

To the Chairman and Members of the Urban District Council of Ashby-de-la-Zouch.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I beg to present my Report for the year 1960.

The population, which appears to be steadily increasing, is now 7,150 compared with 7,060 in 1959.

The birth rate (16.5) is lower than last year (17.1) and lower than that for England and Wales (17.1).

The death rate (8.7) is lower than last year (14.6) and lower than that for England and Wales (11.5).

The chief causes of death were from diseases associated with elderly people.

82 houses were completed during the year, making a total of 715 houses completed in the post-war period.

The total number of applicants for Council houses at the end of the year was 113 and the number of applications received during the year 44.

During the year 24 unfit houses were demolished and 4 closed.

During the year, 34 cases of Infectious Diseases were notified, 23 Measles, 6 Whooping Cough, 4 cases of Dysentery and 1 Pneumonia. There was one death from Pneumonia.

I am pleased to report that an increased number of children received primary immunisation against diphtheria.

Two cases of Tuberculosis, both pulmonary, males, were notified during the year, but there were no deaths. Three cases were removed from the register as cured.

#### Hospitals

All hospitals are under the Sheffield Regional Hospital Board.

The County Homes for aged and infirm people are under the County Council. When the inmates become ill they are the responsibility of the Hospital Board.

Loudoun House. County Home for Old People

There are 48 residents, men and women.

The eventual intention is a Home primarily to serve the needs of the locality, but the large number on the waiting list for the whole County necessitates the admission of people many miles from their homes.

Local organisations in the town and environs have welcomed the new residents and help to integrate them into the life of the community. This is one of the important functions so necessary to prevent the residents from feeling an isolated section of the public.

#### Treatment Centres and Clinics

Infant Welfare Clinics are held every Thursday afternoon at the Baptist Schoolroom, Ashby-de-la-Zouch. An Ante-Natal Clinic is held at the Health Centre, Bridge Road, Coalville, and the Tuberculosis Clinic at Markfield Sanatorium. The Tuberculosis Clinic is under the Sheffield Regional Hospital Board.

#### SECTION C

#### SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA

#### Water Supply.

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Early in the year we received many complaints regarding the taste and smell of the water, particularly after periods of heavy rain. The bulk water supply is obtained from the River Dove Water Board and chemical analysis of the water ascertained that the complaints arose from the presence of chlorophenols in the water.

Three samples of water were taken for chemical analysis and part of the Analyst's report on these samples is given below :

> Sample No. 1 was taken at Westfields. Sample No. 2 was taken at New Packington. Sample No. 3 was taken at Willesley.

We beg to report that we have examined the three samples of water received from you on the 24th February, with the following results (in parts per million) :

We have also carried out an examination for the presence of chlorophenols and find evidence of the presence of a minute trace of these substances in sample No. 1 but not in the other two samples.

When the samples were received by us we formed the opinion that sample No. 1 had a marked "Medicinal" odour and taste, that sample No. 2 also showed this odour and taste but to a lesser degree, while we did not detect any significant odour or taste in sample No. 3. The presence of minute quantities of chlorophenols (one part or less of phenol per 1000 millions) is sufficient to give rise to complaints of taste and odour, and in our opinion the difficulties associated with your water supply are due to the presence of substances of this type.

#### Public Cleansing

Domestic refuse is removed by direct labour over the whole of the district by an 8 year old Dennis 10 cubic yard side loading vehicle. Approximately 300 cubic yards of refuse are collected and disposed of weekly. Owing to labour difficulties and mechanical trouble with the lorry, the period between collections has varied from 7 to 13 days. A new vehicle was ordered for delivery during 1961 when it is hoped that a 7 day refuse collection service can be resumed.

In the autumn tipping on the crude tip on Nottingham Road was discontinued and a new tip which is partially controlled was opened in the disused railway cutting off the Smisby Road.
