# SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA

### Water

The main supply is a typical chalk water remaining practically constant in quality.

During the year 17 samples of the water were submitted for both chemical and bacteriological exemination and all were reported satisfactory.

One sample taken from a private well was reported unsatisfactory and the use of this water for drinking and domestic purposes was discontinued.

# Extensions etc. to Public Supply

- 1. New Reservoir at Shedfield, capacity 32 million gallons
- 2. Old steam pumping plant replaced by electrically driven plant capable of pumping 3 to 32 million gallons per day.
- 3. New Emergency Borehole constructed near main Soberton works and yields 14,000 gallons per hour.
- 4. The Gosport Water Company's Parliamentary Bill, which received the Royal Assent on the 10th July, 1940, authorised the construction of new well works, pumping mains etc. in the Parish of Bishop's Waltham. It is hoped that the summer yield of this new source of supply will be at least 22 million gallons per day.

No mains were damaged by enemy action during the year and it has not been necessary to take any action in regard to any form of contamination of the supply.

Drainage and Sewerage - No important extensions.

Rivers and Streams - There was no pollution in the area requiring any action.

# Immunisation against Organisms of the Typhoid Group

In accordance with Ministry of Health Circular 2230, dated 7th December, 1940, facilities for free treatment were provided and inoculations commenced on the 16th December, 1940. Mixed Typhoid and Paratyphoid Vaccine supplied by the Emergency Public Health Laboratory Service was used.
