To the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors of the Borough of Gosport.

Mr. Mayor, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to submit my fifteenth Annual Report on the health and sanitary circumstances of the Borough for the year ended 31st December 1945.

The main features of interest are as follows :-

- Births 1063 births were recorded during the year. This is the highest number of births on record and the birth rate of 26,27 per 1,000 population compares very favourably with 16.1 for England & Wales.
- Deaths The death rate for Gosport for 1945 was 11.68 per 1,000 population compared with 11.4 for England & Wales.
- Infant Mortality 40 per 1,000 live births compares favourably with an Infant Mortality Rate of 46 for England & Wales.
- Maternal Mortality 0.93 per 1,000 total births compares very favourably with 1.79 for England & Wales and with 1.85 for Gosport for 1944.

Tuberculosis Death RateRespiratory0.76 per 1,000 populationOther Forms0.02 " " "All Forms0.78 " " "This rate comparesfavourably with a rate of 0.99 per 1,000population for all forms of tuberculosis in 1944.

Cancer Death Rate 1.95 per 1,000 population.

Other items of interest will be found in the body of my report.

In conclusion I would again like to express my thanks to the Members of the Council and especially to the Chairman and Members of the Public Health Committee for their courtesy and co-operation and to my Staff for their diligence and help.

Mosquito Control

Mosquitoes were much less troublesome during 1945 than they were during the war period when large areas of flooded land provided them with suitable breeding grounds. The much improved drainage of the Browndown Marshes and of Admiralty land in the Bridgemary and Fleetlands area should do much to reduce the mosquito nuisance in the future.

During the year 500 gallons of waste oil, 141 gallons of paraffin and 88 gallons of larvicide were used for this purpose. The waste oil is obtained free of charge from the Admiralty and the cost to the Corporation for wages, larvicide, paraffin and haulage was 2229 - 16 - 11d.

From April 1945 Towards the ond of the year arrangements were made with Mr. Marshall, Director of the British Mosquito Control Institute, Hayling Island, to send one of his assistants to Gosport once weekly to advise and assist in mosquito control and his services are bearing fruit already.

Rodent Control

One man was employed whole-time on rodent control work throughout the year. 184 complaints of infestations were received during the year and 276 premises were treated - 102 by the Council and 174 by the Occupier of the premises, these treatments resulting in 74 dead rats being found.

Sewer Treatment: Systematic treatment of the sewers in the Lee on Solent area of the borough was carried out - the First Treatment (118 manholes baited) on the 30th April and the Second Treatment (42 manholes baited) on the 28th May. The estimated number of rats killed was 420 for the First Treatment and 260 for the Second Treatment.
