To The Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors of the Borough of Gosport.

Mr. Mayor, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to submit my sixteenth Annual Report on the health and sanitary circumstances of the Borough for the year ended 31st December 1946.

The main features of interest are as follows: -

Births 1116 births were recorded during the year.

This is the highest number of births on record and the birth rate of 24.71 per 1,000 population compares very favourably with 19.1 for England & Wales.

Deaths The death rate was 11.16 per 1,000 population compared with 11.5 for England & Wales.

Infant Mortality
In 1946 the deaths of Infants under 1 year of age
per 1,000 registered births dropped to 33 in Gosport
compared with 43 for England & Wales - these rates
are the lowest on record for both Gosport and
England & Wales.

No deaths from diarrhoea and enteritis in children under 2 years of age were notified during the year.

Maternal Mortality There were no deaths from maternal causes during 1946.

This rate compares favourably with a rate of 0.78 per 1,000 population for all forms of tuberculosis in 1945.

Cancer Death Rate 1.66 per 1,000 population (1.95 for 1945)

Notifications of Infectious Diseases There were no notifications of typhoid or paratyphoid fever, dysentery or food poisoning during the year and no deaths from any of the infectious diseases excepting pneumonia. In the case of this disease the notifications rose from 31 in 1945 to 58 cases in 1946 of which 26 died compared with 25 deaths out of 31 cases notified during the previous year. Although this death rate for pneumonia is substantially lower than that for 1945 it is still far too high and many more lives could be saved by calling in the doctor sooner, for the secret of success is early treatment.

General Health of the People Much abuse has been hurled at the
Government and the Minister of Food
regarding our so called "starvation" diet, but our high
birth r te and low death rates, absence of serious outbreaks
of disease and the general good health of the population in
Gosport, show that we are thriving on it. Perhaps because
we can do ourselves more harm by over than by under indulgence

Other items of interest will be found in the body of my report.

In conclusion I would again like to express my thanks to the Members of the Council and especially to the Chairman and Members of the Public Health Committee for their courtesy and co-operation and to my Staff for their diligence and help.

Infectious Diseases

Our Infectious Diseases Hospital was closed as an Infectious Diseases Hospital in May 1945 and is now re-opened as a Maternity Home (under the County Council). Cases of infectious diseases requiring hospital treatment are admitted to the Portsmouth I.D. Hospital by agreement with the Portsmouth City Council.

Smallpox

Our Smallpox Hospital (Tcl.89336) has been taken over by the Portsmouth City Council on a yearly agreement on the understanding that any cases of Smallpox occurring in the Borough of Gosport will be admitted and treated there.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA

Water

The main supply is a typical chalk water remaining practically constant in quality, neutral in reaction and free from deposit on standing and it has no plumbo-solvent action. It is hard in character but is much softened on boiling. The water is chlorinated before it reaches the mains.

The supply has been satisfactory in quality and in quantity. The following table shows the number of samples taken, for which the results of analyses were all satisfactory:-

Mosquito Control

The draining of the Browndown Marshes has done much to reduce mosquitoes in the Borough and more particularly in Lee. Drainage work has also been done on the marshy lands at Fleetlands in the occupation of the Royal Naval Aircraft Repair Department. The importance of draining or filling in as much as possible of the low lying marshy areas in the Borough cannot be over emphasised as these are the places where mosquitoes breed and of course in water butts and other places where water can collect and stagnate. When these are on private lands the owners could do much to protect themselves and their neighbours from mosquitoes by doing away with such collections of stagnant water or by treating them regularly with waste oil, paraffin or D.D.T.

The arrangements made in April 1945 with Mr. Marshall, Director of the British Mosquito Control Institute, Hayling Island, to send one of his Assistants to Gosport once weekly to advise and assist in Mosquito Control, were continued in 1946 with beneficial results.

Regular spraying of all the usual breeding grounds was systematically pursued during the spring and summer menths and did much to reduce the mesquito nuisance. But of course spraying is only a palliative measure whereas the real remedy lies in the elimination of marshy lands by drainage or filling in.

During the year 300 gallons of waste oil, 200 gallons of paraffin and 44 gallons of larvicide were used for this purpose. The cost to the Corporation for wages, naterials and transport was £224 - 4 - 3d.

Rodent Control

One man was employed whole-time on rodent control work throughout the year, and two full-time assistants were also employed (one from 11.9.46 and the other from 2.12.46).

150 Complaints of infestations were received during the year and 191 premises were treated - 161 by the Council and 30 by the Occupiers of the premises concerned.
