

#### GODMANCHESTER BOROUGH COUNCIL

Mr. Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors,

I have the honour to submit my Annual Report on the Health and Sanitary conditions of the Borough for the year ended 31st December, 1958.

The general health of the population remains very satisfactory as judged by an examination of the statistics for the year under review.

Compared with last year the Birth Rate shows a considerable rise and still stands well above the average for the country as a whole. There was a complete absence of stillbirth and infantile mortality during the year - a combination of facts which is a pleasing feature to note and a favourable reflection on the available Medical Services.

The Death Rate indicates a rather remarkable downward trend and I can find no record to indicate that the Death Rate in the Borough has ever stood at a lower level. Compared with last year, the rate has been more than halved and now stands at a point less than half the National figure.

So far as Infectious Disease is concerned 1958 has been character - ised by the absence of any outbreak and the Borough remained almost free from Notifiable Infection throughout the year.

During the year the Sewage Disposal Works in Cow Lane was almost completed and treatment commenced on Godmanchester Sewage.

The outlying farms water scheme was completed and properties within the area are being connected.

Sixteen new Council dwellings were completed during the year and a substantial start made on the Council's Slum Clearance Programme.

In Conclusion, I would like to thank members of the Council for their kindness and consideration during the past year, and all officers for their kind help and consideration.



No action was found to be necessary under the Public Health (Prevention of Tuberculosis) Regulations, 1952, in connection with persons suffering from pulmonary tuberculosis employed in the milk trade, or under section 172 of the Public Health Act, 1936 which deals with the compulsory removal to hospital of persons suffering from tuberculosis.

#### HOUSING

#### Slum Clearance

The 5 houses in the Pipers Lane - Earning street Clearance Area No.1. and 10 other individual houses were demolished during the year.

Negotiations to purchase the properties included in Pipers I are Area No.2. proceeded and a Clearance Order in respect of Cambridge Street - St Anns Lane Clearance Area No.3. was made.

Fourteen cases of rehousing from unfit properties were dealt with .

#### Council Housing

4 houses, 4 one bedroom bungalows and 8 flats, being part of the 20 Dwellings, Cambridge Road 3rd Stage Development, were completed and the remaining 4 flats substantially so.

As the Council had decided to allocate 16 of the 20 properties for Slum Clearance purposes, the Housing List was closed for one year then the matter is to be reconsidered.

#### Private Housing

Work on a small number of private dwellings continued and three dwellings were completed during the year.

#### Improvements

Applications for Improvement Grants in respect of 14 dwellings were approved during the year and 6 were completed. A number of the applic - ations were in respect of properties now provided with water from the Outlying Farms Scheme.

Tenders for the modernisation of 50 Council Houses were approved and 3 houses were modernised by the Council employees.

## WATER SUPPLY

The daily consumption of water was maintained around 31 gallons per head per day in spite of the increased numbers of houses now provided with W.C's and baths. This was due to wastage from mains being reduced and to the wet summer which reduced the amount of water used on gardens etc.

The Outlying Farms Scheme has been completed and all occupied premises in the area are now supplied. The amount of water used at the moment is far less than the amount provided for, which means that the storage tank intended to provide for 24 hours in fact holds 4 days supply. This resulted in a series of unsatisfactory samples being obtained following which the tower was cleaned out and the mains system flushed with chlorine solution.

Samples were taken on the mains supply received in bulk from Hunting don Borough Council to the town supply scheme and the supply received from St Neots Rural District Council for the Outlying Farm Scheme. All samples were sent for bacteriological analysis at the Cambridge Public Health Laboratory and the following results obtained:-

## SEWERS AND SEWERAGE DISPOSAL

The bi-weekly collection of night soil has continued but the number of premises dependant upon this service has continued to get less as the Conversion of further properties to water carriage system has continued.

The Cow Lane Sewerage Disposal works came into partial operation and the White Hart pump station was completed, allowing the Syke's pump to be removed. The Syke's Pump has been converted to deisel operation for emergency use and has already proved useful when excavating for work on sewers and water mains.

## REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL

The weekly collection of household refuse is made by tractor and trailer. The tractor is used one day weekly to level and cover the area tipped during the week. Controlled tipping is about to commence on the Cambridge Road tip. Tipping on the London Road continued throughout the year but difficulty has been experienced in preventing the firing of the tip. The rodent operator carried out two series of treatments on this tip during the year.

## STREET CLEANINGZ

Approximately 3.5 miles of County and 2.25 miles of Borough roads are swept by 2 employees and street gullies are cleared as necessary by direct labour with the tumbler cart and scoops. Weed killer was again used on a number of paths but some trouble was experienced with the growth of weeds this year.

## RIVER

The usual river bathing took place when the weather was suitable. A sample taken from opposite the closed bathing place on 30th April gave the following result:-

In spite of the wet year and the general high water level flooding was again infrequent and not serious.

## CARAVAN SITES

The number of caravans in the district has remained constant in spite of the movement away of the Councils Sewerage staff. The unlicensed site in West street was closed during the year and the Planning Authority are in communication with the operator of the Riverside Site. Draft plans were received during the year for a site in London Road. A small number of individual caravans continue to be licensed.

## FOOD AND DRUGS ACTS

One Premises in the Borough continues to be used as a slaughterhouse with an average of 3 pigs per week slaughtered. This meat has not been inspected as owing to pressure of other work, little work has been done on food inspection and inspection of food premises. the state of the superior of the subsection of t The first transfer of the second file to the first of the  4 samples of milk were taken and submitted for analysis under the Milk Regulations and found satisfactory. Two samples of ice cream sent for bacteriological examination were both placed in provisional grade.1.

### GENERAL
