HOME NURSING.

It should be noted that the provision of Home Nursing is the responsibility of the County Council and not of the Local Authority in this area.

Two full-time and one part-time Nurses are responsible for the nursing in the area and in addition for the nursing of one neighbouring Village, in general, their work consists principally of:-

- Visiting the sick of all ages in their homes and giving such general attention and especial treatments as are required.
- 2. Ante-Natal care of Midwifery and the conduct of domiciliary midwifery with and without a doctor.
- 3. Work in conjunction with the School Medical Schemes.
- 4. Infant Welfare Work and routine visits to children of pre-school age.
- Domiciliary visits for the purpose of giving insulin, liver extract, and other injections.
- 6. Routine visits to elderly house bound people.

The principle increase in work has occurred in Ante-Natal, Midwifery and Infant Welfare Departments and it is not found that the giving of routine or other injections is a heavy call.

HEALTH OF CHILDREN.

There is an Infant Welfare Clinic which is held on the first, third and fourth Wednesdays in the month, the Medical Officer of Health attending atxallxsessions. The first two sessions. A voluntary "Moral Welfare Society" operates in the area and pays particular attention to cases where there is a threatened break-up in the family or children are in need of supervision, and their parents advice. No Scheme is administered by the Local Authority.

Since the War, up to the end of 1959 a total of 296 new dwellings have been completed by the Local Authority, 163, by Private Enterprise and 45 units of accommodation have been provided by conversion, adaptation or reconstruction making provision for 504 families in all.

Up to the end of 1959 action has been taken under Section 16 of the Housing Act, 1957, in respect of 105 houses, and in all cases the Owners gave written undertakings in accordance with the Act not to relet them for human habitation when they became vacant. At the end of the year 18 of these dwellings remained occupied. Four dwellings have been reconstructed and brought back into use as dwellings. Forty-nine Houses have been demolished.

The Slum Clearance programme has proceeded satisfactory and the clearance and redevelopment of the Grope Lane and Northload Bridge areas are fine examples of the Council's endeavour in this connection.

Where the sites, following demolition, are of insufficient size for redevelopment for housing purposes they can possibly be developed for Business purposes, an example being the development for lock-up garages at the West end of Manor House Road, and in the near future it is hoped that Hunt's Buildings, Marchant's Buildings and Somers Square will be redeveloped for Business purposes.
