Births

The birth rate at 16.5 was slightly above that for England and Wales (16.3) and higher than that for the previous year (14.6). The illegitimate live birth rate per cent of total live births was higher than last year's, but still well below the rate for the country as a whole.

Deaths

83 deaths of Ashby residents were recorded, 31 of these occurring without the district. The death rate at 10.9 was below that for England and Wales (11.9) and much below last year's figure of 13.2.

Infantile Mortality

No deaths of children under 1 year of age took place - one of the happiest features of this report.

Water Supply

Water is distributed in the area by the North West Leicestershire Water Board.

There has been no shortage of water during the year.

The water is not liable to plumbo-solvent action and the fluoride content varies between 0.1 and 0.4 parts per million.

One pail closet was abolished during the year.

Public Cleansing

A weekly refuse collection service was maintained throughout the district except during the Statutory Holidays - a total of six days per year when about 600 householders do not have their refuse collected for lh days. The refuse collection service has not closed down for annual holidays since 1966.

The number of dustbins collected per week has increased from 3489 on 1st January, to 3625 on the 31st December.

The cost of the collection and disposal of refuse during the year was £1. 2. 8. per head of the population, which compares very favourably with the average for Urban Districts in Leicestershire -£1. 8. 8. per head of the population.

The bulk of the refuse is collected by a Dennis Paxit 111A continuous loading vehicle with a crew of five loaders and driver. The Shelvoke and Drury Lorry is now eight years old and is kept on standby duties and for the collection of refuse and pails in the outlying areas of the Urban District on one day per week.

Trade refuse is collected by arrangement from shops and offices and a charge of £1. 0. 0. per year is made for the weekly collection of each bin.

The present Tip adjoining the Ticknall Tunnel is estimated to have a life of 18 months but a new Tip has been acquired at Lount in conjunction with the Ashby-de-la-Zouch Rural District Council which will be brought into use when required.

Maintenance of Council Houses

The tenants of the four remaining aluminium prefabricated bungalows at Blackfordby were rehoused in the autumn and the bungalows were demolished.

The twenty aluminium bungalows at Westfield are now in a very poor condition and are deteriorating rapidly, but the tenants cannot be rehoused until alternative accommodation is erected on the station land. This land was purchased by the Council from British Railways in May.

An increasing number of complaints regarding dampness are being received from tenants, particularly in the low cost houses and bungalows built by the Council in 1960 and 1961. Investigations have invariably proved that the dampness in these properties is due to condensation and remedi al measures will soon have to be taken to alleviate the problem.
