**TO THE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS

Introduction to the Annual Report for 1946.

I beg to submit herewith the report on the Health and Sanitary conditions of your district for the year 1946.

Amongst features worthy of notice, attention is drawn to an increase by 250 in the Population figure compared with that for the year 1945. Increasing population makes problems in every aspect of Public Health Administration, especially Housing, and demands every effort in the direction of Sanitary progress.

The Birth Rate shows a very slight decrease, whilst there is a marked reduction in the Death Rate to the exceptionally low figure of 10.5 per 1,000 of the estimated population. A record is created by the very small Infantile Mortality Rate (the number of deaths of children under one year of age per 1,000 Live Births). This has dropped to 29.1. For all England and Wales the figure is 43. Last year this rate was 42.01 in your District.

No serious outbreaks of Infectious Disease occurred.

It can be said that the health and Sanitary conditions during the period under review compare favourably with other areas throughout the country, and this reflects great credit to the work of my predecessor, Dr. H. B. Willoughby Smith, who held office for thirty-five years.

The year 1946 marks an epoch in the history of your Health Department because of the installation of the first Whole-time Medical Officer of Health, who also serves in a similar capacity for Gainsborough Urban District and the Isle-of-Axholme Rural District, as well as assisting the County Medical Officer by carrying out certain work such as the duties of District Tuberculosis Officer and School Medical Inspector, under the administration of the County Council. This arrangement is in accordance with the County Council's scheme under the Local Government Act, 1933. It is now no longer permissible to appoint, in a part-time capacity, a Medical Officer who is not restricted from engaging in work as a private Medical Practitioner.

In conclusion I wish to convey to you my thanks for the support and kindly consideration which you have given to me in the work of the Public Health Department. I am also grateful for the helpful co-operation received from the Sanitary Inspector, the Water Engineer and the clerical staff.

SECTION B.

GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA.

HOSPITALS AVAILABLE:—

Fever:

Gainsborough Isolation Hospital—provided and maintained by the Urban District Council. Special provision is made by the Lindsey and Lincoln Joint Smallpox Hospital Board for cases of Smallpox.

Tuberculosis:

Branston Hall Sanatorium, Lincoln. Brumby Tuberculosis Hospital, Scunthorpe. Grimsby Corporation Sanatorium. Also others outside the County.

Maternity:

Maternity Home, Gainsborough—provided and maintained by Lindsey County Council.

Mental:

Bracebridge Mental Hospital and Harmston Hall Colony, Lincoln.

General:

Medical and Surgical cases can be admitted to the John Coupland Hospital, Gainsborough. For eligible cases there are also available the Reynard Hospital at Willingham-by-Stow, the Lincoln County Hospital, Scunthorpe War Memorial Hospital. Louth County Infirmary is a modern Municipal Hospital maintained by Lindsey County Council. Brigg Infirmary is under the same Authority.

DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE.

No new works nor additions were made during the year, but a scheme is in preparation for the whole of the District.

OFFENSIVE TRADES.

There is only one in the area. There were no contraventions of regulations.

FACTORIES ACT, 1937.

Inspections were made by the Sanitary Inspector. No defects were reported.

SECTION D.

HOUSING.

1,105 houses were inspected during 1946.

Four houses were erected privately.

With the present trend of population towards an increasing percentage of old people, there will arise in future housing schemes, the need for consideration of provision of accommodation for the aged. This might be kept in mind when building resources are less limited.

The 16 registered Slaughterhouses in the District have been superseded by the use of the Public Abattoir in Gainsborough.
