Madam Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I beg to present my Report for the year 1966.

The population has increased slightly from 7,530 to 7,640.

The birth rate (15.5) is lower than last year (18.5) and lower than that for England and Wales (17.7).

The death rate (10.4) is lower than last year (12.3) and lower than that for England and Wales (11.7).

The chief causes of death were diseases associated with elderly people.

95 houses were completed during the year making a total of 1,044 houses completed in the post-war period.

The total number of applicants for Council houses at the end of the year was 138 and the number of applications received during the year was 51.

During the year 12 houses were demolished or closed.

During the year 43 cases of infectious diseases were notified, 36 Measles, 5 Whooping Cough, and 2 Scarlet Fever. There were 5 deaths from Pneumonia.

There was one severe case of Chicken Pox (which is not a notifiable disease at the present time). This case was seen by the Smallpox Consultant Physician.

Some 22 people had various bacteriological examinations carried out by the Public Health Laboratory. This was only possible through the kindly help and skilful co-operation of the doctors in the Ashby practice.

Only one new case of Pulmonary Tuberculosis, a male, was notified during the year. Three cases were removed from the Register as cured. This leaves 13 cases on the Register, the lowest number ever.

I should like to express my thanks to the staff of the Public Health Department of the County and to Dr. Mair and his staff at the Public

Health Laboratory, Groby Road, Leicester, for their help and co-operation.

Finally, I must thank Mr. F.H. Wynne, Public Health Inspector, for his invaluable help during the year, and to you, Ladies and Gentlemen, for your kindness and courtesy.

SECTION B

GENERAL PROVISIONS OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA

Hospitals.

All hospitals are under the Sheffield Regional Hospital Board.

The County Homes for aged and infirm people are under the County Council. When the residents become ill they are the responsibility of the Hospital Board.

Ashby-de-la-Zouch and District Hospital.

This is the only hospital in the area and is under the Leicester No. 2 Hospital Management Committee. The hospital has accommodation for 28 patients, including 13 maternity beds.

A Psychiatric Out-patients Clinic has been established and is held every Tuesday.

Loudoun House - County Home for Old People.

Loudoun House provides accommodation for 47 persons in need of care and attention. Every attempt is made to allocate persons from the Ashby locality into this Home but since a number of beds are available in the County it precludes applying this principle throughout. It may even be necessary to place a resident elsewhere, just as a resident from a more remote corner of the County has to be admitted to Loudoun House. Such admissions are made with the proviso that a subsequent attempt will be made to move them to a Home nearer to their place of normal residence but it is interesting to note that after the initial settling down period residents are happier not to be moved. The County Council has a plan for the provision of quite a number of new Homes over the next ten years including the demolition of the former Workhouses, and this should then help to make each Home serve its immediate locality.

Loudoun House has been one of the most fortunate Homes in the County as regards staff, and are fortunate to have a number of loyal employees who have been with the Home since it opened.

Treatment Centres and Clinics.

Infant Welfare Clinics are held every Thursday afternoon at the Baptist Schoolroom, Ashby-de-la-Zouch. An Ante-Natal Clinic is held at the Adult School, Bridge Road, Coalville, and the Chest Clinic at Markfield Hospital. The Chest Clinic is under the Sheffield Regional Hospital Board.

Relaxation classes for pregnant mothers are held at the Ivanhoe Community Centre on Wednesday mornings, except during the school holidays.

Ambulance Facilities.

The ambulance service throughout Leicestershire is provided by the County Council from eight ambulance stations. The whole fleet is equipped for two-way radio communication and all ambulance movements are controlled from the ambulance headquarters in Leicester.

The ambulance service for North West Leicestershire is based at Coalville, where three ambulances and five dual purpose vehicles are provided to give a 24-hour service. During 1966 these vehicles conveyed 24,532 patients a total of 223,278 miles.

Colliery accidents are removed by ambulances provided by the National Coal Board at Nailstone Colliery and Moira Colliery.

Nursing in the Home.

All district nursing and midwifery in the home is the responsibility of the County Council.

Health Visiting.

This work is provided, as before, by the County Council and is ably carried out in the area.

A diabetic Health Visitor attends the Clinic at the Royal Infirmary, Leicester, and visits the patients in their homes on request.

Laboratory Facilities.

Laboratory facilities are provided by the Public Health Laboratory, Isolation Hospital, Groby Road, Leicester. Owing to increased work and shortage of staff, details of examinations performed on behalf of the district are no longer obtainable.

Generally, there is co-operation between the local authority and the services provided by the Executive Council and the Hospital Board, and the tendency is towards closer integration.

Meals on Wheels.

This service, operated by the Women's Voluntary Service, supplies a hot meal two days per week to approximately 24 elderly and infirm people living within the district.

Thanks are due to all those participating in this useful service, not only to the people who supply the meals, but to those ladies who deliver them in their cars.

SECTION C

Water Supply.

There has been no shortage of water during the year.

Samples of water for bacteriological and chemical analysis are taken regularly by the River Dove and the North West Leicestershire Water Boards.

The fluoride content of the water is approximately 0.2 parts per million.

The water is not liable to plumbo-solvent action.

North West Leicestershire Water Board.

Bacteriological examinations of blood, urine and faeces, including Widal tests, were carried out on 18 employees. All were negative.

Salmonella Infection.

A young man aged 20 years, working and living in a hotel outside this area, developed a Salmonella infection. The patient was given treatment and then sent to his home in Ashby. Samples of the patient's faeces were obtained for bacteriological examination, but fortunately the results were negative and the patient made a quick recovery.

Salmonella Contact.

About the same time a young man who worked at the same hotel as the above came to work in an Ashby hotel. Bacteriological examinations were obtained before he commenced work, but the results were negative.

Contact with a case of Typhoid Fever during European Tour.

During the summer a local resident and his wife went on a Continental Tour for 12 days. Some days after their return a member of the party living in another area was taken ill and was subsequently found to be suffering from Typhoid Fever. About 12 days after her return the wife had a mild gastro-intestinal illness which was so mild that she did not seek medical advice. This illness must have been incidental, as all subsequent bacteriological examinations, including Widal tests, were negative.

In all the above cases the doctors in the Ashby practice were extremely helpful and co-operative.

A Severe Case of Chicken Pox.

A man aged 38 years became very ill with all the signs and symptoms of Chicken Pox. However, in view of his age and the severity of his symptoms, he was seen by a Smallpox Consultant Physician who agreed that it was a case of Chicken Pox.

Tuberculosis.

During the year one male pulmonary case was notified. Three cases, two male pulmonary and one female pulmonary, all cured, were removed from the Register leaving 13 cases on the Register.

Local tuberculosis cases attend for treatment at the Chest Clinic at Markfield Hospital and the Outwoods Hospital at Burton-on-Trent where there are also special clinics for contacts.
