

To the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors.

Mr. Mayor, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to submit my annual report for the year ending 31st December, 1948.

The birth rate was 19 per 1,000 of the estimated population compared with 23 per 1,000 in the previous year. As this is the lowest rate since 1943 it would appear that the high rates recorded in the immediate post-war years are unlikely to recur.

The infantile mortality reached the record low figure of 28 per 1,000 live Lirths. Of the 35 infants who died under one year, more than half succumbed in the first week of life.

### Housing

Due to the shortage of houses it is impossible to demolish many of those beyond repair but it was found necessary to make 12 Demolition Orders. The number demolished during the year as the result of formal action under the Housing Act during this and previous years was 20.

### National Health Service Act, 1946

Under this Act which came into force on 5th July, the greatest part of the health functions of the Corporation were transferred to the County Council viz., maternity and child welfare services, domestic midwifery service, provision of home helps, day nurseries, ambulances and protection against diphtheria.

Many of the statistics recorded in the Report refer therefore to the first six months only of the year.

Many of the Staff became transferred officers under the Act including Dr. Dunlop, Deputy Medical Officer of Health who now gives 90 per cent. of her time to County duties

I am indebted to Mr. Pett, Chief Clerk for compiling the figures in the Report and also to Mr. Hedgecock, Chief Sanitary Inspector for supplying much useful information.

I acknowledge with gratitude the assistance I have received from all members of the Staff.
