To the Chairman and Members of the Rural District Council of Gainsborough.

Sir, Madam, and Gentlemen,

Annual Report.

I beg to lay before you herewith my Annual Report for 1914, as to the Health and Sanitary Conditions of your District, together with Tables of Births and Deaths registered, the prescribed forms of cases of Infectious Diseases, and the special Tables as to Infantile Mortality, &c., tabulated as required by the Local Government Board, and the Administration of the Factories and Workshops Act, 1901.

There have been no outstanding features in the way of Epidemics or sanitary changes.

The social conditions of the people are similar to those of any other rural community and their pursuits are agricultural.

The population is about as before and the accommodation for the people fairly adequate, and taken on the whole satisfactory. There is no overcrowding. Water Supply. The water supply is as before.

Sewerage Disposal.

The arrangements for the disposal are fairly adequate, very little is carried by water, the greater part being disposed of on the land.

Scavenging Sewerage. Through most of the District the house refuse is burnt or thrown into ash pits which are cleared out periodically.

A large number of drains have been examined and repairs done where necessary.

Some new sewers laid, but no big system of sewerage has been dealt with this year.

Considerable improvements have been carried out on the Thonock and Somerby Estates in the matter of cottage bedrooms heightened and enlarged and new out offices built.

Nineteen life buoys and seven sets of grappling irons have been purchased and fixed in several of the Trentside villages.

New Houses.

Plans for 13 new houses were passed during the year and additions to four others, and one school.

11 Canal Boats inspected and all found satisfactory.

12 houses disinfected and one school, and the smallpox hospital before the military authorities took it over.

Nuisances Abated.

All nuisances abated on their being pointed out to the Authorities.

No complaints or defects found.

Schools.

The Schools in the District have been inspected and found satisfactory.

The health of the Scholars is well looked after by the teachers, and a careful look out was kept for symptoms of infectious diseases.

Where a case of infectious disease occurs all the children from that house are excluded for the regulation time. If the attendance drops to 50 per cent. the schools are closed by the school Medical Officer on educational grounds.

FOOD.

(a) Milk The milk supply in the District is plentiful. It is produced in the District and under favourable conditions.

The cowsheds registered in the District number 32, these have all been inspected and found in good order.

The cows are well kept.

(b) Meat There are no registered slaughterhouses in the District; those which are in use have been inspected and found in good order, with free ventilation and sufficient drainage.

None of the meat has been condemned for tuberculosis.


Arrangements are made with the Urban Council by which beds are reserved in the Isolation Hospital for the use of the Rural Council.

The Rural Council possess an Isolation Hospital for smallpox eases. This has not been used.

NOTIFIABLE DISEASES.

The compulsory notifiable diseases include Smallpox, Enteric Fever, Diphtheria, Scarlet Fever, Erysipelas, Puerperal Fever, Cerebro Spinal Meningitis, Poliomyelitis, Pulmonary Tuberculosis.

The only ones which have occurred in the district during 1914, are Enteric Fever, Scarlet Fever, Diphtheria, Erysipelas, Puerperal Fever.

The Stockwith and Wildsworth cases were all mild and I attributed the origin of the disease to Trent water. The case at Marton was doubtful, although a positive widal reaction was obtained before notification, the patient afterwards died from abdominal tuberculosis. The origin of the disease in Blyton was doubtful. There were no sanitary defects in any of the houses.


The Marton case was nursed in the Isolation Hospital.

Nearly half the number of cases occurred in the Village of Upton, they were all mild cases and arose from personal contact. I think this large number was due to a mild case having occurred which was not shewn to the doctor.

One of the cases from Willingham and the one from Knaith Park were admitted to the Isolation Hospital as there were no means of proper Isolation at home.

Non-Notifiable Infectious Diseases. In all cases of notifiable diseases, due precautions are taken as soon as possible. The house being visited and carefully inspected. Disinfectants are supplied and any sanitary defects noted. The patient is isolated as completely as possible and careful instructions given.

In all the districts a supply of disinfectants is kept at one centre so that the distribution may be as rapid as possible.





I am indebted to the officials of your Council and the County M.O.H. for much valuable assistance, especially to the Sanitary Inspector since the outbreak of war.



Notes.—This Table is arranged to show the gross births and deaths in the district, and the births and deaths properly belonging to it with the corresponding rates. For years before 1911 some of the corrections as to transferable deaths probably will not be available. The rates should be calculated per 1000 of the estimated gross population as stated in Col. 2, without the use of the standardising factor for the district given in the Annual Report of the Registrar-General. In a district in which large Public Institutions for the sick or infirm seriously affect the statistics, the rates in Columns 5 and 13 may be calculated on a nett population, obtained by deducting from the estimated gross population the average number of inmates not belonging to the district in such institutions.

*In Column 6 are to be included the whole of the deaths registered during the year as having actually occurred within the district.

In Column 12 is to be entered the number in Column 6, corrected by subtraction of the number in Column 8 and by addition of the number in Column 9. Deaths in Column 10 are to be similarly corrected by subtraction of the deaths under 1, included in the number given in Column 8, and by addition of the deaths under 1 included in the number given in Column 9.

- † The Medical Officer of Health will be able from the returns made to him by the local Registrar of Deaths, as well as from the quarterly lists furnished by the Registrar-General, to fill in Column 8 in accordance with the rule in the next paragraph below. The Registrar-General, either directly or through the County Medical Officer of Health, will supply the Medical Officer of Health with the particulars of deaths to be entered in Column 9; and all such deaths must be included in this Column, unless an error is detected, and its correction has been accepted by the Registrar-General. For Column 4 the Registrar-General will furnish to the Medical Officer of Health a Statement of the number of births needing to be added to or subtracted from the total supplied by the local Registrar.
- the Transferable Deaths" are deaths of persons who, having a fixed or usual residence in England or Wales, die in a district other than that in which they resided. The deaths of persons without fixed or usual residence, e.g., casuals, must not be included in Columns 8 or 9, except in certain instances under 3 (b) below. The Medical Officer of Health will state in Column 8 the number of transferable deaths of "non-residents" which are to be deducted, and will state in Column 9 the number of deaths of "residents" registered outside the district which are to be added in calculating the nett death-rate of his district.

The following special cases arise as to Transferable Deaths:-

- (1) Persons dying in Institutions for the sick or infirm, such as hospitals, lunatic asylums, workhouses, and nursing homes (but not almshouses) must be regarded as residents of the district in which they had a fixed or usual residence at the time of admission. If the person dying in an Institution had no fixed residence at the time of admission, the death is not transferable. If the patient has been directly transferred from one such Institution to another, the death is transferable to the district of residence at the time of admission to the first Institution.
- (2) The deaths of infants born and dying within a year of birth in an Institution to which the mother was admitted for her confinement should be referred to the district of fixed or usual residence of the parent.
- (3) Deaths from Violence are to be referred (a) to the district of residence, under the general rule; (b) if this district is unknown, or the deceased had no fixed abode, to the district where the accident occurred, if known; (c) failing this, to the district where death occurred, if known; and (d) failing this, to the district where the body was found.



NOTES TO TABLE III.

The classification and numbering of Causes of Death are those of the "Short List" on page XXV. of the Manual of the International List of Causes of Death, which should be consulted and followed in all cases of doubt.

Copies of this Manual were distributed to Medical Officers of Health in 1912 by the Registrar-General, and may be purchased either directly or through any bookseller from Wyman & Sons, Ltd., 29, Breams Buildings, Fetter Lane., E.C., price 1/-.

(a) All "Transferable Deaths" of residents, i.e., of persons resident in the District who have died outside it, are to be included with the other deaths in columns 2-10. Transferable deaths of non-residents, i.e., of persons resident elsewhere in England and Wales who have died in the District, are in like manner to be excluded from these columns. For the precise meaning of the term "transferable deaths" see footnote to Table I.

The total deaths in column 2 of Table III. should equal the figures for the year in column 12 of Table I.

- (b) All deaths occurring in institutions for the sick and infirm situated within the district, whether of residents or of non-residents, are to be entered in the last column of Table III
- (c) All deaths certified by registered Medical Practitioners and all Inquest cases are to be classed as "Certified; all other deaths are to be regarded as "Uncertified."
- (d) Exclusive of "Tuberculous Meningitis" (10), but inclusive of Cerebro-spinal Meningitis.
- (e) Title 19 should be used for deaths from Diarrhœa and Enteritis at all ages. (In the "Short List" deaths from Diarrhœa and Enteritis under 2 years are included under Title 19; those at 2 years and over being placed under Title 28.)

- (b) Under Abdominal Tuberculosis are to be included deaths from Tuberculous Peritonitis and Enteritis and from Tabes Mesenterica.
- (c) The total deaths from Congenital Malformations, Premature Birth, Atrophy, Debility and Marasmus, should equal the total in Table III., for ages under 1 year, under the heading Congenital Debility, and Malformation including Premature Birth.

Want of Breast Milk should be included under Atrophy and Debility.

(d) For references to the meaning of any other headings, see notes attached to Table III.

In recording the facts under the various headings of Tables I., II., III. and IV., attention has been given to the notes on the Tables.
