Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in submitting my Annual Report for the year 1968 on the health and sanitary circumstances of your district.

This will be my last Annual Report and I should like to take the opportunity of thanking all the staff of the Council, both present and past, for the co-operation I have so readily received during my time as Medical Officer of Health.

I should also like to thank all the members of the Council and the Chairman of the Public Health Committee for the support that they have given to me. I have always felt that my Committee were behind me and this knowledge made one's work so much easier. It is with regret that I leave the Council's employment and I should like to wish the members of the Council every success in the future.

### Vital Statistics

I note that the estimated population for mid-1968 was 12,900 and that for the previous year it was 13,500. During the year there has been a natural increase of births over deaths of 94. It would mean that there seems to have been an exodus of 690 unless the area has lost a large village somewhere. It has not been possible to obtain a satisfactory explanation from the registrar general as to why we have been attributed a population this year that is 600 down.

Coronary deaths is once again a leading cause of death and one notes that of all the cancers, cancer of the lung is responsible for the greatest number of deaths. One hopes that some day the association of smoking with these two diseases may be appreciated by the public.

This year you will notice the absence of statistics relating to the health of school children. The reason for this is that the County Council have decided that these figures should not be made available to local district councils as it raises administrative difficulties.

### STAFF

I am grateful to many of my colleagues for the information concerning their department included in this report. I should particularly like to think Dr. C. D. Cormac, County Medical Officer of Health, Lindsey County Council, and his staff, for making available the information relating to the County Health Department. I also thank Mr. Archer, the Surveyor, and Chief Public Health Inspector, who got together quite a considerable amount of the details contained in this report.

Finally, I wish to record my thanks to the staff of my own department, Mr. F. Archer, Surveyor and Chief Public Health Inspector, Mr. D. G. Clixby, Assistant Surveyor and Public Health Inspector, and the clerical staff for their loyal cooperation and assistance.

### DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE

Fifty-two earth closets were replaced by water closets in private houses, during the year. These works were carried out with the aid of Improvement and Conversion Grants.

Sewers were laid in Glentworth, Hemswell, Harpswell, Fillingham. It is hoped that the house connections will be made in the middle of 1969 and the scheme completed towards the end of 1969.

The sewage disposal works is under construction at Glentworth. Schemes have been approved on principle for Willoughton, Blyborough, Grayingham, Kettleborough, Laughterton, Newtonon-Trent, Torksey and Torksey Lock.

### SWIMMING POOLS

There are two private swimming pools in the area, one at a holiday camp and the other at a secondary school. The one at the camp is used once a week by the pupils of the local village primary school. No adverse reports were received from the County Health Officer who takes samples of the pools used by school children.

### REFUSE COLLECTION

Refuse was collected from 4,523 properties in the district. There has been an improvement in this service; the period of collection is now around 7-9 days.

The refuse is disposed of by controlled tipping on a tip we share with the Gainsborough Urban District Council. We are very fortunate to have this facility. Suitable tipping areas are not easy to find and are most likely to become very scarce in the future. Then different methods of refuse disposal will have to be found.

### DISINFECTION AND DISINFESTATION

No houses were disinfected or disinfested during the year.

### KNACKERS' YARD

Routine inspections of the only knackers' yard in the area have been carried out.

### OFFICES, SHOPS AND RAILWAY PREMISES ACT, 1963

Twenty-three premises are licensed and during the year 25 visits were made to these premises. Eighteen defects were found and remedied.

### PREVENTION OF DAMAGE BY PESTS ACT, 1949

The Council employs one full time Rodent Operator, and the handyman is available to assist him during the busy winter season.

It was noted during the year that there was a great increase in the number of rats in the district. Difficulties were experienced in eradicating rats from a number of houses where infestations were found to be in roof spaces.


