GENERAL PROVISIONS OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA

Hospitals.

All hospitals are under the Sheffield Regional Hospital Board.

The County Homes for aged and infirm people are under the County Council. When the residents become ill they are the responsibility of the Hospital Board.

Ashby-de-la-Zouch and District Hospital.

This is the only hospital in the area and is under the Leicester No. 2 Hospital Management Committee. The hospital has accommodation for 28 patients, including 13 maternity beds.

Loudoun House - County Home for Old People.

It was a very quiet year with no serious epidemic amongst the residents or staff. There were only 3 deaths in Loudoun House, 1 resident was transferred to Chronic Sick accommodation and 2 residents died after being transferred to hospital. All the vacancies were filled immediately. The bed complement remains at 47 - 13 men and 34 women.

The residents were invited to partake in various functions in the town, and gifts were again received from many generous people in the neighbourhood.

The Annual Sale of Work proved a very successful day and £116 was raised for the Comforts Fund.

Treatment Centres and Clinics.

Infant Welfare Clinics are held every Thursday afternoon at the Baptist Schoolroom, Ashby-de-la-Zouch. An Ante-Natal Clinic is held at the Adult School, Bridge Road, Coalville, and the Chest Clinic at Markfield Hospital. The Chest Clinic is under the Sheffield Regional Hospital Board.

Relaxation classes for pregnant mothers are held at the Ivanhoe Community Centre on Wednesday mornings, except during the school holidays.

Ambulance Facilities.

The ambulance service throughout Leicestershire is provided by the County Council from 8 ambulance stations. The whole fleet is equipped for two-way radio communication and all ambulance movements are controlled from the ambulance headquarters in Leicester.

Each two-stretcher ambulance is equipped to administer oxygen to patients if required, and a "Brook Airway" is carried on all vehicles to facilitate direct artificial respiration. In addition a "Minuteman" and/or "Novita" resuscitator is available at each ambulance station and is taken out on ambulances dealing with calls where it is thought that the use of this apparatus might be necessary.

Colliery accidents are removed by ambulances provided by the National Coal Board at Nailstone Colliery and Moira Colliery.

Nursing in the Home.

All district nursing and midwifery in the home is the responsibility of the County Council.

Health Visiting.

This work is provided, as before, by the County Council and is ably carried out in the area.

A diabetic Health Visitor attends the Clinic at the Royal Infirmary, Leicester, and visits the patients in their homes on request.
