

Mr. Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors,

I have the honour to present the Annual Report for 1964, compiled in accordance with the Public Health Officers Regulations, 1959, and Ministry of Health Circular 1/65 of 11th January, 1965.

It will be seen from the vital statistics that the Health of the Borough continues to give reasonable cause for satisfaction. There were no outbreaks of major infectious disease during 1964; Infant Mortality Rates were halved compared with the previous year and there was no Maternal Mortality, but the Illegitimate Birth Rate was raised.

An additional duty placed on the Public Health Department during the year was the regular sampling of batches from a Liquid Egg Pasteurisation Plant in the Borough under the Liquid Egg (Pasteurisation) Regulations, 1963.

In co-operation with the County Health Inspector close supervision has also been kept over the milk supplies to the Borough, particularly in view of the occasional incidence of brucellosis in cattle, and the fact that much raw milk is still consumed.

In this, as indeed in all other aspects of environmental hygiene I should like to pay tribute to the excellent work of the Surveyor and Public Health Inspector and his Staff, and acknowledge the encouragement given by the other Officers of the Council and Members of the Public Health Committee.

NOTES ON VITAL STATISTICS FOR 1964.

(Although as a general rule the figures are too small for much significance to be attached to them, nevertheless certain broad statements can be made).

Population.

The Registrar-General estimated an increase of 70 over the mid-year population for 1963, and births exceeded deaths by 34.

Births

(a) Live Births. There were 15 less births than in 1963, with a corresponding drop in the Recorded Birth Rate but this is a better figure than that of the County as a whole, and When adjusted by the Area Births Comparability Figure gives a rate higher than the National one. With 7 illegitimate live births during the year, the Illegitimate Live Birth Rate rose above the figure for 1963.

(b) Still Births. - with only one still birth, as in 1963, the Borough's Still Birth Rate was markedly less than that of

Somerset, or England and Wales.

Deaths

All Ages - totalled 15 less than in the previous year with a corresponding drop in the death rates, but these remained slightly higher than the County and National figures. There was only 1 death under the age of 25 years, and almost half the deaths were over the age of 75 years.

Infant Mortality - with 2 less infant deaths than in 1963, the Infant Mortality, Neo-natal Mortality, Early Neo-natal Mortality and Perinatal Mortality Rates were approximately halved, and considerably less than the County and National figures.

Maternal Mortality. It is a pleasure to record that there were again no deaths in women from the Borough as a result of pregnancy, childbirth or abortion.

Causes of Death

Cardio-vascular diseases - as in previous years, caused the most deaths of any group of diseases (40), but there were 12 less than in 1963. Of these, Coronary and Other Heart Diseases accounted for 21 deaths and Vascular Diseases of the Nervous System for 14.

Cancers - again took second place, with 12 deaths as in 1963, and of these, Lymphatic and Other Neoplasms accounted for 9.

Respiratory Diseases - took third place, but with 2 less deaths than in 1963 (9). Of these, chronic bronchitis accounted for 5, 4 amongst males, which may be significant in view of the well-publicised statistical association between chronic bronchitis and heavy cigarette smoking.

Accidents - accounted for 1 death and there were 2 from Suicide.



Since the War, up to the end of 1964 a total of 384 new dwellings have been completed by the Local Authority, 320 by Private Enterprise and 58 units of accommodation have been provided by conversion, adaptation, or reconstruction, making provision for 762 families in all.
