I have the pleasure of presenting the Annual Report of the Health of the Borough for 1966, compiled in accordance with the Public Health Officers Regulations, 1959, and Ministry of Health Circular 1/67.

The health figures give cause for satisfaction with nearly twice as many births as deaths, a raised birthrate, low stillbirth, death and infant mortality rates, and no maternal mortality. There were no outbreaks of major infectious disease and for greater interest the cases of notifiable disease are shown for the first time in the form of a Five Year table.

Also for the first time, an account is given of the work during the year of the Mass Radiography Service in the Borough, from information kindly supplied by the Director.

As detailed by the Surveyor and Public Health Inspector, to whom I am most grateful for his contribution to the Report, improvements continued on the environmental side, particularly with regard to housing. Much of the time of the Public Health Department was again taken up with the follow-up of milk, ice cream and pasteurised egg samples, and the investigation of infections in local dairy herds in relation to the community.

My thanks are due to the Town Clerk and all his Officers for their help at all times, and to the Members of the Council for their continued support.

Population.

The Registrar-General gave an estimated increase of 40 over the mid-year population for 1965 and there were nearly twice as many births as deaths in the Borough.

Births.

Live Births - rose to 10 more than in the previous year with a corresponding rise in the Recorded Birth Rate, which, when adjusted by the Area Births Comparability Factor, gives a better figure than that of Somerset as a whole, or England and Wales. The percentage of illegitimate live births was slightly higher than in 1965.

Still Births - again totalled one only, giving a Still Birth Rate decidedly better than the County or National rates.

Deaths.

All Ages - again fell, giving Recorded and Corrected Death Rates noticeably lower than those of Somerset, or England and Wales.

Infant Mortality - with only one death, the Infant Mortality and Neo-natal Mortality Rates were lower than the County and National figures, whilst there was no Early neo-Natal Mortality.

Maternal Mortality - no women died in the Borough as a result of pregnancy, childbirth or abortion.

Causes of Death.

Cardio-Vascular Diseases - again took leading place as the largest single group of diseases causing death in the Borough, with 6 more deaths than in 1965. Of these, Coronary and other Heart Diseases caused 20 deaths and Vascular Lesions of the Nervous System followed with 8 deaths.

The Respiratory Diseases and Cancer - each caused 8 deaths. The Cancer deaths thus fell to half the figure for the previous year and it will be seen that with regard to site, Lymphatic and Other Malignant Neoplasms totalled 6, followed by Stomach Cancer and Leukaemia with 1 death each.

Accidents - again caused 3 deaths of which 1 only involved a motor vehicle.
