To the Chairman and Members of the Urban District Council of Ashby-de-la-Zouch.

Madam Chairman, Dr. Griffith and Gentlemen,

I beg to present my Report for the year 1962.

The population is steadily increasing and is now 7,480 compared with 7,450 in 1961.

The birth rate (16.4) is lower than last year (18.6) and lower than that for England and Wales (18.0).

The death rate (10.4) is lower than last year (12.2) and lower than that for England and Wales (11.9).

The chief causes of death were from diseases associated with elderly people.

33 houses were completed during the year making a total of 781 houses completed in the post-war period.

The total number of applicants for Council houses at the end of the year was 115 and the number of applications received during the year was 69.

During the year 32 unfit houses were demolished and 2 closed.

During the year 24 cases of Infectious Diseases were notified, 22 Measles, one Whooping Cough and one Puerperal Pyrexia. There were five deaths from Pneumonia.

During the outbreak of smallpox in some parts of the country at the beginning of the year, the son of one of the cases in Birmingham visited this area. A considerable amount of visiting and enquiries was necessary. To allay the panic which existed during that period involved a considerable amount of time, particularly in answering telephone calls.

I am pleased to report that the number of children who received primary immunisation against diphtheria still remains high.

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Only one case of Pulmonary Tuberculosis, a male, was notified during the year.

The Mass Radiography Unit again made a survey in the area.

I should like to express my thanks to the staff of the Public Health Department of the County and to Dr. Mair and his staff in the Public Health Laboratory at Groby Road, Leicester, for their help and co-operation.

Finally, I must thank Mr. F. H. Wynne, Public Health Inspector, for his invaluable help during the year, and to you, Ladies and Gentlemen, for your kindness and courtesy.

SECTION B

GENERAL PROVISIONS OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA

Hospitals

All hospitals are under the Sheffield Regional Hospital Board.

The County Homes for aged and infirm people are under the County Council. When the inmates become ill they are the responsibility of the Hospital Board.

Ashby-de-la-Zouch and District Hospital

This is the only hospital in the area and is under the Leicester No. 2 Hospital Management Committee. The hospital has accommodation for 28 patients, including 13 maternity beds.

Loudoun House. County Home for Old People

Loudoun House accommodates 48 residents of both sexes who by reason of age, infirmity, etc. are unable to care for themselves in their own homes. Whilst many of the residents are from the immediate locality, there are numbers admitted from other areas of the County because of the pressing demand for accommodation. All residents have the opportunity of being transferred to a County Home nearer to their normal area of residence but as this often entails a lengthy delay whilst waiting for a suitable vacancy, little movement actually takes place as the residents do not wish to face another upheaval and settling in.

The Home receives considerable support and interest from members of Local organisations some of which takes the form of gifts particularly on festive occasions, others in visiting or by inducing the residents to participate in various functions they arrange. These organisations realise the importance of letting the residents of Loudoun House know that they are now new residents of Ashby-de-la-Zouch and are not a little community of folk living apart.

Treatment Centres and Clinics

Infant Welfare Clinics are held every Thursday afternoon at the Baptist Schoolroom, Ashby-de-la-Zouch. An Ante-Natal Clinic is held at the Adult School, Bridge Road, Coalville, and the Tuberculosis Clinic at Markfield Sanatorium. The Tuberculosis Clinic is under the Sheffield Regional Hospital Board.

Relaxation classes for pregnant mothers are held at the Ivanhoe Community Centre on Wednesday mornings, except during the school holidays.

Ambulance Facilities

The County Council is responsible for all ambulance facilities in the County. Colliery accidents are removed by ambulances provided by the National Coal Board at Nailstone Colliery and Moira Colliery.

Nursing in the Home

All district nursing and midwifery in the home is under the County Council.

Health Visiting

This work is provided, as before, by the County Council and is ably carried out in the area.

A Diabetic Health Visitor attends the Clinic at the Royal Infirmary, Leicester, and visits the patients in their homes on request.

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Generally, there is co-operation between the local authority and the services provided by the Executive Council and the Hospital Board, and the tendency is towards closer integration.

Meals on Wheels

This service, operated by the Women's Voluntary Service, commenced in May 1962 and supplies a hot meal two days per week to about 12 elderly and infirm people living within the District.

Until November an 8-day refuse collection service was operated by one Shelvoke and Drewry 25 cubic yard "Fore and Aft" Freighter, and one Dennis "Chelsea" side loader which was used for one day each week to collect refuse from the outlying areas. In November the Council adopted a new bonus scheme and from 21st November a weekly service operated throughout the whole of the district.

The refuse is disposed of in the disused railway cutting off Smisby Road. This tip is partially controlled.

Smallpox Contacts

The son of one of the smallpox cases in the Birmingham area visited a house near this district, attending church service morning and evening. Some 40 people attended both services. All these people and their families were vaccinated, and as there were several people who lived in various areas both near and far, the appropriate Medical Officers of Health were notified. A large amount of visiting and enquiry was necessary, but it was made much easier by the co-operation of all church members. The state of panic which existed brought numerous enquiries from people, particularly by telephone, which considerably interfered with one's work.

Mass Radiography

An X-ray survey was carried out in April. In all 2,147 persons were examined, 770 males and 1,377 females. Three cases of Pulmonary Tuberculosis were discovered which did not require close supervision and three cases were discovered which required formal supervision. Included in the 24 other diseases discovered were two cases of lung cancer.

There is free co-operation between the local authority and the Chest Physician and every assistance is given in the ascertainment of contacts, rehousing and employment. A special clinic for contacts has been working very satisfactorily and general practitioners have availed themselves fully of X-ray facilities.

A number of cases and contacts were seen and examined by Dr. Paul at the Outwoods Hospital, Burton-on-Trent.
