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Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present my twentieth annual report for the year of 1925.

NATURAL & SOCIAL CONDITIONS OF THE AREA.

Area about 1000 acres.

Population estimated for 1925. 2778. Census 1921. 2981

The District is on a high level and somewhat scattered, being divided into 3 main parts. Gildersome, Gildersome St. & St. Bernards.

The soil is of a clayey nature & the subsoil damp.

Number of inhabited houses about 770.

" " families & separate occupiers about the same.

Rateable Value £ 14845.

Sum represented by a penny rate £ 61-17-1.

The inhabitants are chiefly occupied in the Manufacture of Wollen and Worsted goods, Coal Mining and agriculture with one fairly large Foundry in the District.

They have no special importance as regards the public health.

VITAL STATISTICS.

BIRTHS. were 43 viz:- 23 Male & 20 Female. Birth Rate 15.47.

5 Births, 2 Male & 3 Female were transferred to the District, giving a total of 48. & corrected Birth Rate 16.55.

There was no record of any illegitimate birth.

Rate last year was 8.87. Corrected Rate 9.94.

Rate for England & Wales was 10.3.

DEATHS. were 42 viz:- 23 Male & 19 Female. Death Rate 15.11.

6 Deaths were transferred to the District and 1 away. Corrected number 47. & corrected Death Rate 16.91.

Government statistics were 46. Rate 16.55.

Last year the rate was 15.26 & corrected rate 17.74.

Rate for England & Wales (1925) was 12.2.

17. 13 of these being over 70.

Infantile Mortality Rate was 43.47 per 1000 births.

The amount of Poor Law Relief in the District is not excessive. The large Hospitals in the neighbourhood are freely used usually Leeds General Infirmary, Leeds Public Dispensary & the Leeds Hospital for Women & Children.

There have been no specially noteworthy causes of sickness, except Rheumatism, which is prevalent on account of the nature of the subsoil, and the usual epidemics of Influenza.

GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES IN THE AREA.

There are no Hospitals in the area. The Hospitals available are:-

(1) Tuberculosis- The Sanatoria provided by the L.R.C.C. (2) Maternity- Leeds & Morley. (3) Children- Leeds. (4) Fever- The Oakwell Joint Hospital, situated in Birstall, of which your district is one of the subscribing authorities (5) Small Pox ditto (6) Other- in Leeds, Bradford & Batley.

There is no institutional provision for unmarried mothers, illegitimate infants, or homeless children in the area.

Ambulance facilities (a) Infectious cases- Ambulance from Oakwell Joint Hospital (b) Accident & Leeds & Morley Ambulances.

There are no Clinics or treatment centres in the area.

Public Health Officers of the local Authority, consist of- Medical Officer of Health (part time) Sanitary Inspector (part time) and

Surveyor who supervises outfall works, emptying of closets and Ashpits & drain testing.

Professional Nursing in the home is provided by the Local Nursing Association for noninfectious cases only. This association is managed and financed privately, and is not subsidised by local Authority or County Council, except for attendance at the Schools.

Midwives- There is still 1 Midwife resident in the area and another from a neighbouring area. There is no subsidy. Chemical Work. None is done in the District. The work of the local authority is not related to Medical services of National Health Insurance, Voluntary Hospitals, or Poor Law.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

WATER is Supplied to the District by the Corporation of Bradford and is usually sufficient in quantity, of average quality, except when occasional disturbances have been dealt with, when the water has been dirty for a while. It is supplied direct to nearly all the houses in the area. It has not been plumb solvent Rivers & Streams. There are none in the area, except small becks, which have sometimes been polluted by waste from Mills.

DRAINAGE & SEWERAGE. The greater part of the District is connected to the Main sewer. The Sewage disposal works are dilapidated and it has been recognized for some time that these require bringing up to date. Schemes have been formulated and an enquiry held, but up to the present none has been passed.

CLOSET ACCOMMODATION. The usual closet in the district has been the privy with the open or closed midden and I have on various occasions mentioned the urgent necessity for the conversion of these to the Water Closet Type- The water for which purpose is supplied by the Council free of cost. There are at present 76 with open middens. 86 with covered middens. 3 Pail Closets and 178 Water Closets.

SCAVENGING. This is carried out by the Council, and the arrangements are usually efficient, although it is obvious some delays occur and this then provides a menace to the health of the community, especially during the summer months.

SANITARY INSPECTION OF AREA. The number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspector was 31.

Number of notices served- Informal 31. Statutory. nil.

The result of these according to the inspector was that the 31 nuisances were abated.

Smoke abatement. The number of smoke observations taken was 45.

No legal notices or summonses were issued.

There are no local readings of atmospheric impurity.

PREMISES & OCCUPATIONS CONTROLLED BY BYE LAWS. Common Lodging Houses nil. Tents, Vans & Sheds. 6. Offensive Trades. 2:- (1) Fish Meal Works & (2) Carbonising Works. In connection with the former of these two, prosecution was instituted, and the owners agreed to a fine being imposed. As a result of this the Nuisances has been lessened but not altogether abated.

SCHOOLS. There are 3 Public Elementary Schools in the area. The sanitary condition and water supply are good. The Schools are visited periodically, and especially at the beginning and during the prevalence of any infectious disease. The Schools were closed for a period of 2 weeks during the first quarter on account of an epidemic of Influenza- the children showing prolonged debility & being unfit on returning to School.

HOUSING. The inspector appointed under the act is the Sanitary Inspector, but he is not receiving extra salary for this, practically no report can be obtained from him.

The general character of the Houses, if fair, some being back to back. They are mostly of the working class, & clumped together, usually without gardens. The number in the area is about 770. There is a general shortage of good class houses. A scheme for the amelioration of this condition is now being carried out, but is not completed. The change in population is in a downward direction. There is some overcrowding but not much. The usual defects found are chiefly dampness, and in places inattention on account of the owners being unable to afford extensive alterations. Water is usually adequate, and closet accommodation inadequate. Owners in several instances have been requested to make the closets more efficient and sanitary. I believe the Bye- Laws under this heading require some alteration or addition.

There is no specially unhealthy area beyond what has been mentioned. Number of Houses completed during the year. 1. No. of houses inspected for defects. 7. Formal notices given. 7. Complied with. 7. Number of closing orders. nil.

MILK SUPPLY. The whole of the milk consumed is produced within the area and is wholesome. Some is taken out of the area to Morley, Leeds &c. No licences have been granted for special grades of milk, & no samples have been taken. Number of Cowkeepers & retailers 14. Retailers only 3. Number of Cowsheds 14. No. of milk cows kept about 120. The cowsheds are fair in character. There are however deficiencies as regards light, drainage & general cleanliness. The cows are habitually turned out for a portion of the day during the warmer months, & during this time, white-washings of the premises are carried out.

MEAT. No special arrangements locally for inspection of carcasses. The slaughter houses are 2 and are satisfactory.

Scabhouses are 4 in number- none being underground.

INFECTIOUS DISEASE. The only notifiable infectious disease that needs comment is Diphtheria. During the past few years there has been an occasional run of a few cases in the area and this has probably been accounted for by the bad state of some of the closets and ashpits. Attention has been drawn to this defect on various occasions. Diphtheric Antitoxin is not supplied by the Council. Return cases of Scarlet Fever have not been found. Pneumonia cases appear during the colder months, & when Influenza is prevalent. Pathological & Bacteriological specimens are sent to Wakefield for examination when necessary. The Schick & Dick tests have not been used. Vaccinations have not been performed by the M.O.H. as such, but in his capacity as Public Vaccinator.

Among the non-notifiable infectious diseases, Influenza & Whooping Cough have been prevalent, and there have been a few mild cases of measles. In these cases the Schools are visited, and lists of children absent on this account are received from the head teachers. Disinfection of the premises & clothing is carried out in all cases of Notifiable infectious disease which require it.
