Comparability Factor. The variety and magnitude of Local population movements and the uneven incidence of civilian war deaths have together combined to frustrate the attempt to secure comparability between local death rates by the use of Area Comparability Factors, and the preparation and issue of such factors are being suspended under present conditions.

Chief Causes of Death:— These included 17 from Cancer, 35 from Heart disease, 5 from Tuberculosis of the Respiratory system.

A detailed list of Causes of Death is printed in this report.

Infantile Mortality:—The Death Rate of Infants under one year of age per 1 000 live births shows a decrease on last year. The Rate for England and Wales for 1946 was 43.

PREVALENCE OF AND CONTROL OVER INFECTIOUS AND OTHER DISEASES.

I have great pleasure in stating that no cases of Diphtheria were reported during 1946. I attribute this substantial decrease of the incidence of this disease to the fact that more parents are taking advantage of the scheme to have their children immunised.

I should again like to stress the advantages to be obtained by having children immunised.

Small Pox: No cases of Small Pox were reported in the Council's area.

Measles: There was a small amount of measles during the past year, but no deaths resulted.

Whooping Cough: No cases of Whooping Cough were reported during 1946.

Summer Diarrhæa: There was a small amount of this disease during 1946, and two deaths resulted.

Influenza: There was the usual amount of Influenza during the past year, but no epidemic fortunately no deaths resulted.

Tuberculosis: 10 new cases of Tuberculosis were reported during the year 7 Pulmonary and 3 Non-Pulmonary. There were 5 deaths from Pulmonary Tuberculosis and 1 from Non-Pulmonary Tuberculosis.

Ophthalmia Neonatorum: No cases reported.

GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA.

Public Health Officers of the Local Authority.
The Staff consists of the Medical Officer of Health and the Sanitary Inspector. The Medical Officer of Health Is a part-time Officer. One-half of the salaries of these officials is recovered from the County Council. The Local Authority provides clerical assistance.

CHILD WELFARE CENTRES.

These Centres are under the control of the W.R.C.C. The mothers attend regularly and derive particular benefit from the advice given by the staff regarding the Feeding and Welfare of their infants.

School Children are also seen at these Centres

where minor ailments are given attention.

SCABIES.

In addition to the treatment received at the Child Welfare Centres, facilities are now provided for the treatment of the more persistent cases at the Castleford Scabies Clinic.

LABORATORY FACILITIES.

Bacteriological examinations are undertaken by the West Riding County Council Analysts Department by arrangement with the County.

AMBULANCE FACILITIES.

(a) For Infectious Diseases.

We have an arrangement with the Tadcaster Rural District Council for the use of their Ambulance, which is kept at the Isolation Hospital, Garforth.

(b) For Non-Infectious, Maternity and Accident Cases.

The Council own a motor ambulance for these cases at a fixed charge.

Kippax St. John & Miners' Welfare also serve the district with a modern well-equipped ambulance.

PROFESSIONAL NURSING IN THE HOME.

(a) General.

The Garforth District Nursing Association continues to do useful work in the area. The services of a qualified District Nurse are available in general and midwifery nursing.

There is no District Nursing Association in Kippax or Allerton Bywater. A need for a District Nurse is often felt.

County Council midwives are in practice over the whole area.

(b) Infectious Diseases. None.

HOSPITALS.

For Infectious diseases we have an arrangement with the Tadcaster Rural District for the use of the Isolation Hospital at Garforth Cliff at a fixed charge.

Mortuaries.

The Council owns two Mortuaries: one is situated adjoining the Councils premises in Garforth, and the other adjoining the Council Offices in Allerton Bywater.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

Water: The Water is purchased in bulk from the Leeds corporation: it is of a exceptionally high degree of purity. There has been an adequate and constant supply throughout the year.

DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE.

The majority of the drainage is by piped sewers,

discharging into the sewage disposal works.

The remaining houres in the area unconnected to our disposal works are situated in the outlying parts of the district.
