Water

The main supply is a typical chalk water remaining practically constant in quality. Samples of the water are taken monthly by the Gosport Water Company and quarterly by the Sanitary Inspector for both chemical and bacteriological examination. All the reports on the samples examined were satisfactory. The whole of the Public Water Supply is continuously chlorinated as a precautionary measure.

A sample taken from one private well was unsatisfactory. Suitable action was taken to remedy the cause.
