Since the War, up to the end of 1958 a total of 286 new dwellings have been completed by the Local Authority, 147 by Private Enterprise and 36 units of accommodation have been provided by conversion or adaptation making provision for 469 families in all.

Up to the end of 1958 action has been taken under Section 16 of the Housing Act, 1957, in respect of sixty-six houses, and in all cases the Owners gave written undertakings in accordance with the Act not to relet them for human habitation when they became vacant. At the end of the year eleven of these dwellings remained occupied. Two dwellings have been reconstructed and brought back into use as a dwelling. Forty-six Houses have been demolished.

Up to the end of 1958 Four Closing Orders had been issued and the Houses were vacated and ten dwellings had been voluntarily closed by the Owners without action by the Local Authority.
