

To the Chairman and Members of the Urban District Council of Ashby-de-la-Zouch.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I beg to present my Report for the year 1963.

The population is steadily increasing and is now 7,560 compared with 7,480 in 1962.

The birth rate (19.0) is higher than last year (16.4) and higher than that for England and Wales (18.2).

The death rate (10.3) is lower than last year (10.4) and lower than that for England and Wales (12.2).

The chief causes of death were diseases associated with elderly people.

15 houses were completed during the year making a total of 796 houses completed in the post-war period.

The total number of applicants for Council houses at the end of the year was 146 and the number of applications received during the year was 50.

During the year 9 unfit houses were demolished and 1 closed.

During the year 188 cases of infectious diseases were notified, 168 Measles, 19 Whooping Cough and one Scarlet Fever. There were 8 deaths from Pneumonia.

I am pleased to report that the number of children who received primary immunisation against Diphtheria still remains high.

Two cases of Pulmonary Tuberculosis, both male, were notified during the year.

I should like to express my thanks to the staff of the Public Health Department of the County and to Dr. Mair and his staff at the



Public Health Laboratory, Groby Road, Leicester, for their help and co-operation.

Finally, I must thank Mr. F. H. Wynne, Public Health Inspector, for his invaluable help during the year, and to you, Ladies and Gentlemen, for your kindness and courtesy.

No industry was noted as having an injurious effect on the health of the population.



GENERAL PROVISIONS OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA

Hospitals.

All hospitals are under the Sheffield Regional Hospital Board.

The County Homes for aged and infirm people are under the County Council. When the inmates become ill they are the responsibility of the Hospital Board.

Ashby-de-la-Zouch and District Hospital.

This is the only hospital in the area and is under the Leicester No. 2 Hospital Management Committee. The hospital has accommodation for 28 patients, including 13 maternity beds.

Loudoun House. County Home for Old People.

Generally, 1963 was a pleasant, uneventful year, with no serious epidemic amongst residents and staff.

The number of deaths of residents totalled only 14, some of these being in hospital and some at the Home. The vacancies in each case were filled almost immediately with people from various parts of the County. The bed complement remained at 47 and in 1963 was occupied by 14 men and 33 women.

Several local organisations again invited the residents to various functions in the town and many gifts were received from generous people in and around Ashby-de-la-Zouch.

Blackfordby Brownie Pack have 'adopted' Loudoun House and pay frequent visits to the Home with flowers etc..

The Annual Sale of Work was again held and realised over £100 for the Residents' Comforts Fund.



Treatment Centres and Clinics.

Infant Welfare Clinics are held every Thursday afternoon at the Baptist Schoolroom, Ashby-de-la-Zouch. An Ante-Natal Clinic is held at the Adult School, Bridge Road, Coalville, and the Chest Clinic at Markfield Hospital. The Chest Clinic is under the Sheffield Regional Hospital Board.

Relaxation classes for pregnant mothers are held at the Ivanhoe Community Centre on Wednesday mornings, except during the school holidays.

Ambulance Facilities.

The County Council is responsible for all ambulance facilities in the County. Colliery accidents are removed by ambulances provided by the National Coal Board at Nailstone Colliery and Moira Colliery.

Nursing in the Home.

All district nursing and midwifery in the home is under the County Council.

Health Visiting.

This work is provided, as before, by the County Council and is ably carried out in the area.


A Diabetic Health Visitor attends the Clinic at the Royal Infirmary, Leicester, and visits the patients in their homes on request.

In October a patient in the Cottage Hospital was suspected of having food poisoning. All the staff were examined bacteriologically and it was found that a cleaner, a 56 years old woman, was a carrier of Paratyphoid B. The cleaner lived outside the Urban District area but was immediately excluded from working in the hospital. She was still excreting the organisms at the end of the year. The patient originally responsible for the investigation was found not to be a case of food poisoning and no other cases were found.

Pulmonary Tuberculosis.

Two Pakistani men who worked in a food factory in Ashby, but who were resident outside the Urban District, were found to have Pulmonary Tuberculosis. The whole of the staff of the factory were X-rayed but no further cases were found.

There is free co-operation between the local authority and the Chest Physician and every assistance is given in the ascertainment of contacts, rehousing and employment. A special clinic for contacts has been working very satisfactorily and general practitioners have availed themselves fully of X-ray facilities.

A number of cases and contacts were seen and examined by Dr. Paul at the Outwoods Hospital, Burton-on-Trent.
