundred dollars, was awarded to Miss Heenan at the Prize Baby Show, held at Coo street, Oct. 20th, 1845. She being then only nine months old, and weighing five stone.

The second cup, value 100 dollars, was presented to Miss Heenan by the late president, Abraham Lincoln, and several gentlemen friends, on the occasion of her first being exhibited at Washington, in August 1864, being then only three years old, and weighing 25 stone. The third cup, value 500 dollars, was presented to Miss Heenan in her native town, Troy, by the Grand and competitors of her childhood, on the eighteenth anniversary of her birth, January 23rd, 1867. The fourth cup, value 1000 dollars, was purchased by subscription, and presented to Miss Heenan by the ladies of this City, New York, May 2nd, 1867. And last, but not least, Miss Heenan now only 19 years of age, and weighing the enormous weight of 40 stone, 25 inches round the muscle of the arm, 3 feet 6 inches across the shoulder, and nearly 7 feet round the body. In conclusion, we can only say that she is highly deserving of the title, "The Queen of the Fat Ones." New York, May 6th, 1867.

It is a universal saying by all classes of society, that wonder never ceases. We have now in this town, a living realization of the fact.
