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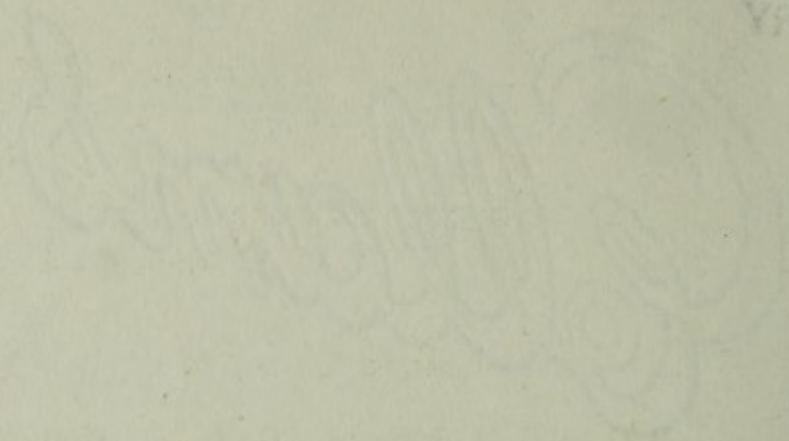

BOROUGH OF GOSPORT

To the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors
of the Borough of Gosport.

Mr. Mayor, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to submit my seventeenth Annual Report on the health and sanitary circumstances of the Borough for the year ended 31st December 1947.

The main features of interest are as follows:-

Births 1275 births were recorded during the year
This is the highest number of births on record and the birth rate of 26.99 per 1,000 population compares very favourably with 20.5 for England & Wales.

Deaths The death rate was 10.27 per 1,000 population compared with 12.0 for England & Wales.

Infant Mortality In 1947 the deaths of Infants under 1 year of age per 1,000 registered births dropped to 29.8 in Gosport compared with 41 for England & Wales - these rates are the lowest on record for both Gosport and England & Wales.

4 deaths from diarrhoea and enteritis in children under 2 years of age were notified during the year.

Maternal Mortality There were no deaths from maternal causes during 1947.

Notifications of Infectious Diseases There were no notifications of typhoid or paratyphoid fever, dysentery or food poisoning during the year and no deaths from any of the infectious diseases excepting 1 from measles and 18 from pneumonia. In the case of pneumonia the notifications rose from 58 in 1946 to 92 cases in 1947 of which only 18 died compared with 26 deaths out of 58 cases notified during the previous year. Although this death rate for pneumonitis is substantially lower than that for 1946 it is still far too high and many more lives could be saved by calling in the doctor sooner, for the secret of success is early treatment. Now that medical treatment is free there is no longer any excuse for delay.

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The general health of the people remains satisfactory in spite of all their hardships real and imaginary. Though a smoker myself I am inclined to place the greatest grievance of the moment (the shortage and high cost of tobacco) in the latter category because we would be better off without smoking in more ways than one. We have become slaves to a habit, slaves to a weed, drug addicts, so why not frankly admit it instead of claiming that smoking is essential to our health and efficiency which it is not but frequently is a cause of ill-health and inefficiency as well as of fires causing loss of life and property. I am not a killjoy but I don't like to see things pushed out of perspective by mass hysteria or incitement thereto. The "red lights" indicating this danger are already in sight.

Other items of interest will be found in the body of my report.

In conclusion I would again like to express my thanks to the Members of the Council and especially to the Chairman and Members of the Public Health Committee for their courtesy and co-operation and to my Staff for their diligence and help.

SECTION C

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA

Water

The main supply is a typical chalk water remaining practically constant in quality, neutral in reaction and free from deposit on standing. It has no plumbo-solvent action. It is hard in character but is much softened on boiling. The water is chlorinated before it reaches the mains.

The supply has been satisfactory in quality and quantity. The following table shows the number of samples taken, for which the results of analyses were all satisfactory:-

Mosquito Control

Regular spraying of all the usual breeding places was systematically carried out during the spring and summer months and did much to reduce the mosquito nuisance. But of course spraying is only a palliative whereas the real remedy lies in the elimination of marshy lands by drainage or filling in. In this connection our thanks are due to the Army Authorities for the drainage of the Browdown Marshes which has done much to reduce mosquitoes in the Borough and especially in Lee-on-Solent. This good work is still in progress and we hope will continue until the drainage of the marshes is as complete as possible. Some attempt has been made to drain the marshy lands at Fleetlands in the occupation of the R.N.A.R.D. but much more is required to get rid of all the swampy mosquito breeding grounds.

The residents of Gosport could do much to protect themselves and their neighbours from mosquitoes by spraying fortnightly any collections of stagnant water (including water in tubs and butts etc.) in their premises with 5% D.D.T. in Paraffin.

The cost to the Corporation for wages, materials, transport etc. was £428 - 3 - 11d.

Rodent Control

One man was employed whole-time on rodent control work throughout the year and two full-time assistants were also employed during the first half of the year. In addition workmen from the Borough Engineer's Department were employed when required on the sewers for lifting of manhole covers etc.
