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



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# To the Godmanchester Urban District Council.

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GENTLEMEN,

The Ministry of Health requires information on certain subjects. This information is embodied in this report to save extra printing and time.

Godmanchester is a Borough situate on the south side of the river Ouse, with an area of 4,956 acres. The Borough proper is located on the banks of the river with many straggling streets and lanes, and spreading over a considerable acreage, flanked on the East and West by extensive commons, which are at times flooded.

The rising ground on the Southern side of the Borough is dotted with farm-houses and homesteads. The soil of the Borough proper is gravel, overlaid with loamy soil, and that of the higher ground Oxford clay.

The population is 2,025.

The number of inhabited houses at the end of the year was 639.

The Rateable Value is £7,754.

The sum represented by a penny rate is £30 10s. 6d.

The population is mostly connected with agricultural pursuits.

There is one Hosiery Factory in the Borough employing a considerable number of women and girls. The old Flour Mill has been taken over by "Farmers' Glory," Ltd., makers of cereal foods.

### Vital Statistics.

The Births registered were 36; 19 males and 17 females. There were 3 illegitimate children born in the Borough. This gives a Birth-rate of 15·3 per 1000 persons living. The Birth-rate for England and Wales is 14·9 per 1000. There were five still births registered.

The deaths registered were 35; 20 males and 15 females, an average of 17·28 per 1000 persons living. Of these 11 were over 70, 3 over 80, 1 over 90, and 1 aged 104 years. The Death-rate for England and Wales is 12·4 per 1000. There were no deaths due to pregnancy or childbirth.

There were no deaths of children under I year of age.

Public Assistance Medical Relief is utilised to a fair extent, principally amongst the older inhabitants, also the Huntingdon County Hospital is used by both In and Out-patients.

The Public Assistance Institution at St. Neots now takes care of Mental cases which are not bad enough to be sent to the Mental Hospital at Arlesey.

The Huntingdon Institution at the North end of the adjoining Borough receives cases of bodily illness and also the aged and infirm who are more or less able to look after themselves, but want a certain amount of supervision.

### Nursing in the Home.

Cases of illness are visited by a District Nurse in their homes and cases of infectious disease are conveyed to the Local Isolation Hospital.

### Laboratory Facilities.

Food is examined periodically by Mr. Solomon Greenberg, Tenison Road, Cambridge, and Clinical material by Dr. Harvey, of Cambridge, through the County Council.

# Hospitals.

In Huntingdon there is a Voluntary General Hospital which receives cases from the Borough; an Isolation Hospital for infectious diseases supported by the rates from this and neighbouring Councils. Cases of Small Pox would be taken care of by the Huntingdon County Council.

### Ambulance Facilities.

There are two Ambulances used for service in the Borough, one for ordinary cases and one for infectious cases.

### Clinics.

There is no clinic in the Borough, but cases of Tuberculosis, Child Welfare and Ante-natal matters are dealt with by the Huntingdon Centre under the Huntingdon County Council.

# Water Supply.

Water was laid on in the Borough on December 8th, 1936, and many houses are connected to the Main. The supply comes from The Huntingdon Urban District Council's Waterworks and is of excellent quality and quantity.

I hope in time to have every house connected up to this pure supply.

There are a good many wells still in use which I hope will gradually be closed as time goes on.

## Drainage and Sewerage.

Sanitary conditions of the District remain in much the same condition now as in previous years. There are 117 water closets, the rest being of the pail system. This Council must also consider works for a proper drainage and sewerage system, and thus do away with the very unsatisfactory arrangement of pail closets, and the annoyance it entails to the inhabitants of the Borough. I hope that later on every house will have a water closet with proper flushing cisterns.

There are no privies in the Borough, nor sink wastes connected direct to the drains.

The sewers are mostly stoneware, though there are one or two of the old barrel type.

The sewers are running very well now.

# Scavenging.

The Refuse is collected and ploughed into the land by farmers at an annual cost of £500.

# Inspection.

During the year I have made many inspections of the District accompanied by your Sanitary Inspector.

Sanitary Inspections are embodied in the Sanitary Officer's Report, vide page 8.

### Schools.

Water is now laid on to both Schools and water carriage system is now installed in the Girls' School. The Schools are kept clean and are well ventilated.

The Schools were not closed through illness during the year.

### Housing.

Housing accommodation for the labouring classes is of a mixed character. The old thatched cottages are gradually being replaced by more modern dwelling-houses, and the house accommodation is generally improving. Out of 357 working class houses inspected for overcrowding under 1935 Act only 6 were found to be overcrowded. On account of the female labour employed in local factories, the young women who formerly left home for domestic service remain and cause the houses to be fully occupied. During the Canning Season at Messrs. Chivers in Huntingdon, a considerable number of young women come from Peterborough and the near villages, lodging in Godmanchester, thus overfilling the houses occupied by the working classes.

The provision of Parlour type houses by the Council has met local needs. The provision of the Non-Parlour type houses has nearly met local needs, but a few more houses would readily let.

Generally there is plenty of open space about the houses, the cleanliness of the surroundings in some places is not of a high class, the yards being imperfectly paved and gravelled, but there is a decided improvement yearly in these conditions.

## Infectious and other Diseases.

All houses in which Diphtheria and Scarlet Fever appear are disinfected during the first 24 hours.

Main water supply has been laid on to four cowsheds.
