TO THE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE GAINSBOROUGH RURAL DISTRICT COUNCIL.

31st July, 1954.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting my Annual Report for the year 1953, which contains vital statistics and other information relating to the state of health and the health services of the district.

The population, which now includes non-civilians, has increased by 350 to 12,990. It is worth noticing the low Death Rate and the high Birth Rate. Also the Infantile Mortality Rate (28.8) shows a large fall. The incidence of Infectious Diseases was slight and the majority were measles cases. It is very pleasing that, again, we had no case of Diphtheria, Poliomyelitis nor any other serious condition during the year.

In conclusion, I wish to thank all Councillors for their interest in health matters. My thanks are also due to Mr. Donson and to Mr. Donelly and Mr. Burn (Water Engineer) and their staffs for their helpful collaboration at all times.

The district is entirely rural in character and the sole industry is agriculture. It surrounds the Urban District of Gainsborough on three sides. The Northern and Southern extremities are seventeen miles apart and the greatest width is eleven miles. Part of the Parishes of Lea and Morton, adjoining Gainsborough town, are semi-residential. There are thirty-seven parishes and the Council consists of thirty-two Councillors.

SECTION C.

WATER SUPPLY.

- (i) The water supplied by the Council is derived from the following sources and during the year was satisfactory both in quality and quantity:—
 - (1) Council's own boreholes at Glentham and Caenby, west of the Lincolnshire Wolds.
 - (2) Bulk supply from Lincoln Corporation, the supply being derived from boreholes at Elkesley in Nottinghamshire.
 - (3) Bulk supply from Glanford Brigg Rural District Council for the hamlet of Susworth only (i.e., 35 properties in the Scotter Parish).
 - (4) Bulk supply from Welton Rural District Council, the supply being derived from boreholes at Welton. This supply assists the Cliff Area.
 - (5) Bulk supply from Caistor Rural District Council, the supply being derived from springs in that District. Water is taken only when required and is on a reciprocal basis.
- (ii) Samples for Bacteriological and Chemical examinations were taken periodically and the results were satisfactory.
- (iii) The water has no plumbo-solvent action.
- (iv) No action was necessary in respect of any form of contamination as no adverse reports were received.
 In all cases where water is drawn from wells, water samples

are taken, and when found to be unsuitable for drinking purposes statutory notices are served. When property owners are informed that the water is unfit, it often happens that the work is carried out without the service of a statutory notice being necessary.

SEWERAGE AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL.

Blyton, Scotter and Scotton. Since my last report, all connections to houses on line of the new sewers have been completed, and 166 earth closets have been converted to water closets. Grants have been made in respect of these conversions under Section 47 of the Public Health Act, 1936.

Morton Scheme is now in a state of completion and in the course of a month or so, the works will be completed and the necessary house connections made.

Knaith Scheme is also in a state of completion and I have no doubt that house connections will commence immediately.

Lea Scheme. I have been concerned that no commencement has been made on this scheme, but the Ministry have now given sanction for a commencement to be made in the early Spring of 1955.

Schemes for Gate Burton, Marton, Sturton-by-Stow, Stow and Willingham are being prepared.

REFUSE COLLECTION, SCAVENGING.

This has been carried out satisfactorily during the past year, and refuse tips have been regularly treated for rat infestations.
