General Provision of Health Services in the Area.

Tuberculosis

Hawley Sanatorium, situated in the Borough of Barnstaple, has 28 beds.

Maternity Cases

The Devon County Council is continuing to act as they did in 1947, as agents for the Regional Hospital Board, until the Board has completed its own plans for the treatment of Maternity cases.

At the North Devon Infirmary there is a ward of 15 beds with a fully qualified staff available for cases of doubt or difficulty.

At Bicclescombe Maternity Home, Ilfracombe, there are 20 Maternity and 4 Ante-natal beds.

There are 4 beds at Braunton Nursing Home.

A General Practitioners Maternity Unit of 13 beds was opened at Highfield, Victoria Road, Barnstaple, on March 1st, 1952.

Isolation of Infectious Diseases

There is an Infectious Diseases Joint Isolation Hospital at Bideford, which serves Barnstaple as well as other Local Authorities in North Devon. It comprises 34 beds (6 of which are in observation cubicles) and 4 cots.

Small Pox

The Small Pox Hospital to which any cases of Small Pox will be sent is Upton Pine Hospital, near Exeter. Special

Ambulance Transport can be obtained by contacting the Isolation Hospital, Whipton, Exeter. Telephone 67158.

General

The North Devon Infirmary, situated in Barnstaple, serves the Area, and provides modern Medical and Surgical treatment for the residents of the district.

During the year a ward at the Alexandra Hospital was set aside as an annexe to the male wards of the North Devon Infirmary, and post-operative and recovering patients are now transferred as soon as practicable.

A Blood Bank has been established at the North Devon Infirmary.

There are 123 beds for the chronic sick at the Alexandra Hospital.

At Braunton Nursing Home there are 4 beds for sick persons.

Laboratory Facilities

The Main Laboratory is situated at 7, Dix's Field, Exeter, and Dr. Moore is the Director. It is completely installed with the necessary equipment for bacteriological examinations of all kinds. Its diagnostic and consultative services are available for all patients. Bacteriological examinations of drinking water and milk are also carried out.

The new Pathological Laboratory is now open at the former Barnstaple and North Devon Dispensary building with a full-time Pathologist and Technical Staff to meet the needs of the whole North Devon Area.

Ambulance Services

Under Section 27 of the National Health Service Act, 1946, the Local Health Authority (i.e. the Devon County Council) is responsible for the provision of an Ambulance Service, and the Devon Health Committee have arranged for this to be provided through the agency of the St. John Ambulance Association. The Brigade serves Barnstaple Borough and the District around, and the Headquarters are in Commercial Road, Barnstaple. The staff consists of 3 paid members (full time), 20 men volunteers, and 14 volunteer nurses. The Hospital car service, also under the Devon County Council, is available upon

application to the Hospital, and the Ambulance Service is empowered to hire cars in urgent cases when the Ambulance is not necessary.

Immunization against Diphtheria

During the year 263 children received primary injections; 337 children received reinforcing injections.

Professional Nursing in the Homes

In the Barnstaple Rural District Area there are two Health Visitors and twenty-three Nurses.

Home Helps Scheme

This scheme was started two years ago, and is run by the W.V.S. for the Devon County Council. It covers Barnstaple Borough and Rural Areas wherever transport is available, and the scheme is directed by Mrs. Hughes. There are 36 Home Helps, and 200 cases were dealt with in 1951 as compared with 24 Home Helps and 69 cases in 1950. Any case recommended by a Doctor, Health Visitor or District Nurse is entitled to a Home Help. The Home Helps do any work in the house normally done by the housewife. Twelve old people now living by themselves are now being looked after by the Home Helps who would otherwise have to go to Hospital. During the year 1951 twelve maternity cases have been rendered assistance in their homes by House Helps.

Disinfection of Infected Bedding and Clothing

By an arrangement with the Barnstaple Town Council all infected bedding and clothing can be disinfected in their steam disinfectors.

Gentlemen,

I beg to present my sixth Annual Report of work carried out during 1951.

General.

The area of your district is 129,346 acres with a population of 23,150.

Agriculture, and catering for summer visitors are the two main industries of the area.

The number of visitors bringing their own caravans, or preferring to spend their holidays in caravans rather than in the Hotels and Boarding Houses which abound in the area, have created a new problem.

The County Planning Authority is now giving earnest attention to the proved need for additional camping and caravan sites, and the fact that large scale caravanning has come to stay must be accepted.

This influx can be an economic advantage to the area provided sufficient control is exercised and selection of sites is made with proper regard to amenities, and that essential services are available.

Unfortunately many owners are allowing their land to be used for the reception of caravans for a period of 28 days without obtaining any prior approval. This is permitted by the provisions of the Town and Country Planning Act, 1947, but it is such sites that cause trouble from a public health point of view.

The authorised camping or caravan sites have as a whole been very well conducted during the past year, and owners have always been ready to co-operate with my department.

Many of the villages are still, and will be for many years, without satisfactory water or sewerage schemes.

The North Devon Water Board have made steady progress during the year with the provision of piped water supplies. The villages of Croyde and Georgeham were supplied during the year and work proceeded steadily on the Wistland Pound Reservoir.

Contracts Nos. 1 and 2 of the South Bank Sewerage Scheme were completed, and it is hoped to have a starting date for No. 3 shortly. This will allow for the provision of the Fremington Pumping Station, mains in Fremington and Yelland, and the construction of the Works at East Yelland.

A serious chokeage occurred in the sewer at Instow in November. On investigation it was found that the sewer, which is 16 ft. deep and laid in running sand and approximately 8 ft. below high water mark, was choked by a piece of earthenware broken from the top of one of the pipes. This defect was remedied, but early attention is required to both the sewer and outfall.

A scheme is now in course of preparation for the pumping of the sewage to the East Yelland Works, which will obviate the necessity of expenditure on the existing outfall. This proposal,

if adopted, will also provide facilities for the provision of water carriage drainage at the R.E.M.E. Camp, a necessity which is long overdue.

Schemes are also in hand for (1) Hele Manor, (2) West Down, (3) Landkey, (4) Braunton, Saunton, Heanton, Wrafton, Chivenor and Chivenor Aerodrome with Works in Braunton Marshes, and (5) Bishop's Tawton.

It cannot be impressed too forcibly on the Council that the provision of the before-mentioned schemes and the several smaller village schemes which are necessary and will be embarked upon when the work in hand is complete, will lay a heavy financial burden on the area. This burden will no doubt be eased by Grant Aid, but the Council must be prepared for a considerable increase in staff and possibly re-organisation of departments, and a considerable annual outlay to meet the supervision and maintenance costs which will be inevitable with such large sewerage undertakings.

The British Electricity Authority is erecting a Power Station at East Yelland, and this undertaking, plus the considerable amount of Civil Engineering work now in progress, has caused a drain on labour resources, making it extremely difficult to secure sufficient labour for the Council's Housing programme.

The Housing programme has claimed much attention during the year. 45 houses were completed and at the end of the year 46 were in hand. 23 licences were issued for the erection of private houses.

Generally the year has been one of steady progress, despite labour and material shortages.

It has been found that the public are only too anxious to co-operate, and rarely has it been necessary to have recourse to statutory action in order to secure compliance with the various Acts and Orders.

FACTORIES ACT, 1937—PART 1 OF THE ACT.
