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
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

To the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors of the Borough of Gillingham.

Ladies and Gentlemen;

I have the honour to submit a short report for the year ending 31st December, 1941. It has been possible to carry on the usual activities of the Department reasonably well, but Civil Defence duties have occupied not a small proportion of the staff's time.

The death rate was lower and the birth rate higher than in the previous year. The Infant mortality rate was 44 compared with 47. The tuberculosis death rate was slightly lower, but higher than in pre-war years.

The incidence of scarlet fever and diphtheria was considerably below the average of recent years. The diphtheria immunisation clinics were well attended; 1,988 children received a full course of treatment, a figure almost three times greater than in any previous year. It is estimated that approximately 40% of children under 5 years and 50% of those aged 5 to 15 years are now protected.

I wish to put on record my indebtedness to the staff for the support I have received from them.

Diphtheria:

Ten cases were notified, but five were found to be suffering from tonsilitis.

Immunisation against Diphtheria:

During the year 1,988 children were immunised, of whom 847 were under five years of age.

Two injections of A.P.T. are given at monthly intervals. Under eight years of age the dosage employed was 0.2 cc. and 0.5 cc., and over eight years 0.1 cc. and 0.3 cc.

Cerebro-Spinal Fever:

Ten patients were notified, but one was incorrectly diagnosed. Three cases proved fatal.

Enteric Fever:

Four cases were notified, and all recovered. Bacteriologically they proved to be cases of Paratyphoid B. infection.

To the Chairman and Members of the Education Committe.

I herewith submit the annual report on the work of the school medical department for the year ended 31st December, 1941.

The activities of the department, which were much disorganised during 1940, have functioned more normally during the twelve months under review. Many evacuated children have returned and during the year school attendance was made compulsory again.

There is no evidence that the physical or mental welfare of the children has been prejudicially affected by war conditions. Ninety-seven per cent were classified as of 'excellent' or 'normal' nutrition. At the end of the year seventy-seven per cent were receiving milk in school and approximately thirty-five per cent a mid-day meal.

There has been no increase in uncleanliness. Scabies cases were fewer than in the previous year, but the disease is more widespread than in pre-war years.

I am indebted to Mr. Young, my Chief Clerk, for furnishing all figures required by the Board.

SCHOOL MEALS

Meals are provided for school children at Rainham Junior Council School canteen and at four British Restaurants, three of which are in school premises.

During January 1942, the average number of school children receiving meals in any one week was 1750, of which 680 were served at the Rainham school canteen.
