

To the Chairman and Members of the Urban District Council of Ashby-de-la-Zouch.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I beg to present my Report for the year 1965.

The population has increased slightly from 7,510 to 7,530.

The birth rate (18.5) is higher than last year (16.6) and higher than that for England and Wales (18.1).

The death rate (12.3) is higher than last year (10.1) and higher than that for England and Wales (11.5).

The chief causes of death were diseases associated with elderly people.

82 houses were completed during the year making a total of 949 houses completed in the post-war period.

The total number of applicants for Council houses at the end of the year was 124 and the number of applications received during the year was 50.

During the year 7 houses were closed.

During the year 277 cases of infectious diseases were notified, 274 Measles, 1 Whooping Cough, 1 Puerperal Pyrexia and 1 Dysentery. There were 6 deaths from Pneumonia.

Only one new case of Pulmonary Tuberculosis, a male, was notified during the year.

I should like to express my thanks to the staff of the Public Health Department of the County and to Dr. Mair and his staff at the Public Health Laboratory, Groby Road, Leicester, for their help and co-operation.

Finally, I must thank Mr. F.H. Wynne, Public Health Inspector, for his invaluable help during the year, and to you, Ladies and Gentlemen, for your kindness and courtesy.



SECTION B

GENERAL PROVISIONS OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA

Hospitals.

All hospitals are under the Sheffield Regional Hospital Board.

The County Homes for aged and infirm people are under the County Council. When the residents become ill they are the responsibility of the Hospital Board.

Ashby-de-la-Zouch and District Hospital.

This is the only hospital in the area and is under the Leicester No. 2 Hospital Management Committee. The hospital has accommodation for 28 patients, including 13 maternity beds.

Loudoun House - County Home for Old People.

1965 was again a fairly uneventful year with no serious epidemic amongst the residents or staff. Nine new residents were admitted to the Home and one resident was admitted for two weeks whilst relatives took a holiday.

During the year there were four deaths, five transfers to Chronic Sick accommodation, one transfer to Carlton Hayes Hospital, one to Tillson House and one to West Haven House. The bed complement remains at 47 - 13 men and 34 women.

The Annual Sale of Work was well supported and raised £150. 2. 10d for the Loudoun House Comforts Fund.

Again the residents were taken on several outings during the summer and were entertained by organisations in and around Ashby. At Harvest Thanksgiving and Christmas gifts were received from many generous people in the neighbourhood.

Treatment Centres and Clinics.

Infant Welfare Clinics are held every Thursday afternoon at the Baptist Schoolroom, Ashby-de-la-Zouch. An Ante-Natal Clinic is held at the Adult School, Bridge Road, Coalville, and the Chest Clinic

at Markfield Hospital. The Chest Clinic is under the Sheffield Regional Hospital Board.

Relaxation classes for pregnant mothers are held at the Ivanhoe Community Centre on Wednesday mornings, except during the school holidays.

Ambulance Facilities.

The ambulance service throughout Leicestershire is provided by the County Council from eight ambulance stations. The whole fleet is equipped for two-way radio communication and all ambulance movements are controlled from the ambulance headquarters in Leicester.

The ambulance service for North West Leicestershire is based at Coalville, where four ambulances and three dual purpose vehicles are provided to give a 24-hour service. During 1965 these vehicles conveyed 23,232 patients a total of 211,990 miles. With the opening of the M.1 Motorway extension northwards to Markfield and beyond, the Coalville station has become responsible for dealing with emergencies on certain sections of the Motorway. An ambulance specially equipped for motorway work is to be based at Coalville in order that emergencies on the motorway can be dealt with more efficiently.

Colliery accidents are removed by ambulances provided by the National Coal Board at Nailstone Colliery and Moira Colliery.

Nursing in the Home.

All district nursing and midwifery in the home is the responsibility of the County Council.

Health Visiting.

This work is provided, as before, by the County Council and is ably carried out in the area.

A diabetic Health Visitor attends the Clinic at the Royal Infirmary, Leicester, and visits the patients in their homes on request.

Laboratory Facilities.

Public Health Laboratory, Isolation Hospital, Groby Road, Leicester.

I am informed that owing to the increased work and shortage of laboratory staff, these figures will not be available in future.

Generally, there is co-operation between the local authority and the services provided by the Executive Council and the Hospital Board, and the tendency is towards closer integration.

Meals on Wheels.

This service, operated by the Women's Voluntary Service, supplies a hot meal two days per week to approximately 20 elderly and infirm people living within the district.

Thanks are due to all those participating in this useful service, not only to the people who supply the meals, but to those ladies who deliver them in their cars.



SECTION C

Water Supply.

There has been no shortage of water during the year.

Samples of water for bacteriological and chemical analysis are taken regularly by the River Dove and the North West Leicestershire Water Boards.

The fluoride content of the water is approximately 0.2 parts per million.

The water is not liable to plumbo-solvent action.

Public Cleansing.

Except for one week in August when the department was closed for staff holidays and for repairs to the lorry, a weekly refuse collection service was maintained throughout the year.

A Shelvoke & Drewry 25 cubic-yard freighter with driver and five loaders was employed full time on refuse collection, and a Dennis 10 cubic-yard side loader with driver and one loader was employed one day per week to collect sanitary pans and refuse from outlying farms and cottages.

The number of dustbins collected per week increased from 3,139 in January to 3,255 in December.

Trade refuse was collected from offices and shops by agreement with the occupiers.

Pulmonary Tuberculosis.

There is free co-operation between the local authority and the Chest Physician. Every assistance is given in the ascertainment of contacts, rehousing and employment. A special clinic for contacts at Markfield Hospital has been working very satisfactorily and general practitioners have availed themselves of X-ray facilities.

A number of cases and contacts were seen and examined by Dr. Paul at the Outwoods Hospital, Burton-on-Trent.

During the year one male pulmonary case was added to the Tuberculosis Register. Two male pulmonary cases left the district and were taken off the Register, leaving 15 cases remaining on the Register.

Measles was prevalent during the last four months of the year.

One case of Dysentery was notified. This infection was probably contracted while the patient was in hospital.
