Mr. Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors,

I have the honour to present the Annual Report on the Health of the Borough of Glastonbury for 1971, compiled in accordance with Department of Health and Social Security Circular 1/72.

The annual vital statistics for the Borough show a healthy excess of live births over deaths, no stillbirths and no early neonatal or maternal mortality. The percentage of illegitimate births was less than County and National averages, as was the corrected birth rate; the general death rate was lower than the national figure but infant mortality was higher. The Notifiable diseases give little on which to comment but it is interesting to compare the 5 Year Table with a similar, though not identical, period of 70 years ago.

A significant event for the Borough during the year was the implementation of the Local Authority Social Services Act, establishing a Social Services Department at County Hall, Taunton, and from October, 1971, a Divisional Office at Tothill House, Street, working under an Area Social Services Office at Bridgwater. The Department became responsible for a wide range of services previously handled by specialist sections dealing with the needs of children, the physically and mentally ill or handicapped and the elderly, including Home Help Services.

Environmental health matters are again admirably covered by the Public Health Inspector in his Report, but it should be added that much of the time of the public health staff in 1971 and since has been taken up by the problems of small resident and itinerant "hippy" communities.

Some apology is due for the lateness of the Report this year due to pressure on your public health staff in connection with preparations for the impending reorganisation of local government in 1974.

My thanks are extended to the Town Clerk, Mr. King and his staff, other Officers and Members of the Council, also colleagues in the Borough for their kind cooperation.

NOTES ON VITAL STATISTICS FOR 1971

(Although as a general rule the figures are too small for much significance to be attached to them, nevertheless certain broad statements can be made)

Population

The mid-year population, as shown by the 1971 Census of the Registrar-General, shows an increase of 180 over that for the previous year, and live births exceeded deaths by 21.

Births

Live Births - fell by 8 compared with the previous year to 92 with a corresponding fall in the Corrected Birth Rate. The number of illegitimate births rose to 5 but the percentage of these was less than the County and National averages.

Still Births - these were again nil.

Deaths

All Ages - these rose by 14 compared with 1970 to a total of 71 deaths but the death rate remained lower than the National rate while fractionally higher than the County rate.

Infant Deaths - rose to 3 this year and the Infant Mortality Rate was above the National average, but the Neonatal Rate was lower and Early Neonatal and Perinatal Rates were nil.

Maternal Mortality - it is a pleasure to record that this was again nil.

Primary Causes of Mortality

Heart, Cerebrovascular and Other Diseases of Circulatory System - Deaths totalled 35 compared with 28 in 1970. Of these Heart Diseases accounted for 26 deaths, an increase of 7 over the previous year, and Cerebrovascular Disease for 6 deaths, a decrease of 2.

Cancer - again took second place with 18 deaths, 7 more than in 1970, and as regards site, lung and intestine led with 3 deaths each, stomach and breast came next with 2 deaths each - female deaths predominated.

Respiratory Diseases - rose by 3 to a total of 9 deaths, 8 of these being from pneumonia.

Accidents - caused 2 deaths, both in males and one of these involved a motor vehicle.

NOTES ON VITAL STATISTICS FOR 1971

(All figures are a general rule the figures are too small for such significance to be attached to them. Nevertheless certain trends are apparent and are noted.)

The all-year population, as shown by the 1971 Census of the Registrar-General, shows an increase of 180 over that for the previous year, and live births exceeded deaths by 51.

Births

Live Births - fell by 5 compared with the previous year, to 92 with a corresponding fall in the corrected birth rate. The number of illegitimate births rose to 7 but the percentage of these was less than the County and National averages.

Still Births - there were again nil.

Deaths

All Ages - there were 14 compared with 1970 to a total of 71 deaths but the death rate remained lower than the National rate while fractionally higher than the County rate.

Infant Deaths - there were 3 this year and the Infant Mortality Rate was above the National average, but the neonatal rate was lower and fairly neonatal and perinatal deaths were nil.

Neonatal Mortality - there was 1 compared with 1970 to a total of 11. This was again nil.

Perinatal Mortality - there was 1 compared with 1970 to a total of 11.

Deaths by Cause

Heart Disease - 5 compared with 1970 to a total of 25. Of these heart disease accounted for 10 deaths, an increase of 7 over the previous year, and cerebrovascular disease for 5, a decrease of 2.

Cancer - again 10th annual place with 16 deaths, 7 more than in 1970, and as regards site, lung and intestinal led with 3 deaths each, stomach and breast some 2 each, and 1 each - female deaths predominated.

Respiratory Diseases - there were 5 to a total of 11 deaths, 3 of these being from pneumonia.

Accidents - caused 5 deaths, both in males and one of these involved a motor vehicle.

DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE.

Sewage and Trade Waste Disposal Scheme.

The Council's Consulting Engineers prepared a Supplementary Report in connection with the possible extension of the Sewage and Trade Waste Works and submitted it to the Council in September, 1971 and a Meeting with the Engineers was held in December, 1971. However, before a Scheme was submitted to the Department of the Environment, following an enquiry at Street into their sewerage system, the Department asked that the possibility of a joint Disposal Works for Glastonbury and Street be investigated and the Consultants to both Councils are now engaged in this investigation with a view to submitting a joint Report.

REGISTERED COMMON LODGING HOUSES.

No registered common lodging houses within the Borough, therefore no action necessary during year.
