I have the honour to present my twentieth annual report for the year of 1925.

NATURAL & SOCIAL CONDITIONS OF THE AREA.

Arer about 1000 cores.

Population estimated for 1925. 2778. Census 1921. 2981
The District is on a high level and somethet scattered, being divided into 8 main parts. Gildersome. Gildersome St. & St. Fernards.
The soil is of a clayey nature a the subsoil damp.

Number of inhabited houses about 770.
" families & separate occupiers about the same.

Reterble Value & 14845.

Sum represented by a penny rate & 61-17-1.
The inhabitants are chiefly occupied in the Manufacture of Vollen and Consted goods, Coal Mining and agriculture with one fairly large Foundry in the District.
They have no special importance as regards the public health.

DEATHS. were 42 viz: 23 male & 19 Female. Death Rate 15.11.

6 Deaths here transferred to the District and 1 away. Corrected number 47. a corrected Death Rate 16.91.

Lest year the rate was 15.26 & corrected rate 17.74.

Infentile Mortelity Rate was 43.47 per 1000 births.

The ammount of Poor Law Relief in the District is not excessive. The large Mospitals in the neighbourhood are freely used usually Leads (Ceneral Infirmery, Leads Public Dispansery & the Leads Rospital for Romen & Childron.

There have been no specially noteworthy causes of sickness, except Rhoumatism, which is prevalent on account of the nature of the subsoil,

end the usual epidemics of Influenza.

CEMERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES IN THE AREA

There are no Mospitals in the area. The Mospitals eveilable ere:(1) Tuberculosis- The Banatoria provided by the L.R.C.C. (2) Maternity-Lecds & Morley. (3) Children-Leeds. (4) Fever- The Oakwell Joint Mospital, situated in Birstell, of which your district is one of the subscribing authorities (5) Gmall Pox ditto (6) Other- in Leeds. Bradford & Batley.

There is no institutional provision for unmarried mothers, illigitimate infants, or homeless children in the spec.

Ambulance facilities (a) Infectious asset /mbulance from Ochwell Joint Rospital (b) Accident at Leeds & norloy /mbulances.

There are no Clinics or treatment centres in the area.

Public Health Officers of the local /ut ority, consist of hedical Officer of Health (part time) Senitary inspector (part time) and Surveyor who supervises outfall tooks, emptying of closets and Ashpits

Professional Mursing in the home is provided by the Local Mursing Association for noninfectious cases only. This association is managed and financed privately, and is not subsidised by local Authority or County Council, except for attendance at the Cahools.

Mid ives There is still I Midwife resident in the area and another from a neighbouring area. There is no subsidy. Chemical Nork. Wone is done in the District. The work of the local authority is not related to Modical dervices of National Realth Insurance, Voluntary Tospitals, or Poor Law.

SANFFARY CIRCUISTANCES OF THE AREA.

WATER is Supplied to the District by the Corporation of Bradford and is usually sufficient in quantity, of average quality, except whom occasional disturbances have been dealt with, when the water has been dirty for swhile. It is supplied direct to nearly all the houses in the area. It has not been plumbo solvent Rivers & Streems. There are nore in the area, except small beeks, which have sometimes been polluted by waste from

DRAINAGE & SEWBRAGE. The greater part of the District is connected to the Main sower. The Sewage disposal works are dilapidated and it has been recognized for some time that these require bringing up to date. Schemes have been formulated and an anguiry held, but up to the present none has been passed.

CLOSET ACCOMMODATION. The usual closet in the district has been the privy with the open or closed midden and I have on various occasions mentioned the urgent necessity for the conversion of those to the later Closet Type- The water for which purpose is supplied by the Courcil free of cost. There are at present 76 with open Middens. 86 with covered Middens. 3 Pail Closets and 178 Water Closets.

This is carried out by the Council, and the arrangements SCAVENGING. ero usually efficient, although it is obvious some delays accur and this then provides a menses to the health of the community, especially during the summer months.

SANITARY INSPECTION OF AREA. The number of inspections made by the

moke eletement. The number of smoke observations taken was 45. No legal notices or summonses were issued.

There are no local resdings of atrosphoric impurity.

PREMISES & OCCUPATIONS CONTROLLED BY BYE LAWS. Common Lodging Fouses wil. Tents, Vens & Sheds. 6. Offensive Trades. 2:- (1) Fish Most Forks & (2) Cerbonising Lorks. In connection with the former of these two,s prosecution was instituted, and the owners agreed to a fine being imposed. As a result of this the Muisances has been lessened but not eltogether shated.

SCHOOLS. There are 3 Public Clomentery Schools in the area. The scrittery condition and water supply are good. The Schools are visited periodically, and especially at the beginning and during the prevalence of any infectious disease. The Schools were closed for a period of 2 wooks during the first querter on account of an epidemic of Influenza. the children showing prolonged dobility & being unfit on returning to School.

Housing. The inspector appointed under the set is the Senitary Inspector, but he is not receiving extra salary for this, practically no report can be obtained from him.

The general character of the Houses, if fair, some being back to back. They are mostly of the working class, & clumped together, usualy without gerdens. The number in the eres is about 770. There is a general shortage of good class houses. A shhewe for the amelioration of this condition is now being carried out, but is not completed. The change in population is in a downward direction. There is some overcrowding but not much. The usual defects found are chiefly dampress, and in places in ttention on secount of the owners being unable to afford extensive elterations. ster is usually adequate, and closet accommodation insequate. Owners in several instances have been requested to make the closets more efficient and senitary. I believe the Bye- Laws under this heading require some elteration or addition.

MILK SUPPLY. The whole of the milk consumed is produced within the cree and is holesome. Some is taken out of the arcs to Horley, Leeds &c. Ho liceness have been granted for special grades of milk, & no samples have been taken. Number of Cowkeepers & retailers 14. Retailers only 3. Num

MRAT. No special errangements locally for inspection of carcesos. The slaughter houses are 2 and are satisfactory.

Scholouses ere 4 in number- none being underground.

INPECTIOUS DISEASE. The only notifieble infectious disease that needs comment is Diphtheris. During the past few wears there has been an occasional rum of a few cases in the area and this has probably been recounted for by the bad state of some of the closets and sampits. Intitation has been drawn to this defect on various occasions. Diphtheric actions is not supplied by the Council. Return cases of Saarlat Pover han Influence is prevalent. Pathological & Backriological specimens are sent to Wakefield for accountation then necessary. The Schick & Dick tests have not been used. Vaccinations have not been performed by the council as such, but in his apparity as Public Vaccinator. Income the non-notifiable infectious diseases, Influence & whooping Cough leve been prevalent, and there have been a few mild cases of messles. In these cases the Schools are visited, and lists of children absent on this account are received from the head teachers.

Disinfection of the premises & clothing is carried out in all cases of motifiable infectious disease which require it.
