

THE EIGHTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SANITARY INSPECTOR

FOR THE YEAR ENDING 31st DECEMBER, 1940.

To the Mayor, Aldermen, Councillors and Burgesses of the
Borough of Glossop.

Your Worship, Ladies and Gentlemen,

Owing to war-time conditions and the scarcity of paper, I am again presenting my Annual Report in a shortened form.

SCAVENGING: HOUSE AND TRADE REFUSE.

The number of Ash Bins, Conveniences, Water Closets, etc., in this Borough is approximately: 4 privy middens, 57 pail closets, 28 ash pits, 4,000 ash bins, 477 waste water closets and 3,897 fresh water conveniences.

SANITARY INSPECTION OF THE DISTRICT.

DAIRIES, COWSHEDS AND MILKSHOPS.

The number of persons who reside within the Borough boundary and are retailing milk here is 99. Milk is also sold in the Borough from 35 farms which are not within the area of the Borough. The pasteurised milk supply is from the United Co-operative Dairies, Ltd., Failsworth, Manchester.

MILK SUPPLY.

During the year the number of milk samples analysed by the Public Analyst was 6. His certificates state these were "Genuine" samples and contained Fats above the so-called "Standard."

CLEANLINESS OF MILK.

Four samples of Milk have been taken for the purpose having a bacteriological examination made of the same. The "count" was very low. No Bacilli Coli and Tubercle Bacilli were found in the samples.

BACTERIOLOGICAL EXAMINATION OF MILK, CREAM, ICE CREAM AND WATER.

Four samples of Pasteurised Milk have been bacteriologically tested at Derby. Two samples of Well Water have also been tested. This water was unfit for drinking purposes, and the necessary steps were taken to safeguard the public. The milk was of satisfactory quality.

FOOD AND DRUGS ACT, 1938.

During the year under review, 43 samples of Food and Drugs have been obtained from various sources. These samples have been analysed by the Public Analyst (H. Heap, Esq.). They consisted of Milk, Dried Milk, Nut Oil, Chocolates, Sausages, Butter and Drugs. All the samples were certified to be "Genuine," with the exception of one of nut oil, which was adulterated with an inferior oil. This was an Informal Sample.

RATS AND MICE (DESTRUCTION) ACT.

As previously stated, I do not think we have any place where infestation by rats is really serious. Padfield tip and the Sewage Outfall Works are the worst infested areas. All known cases of infestation are dealt with by means of various proprietary Poison Baits or by the Horo Gas Machine. This latter is very useful for destroying the young broods in the nests. Owing to war conditions one or two brands of well known Poison Baits are now unobtainable.

All the food animals for this area are slaughtered in the Central Slaughterhouse, Ashton Street, Glossop. This slaughterhouse is controlled by the Ministry of Food.

BAKERIES AND BAKEHOUSES.

The number of Registered Bakeries and Bakehouses in this Borough is now 58.

OFFENSIVE TRADES.

We have only five places registered as offensive trades. These are for the trade of tripe dressing.

FACTORIES P. AND N.P.

The total number of Factories in this area, including Bakeries and Bakehouses, is 159.

REGISTRATION OF PREMISES

- 2—Methods employed: Sprayed with various Insecticides and fumigated with Cimex, Fumoids or Sulphur Candles. Frames, casings, picture rails and skirting boards are loosened or removed when found necessary.
- 3—If necessary all rooms and furniture are treated as above (2) before tenants from other houses are allowed to become occupiers of any Council Houses.
- 4—Disinfestation is carried out by the male staff of the Health Department.
- 5—Instruction given to occupier to notify immediately any cases of reinfestation of their rooms or furniture after cleaning and fumigating.

DISINFECTION AND DISINFESTATION.

During the year the Health Department has dealt with approximately 600 rooms. This figure includes houses which have been disinfested after cases of Infectious Disease, or cases of a malignant type such as cancer, and also houses which were insect infested.

In conclusion I must again express my thanks to the members of the Health Committee, my fellow officials, the staff of the Health Department, and my Assistants, Mr. H. Pickett and Mr. G. Firth, for their ready and willing help during such a busy year.
