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



The estimated population at the middle of the year increased from 8,040 to 8,300.

The birth rate at 15.8 is just below that for England and Wales (16) but is appreciably higher than last year (12.7).

The percentage of illegitimate live births this year is 5, compared with 8 for the country as a whole and with 9 for last year.

One still-birth only was registered (3 last year) with a rate per 1,000 live and still births of 8 for the district, compared with 12 for England and Wales and 29 for 1970.

The death of one infant under 1 year of age from an upper respiratory tract infection occurred giving an infantile mortality rate of 8 per 1,000 live births, compared with 18 for England and Wales and 20 for Ashby-de-la-Zouch in 1970.


There were no deaths of infants under 1 week of age or under 4 weeks of age, whilst the perinatal rate was 8, compared with 22 for England and Wales and 48 for Ashby in 1970.

27 of the deaths recorded occurred outwith the district and 72 within the district, whilst there also occurred within the district the deaths of 23 non-residents, which, of course, are not included in our figures. The death rate, remarkably low last year at 9.4 per 1,000 is slightly higher at 12.9 than that for England and Wales at 11.6.

General Provision of Health Services

In my last report I referred to the fact that it was likely that a Health Centre would be provided by the County Council. This has not yet become an accomplished fact, but I understand that negotiations are well advanced and that a start will be made on its erection in the near future.

Social Services

The Social Services Department of the County Council came into being on 1st April, 1971. An area office was opened at Park House, 43 London Road, Coalville under the supervision of an Area Director to serve an area comprising Ashby Urban District, Ashby WouldsUrban District, Ashby-de-la-Zouch Rural District, Coalville Urban District and part of Market Bosworth Rural District.

This department of the County Council assumed responsibility for all services previously administered by the Children's Department, together with the welfare services of the Health and Welfare Department, which include the welfare of the mentally ill and the mentally handicapped, the physically handicapped and the elderly, the provision of a Home Help service and the supervision of play-groups and child-minders.

Meals on Wheels

12 visits, involving 13 persons, were paid to applicants for this service and almost all were approved.

National Assistance Acts, 1948 and 1951


No formal action was necessary under the above Acts.

Examination of Employees

One employee was examined with a view to assessing his fitness or otherwise for work. He was found to be unfit for work involving more than a moderate degree of physical exertion, and it was considered that undue exposure to the elements was undesirable in that such exposure might aggravate the chronic illness from which he was suffering.

Food Hygiene

A proposal or suggestion was made in the Council in 1970 that a Food Hygiene Exhibition should be staged on lines similar to one which had been successfully held in the town some years ago. Partly because of pressure of work in the Department it was not found possible to implement the suggestion, but a further suggestion was



put forward to the effect that a Food Hygiene handbook should be published in collaboration with the Councils of three adjoining districts. On being approached on the subject the three Councils were prepared to co-operate, so contact was established with a firm which undertakes the publication of such handbooks. 2,000 free copies were to be provided by the Publishers who would be responsible for approaching advertisers and thus financing the operation. It had been the hope that generally speaking each household in the four districts would be supplied with a copy. There are approximately 18,000 households in the combined districts - 2,000 free copies only being available for distribution was much too low a proportion, so this scheme was abandoned too.

The County Medical Officer of Health, to whom the idea had been mentioned casually, stated that he had known of certain local newspapers in other parts of the country which published a Food Hygiene supplement, the material being supplied by the Local Health Authority. Accordingly the local weekly newspaper circulating freely throughout most of the area covered by the four Authorities was approached and immediately the Editor expressed his interest in the project. Eventually early in the year a fairly comprehensive "supplement" appeared in the weekly newspaper with appropriate advertisements and photographs. I wish to express my thanks to the Editor and to the proprietors for their willing co-operation.

Prevalence of, and Control over, Infectious Disease

23 cases of infectious disease were notified, 7 of these were measles, 15 were whooping cough, and one was infective jaundice. The last case was in a boy in the 10-14 years age group. The age and sex distribution of the others is as follows.

Water Supply

Water is distributed in the area by the North West Leicestershire Water Board.

There has been no shortage of water during the year.

The water is not liable to plumbo-solvent action and the fluoride content is approximately 0.26 parts per million.

One pail closet was abolished during the year.

A survey has revealed that there are still 8 houses with pail closets in the outlying unsewered parts of the district. Every effort is being made to persuade the owners of these houses to install **septic** tanks and water closets.

Public Cleansing

A weekly refuse collection service was maintained throughout the district except during the Statutory Holidays - a total of six days per year when approximately 600 householders do not have their refuse collected for 14 days. The refuse collection service has not closed down for annual holidays since 1966.

The number of dustbins collected per week has increased from 3,684 on the 1st January, to 3,752 on the 31st December.

The bulk of the trade and domestic refuse is still collected using the Dennis Paxit IIIA continuous loading vehicle with a crew of 5 loaders and driver.

The Shelvoke and Drury freighter, which was purchased in 1961, was sold in June and a Bedford Container Handling Vehicle was put into service. This vehicle was supplied with two detachable bodies so that it can be used as a side loading refuse vehicle and as a drop side tipping lorry when it is not being used to handle containers. This vehicle is used to collect refuse from the outlying areas of the district on one day each week.

Several containers, fitted with hinged covers, have been ordered and will be hired to large shops, hotels and other similar premises.

All refuse is disposed of on the tip in Smisby Road which is leased by the Council from the British Transport Commission. Land has been purchased at Lount which will be used jointly as a refuse tip by the Coalville U.D.C., Ashby-de-la-Zouch R.D.C. and Ashby-de-la-Zouch U.D.C. This tip is estimated to have a life of 10 years and should be brought into use in 1972.
