To The Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors of the Borough of Gosport.

Mr. Mayor, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to submit my twenty-second Annual Report on the Health and Sanitary Circumstances of the Borough for the year ended the 31st December 1952.

The main features of interest are as follows:-

POPULATION The Registrar General's estimate of the total population of Gosport (civilian and non-civilian) for 1952 is 62,560, an increase of 850 above the 1951 population.

BIRTHS The number of Live Births, 1,103 recorded during 1952 shows an increase of 55 compared with 1951. The Birth-Rate for Gosport 18.5 compares with 15.3 for England & Wales and also shows an increase over the Gosport Birth-Rate for 1951 (17.83)

DEATHS The Death-Rate, 10.17 per 1,000 population, shows a decrease on the death-rate for 1951 (11.5) and compares favourably with the Death-Rate for England & Wales (11.13).

INFANT MORTALITY The number of deaths of infants under 1 year of age (22) gives an Infant Mortality Rate of 19.9 per 1,000 live births the lowest on record for Gosport and also compares very favourably with the lowest on record for England & Wales (27.6).

MATERNAL MORTALITY There was only one death from Maternal Causes in 1952 as in 1950 and 1951.

TUBERCULOSIS DEATH RATE The Tuberculosis Death Rate in Gosport showed a fall from 0.22 per 1,000 population in 1951 to 0.17 in 1952 compared with 0.24 for England & Wales

CANCER DEATH RATE The Cancer Death Rate, 1.44 per 1,000 population shows no change.

NOTIFICATIONS OF INFECTIOUS DISEASES There was an increase in the number of notifications of Whooping Cough from 215 in 1951 to 272 in 1952 but only 2 deaths.

On the other hand there was a big decrease in the notifications of Measles from 1,579 in 1951 to 671 in 1952 and no deaths.

There were no notifications of Diphtheria and the Scarlet Fever notifications fell from 35 in 1951 to 34 in 1952 with no deaths.

There were 11 notifications of Acute Poliomyelitis (Infantile Paralysis) compared with 2 in 1951. But 4 of these were non-paralytic and only 5 had some or slight residual paralysis. There were no deaths.

No cases of Food Poisoning were notified during the year.

There was a decrease in the number of Pneumonia notifications from 55 in 1951 to 31 in 1952 and in the number of deaths from 19 to 18.

NOTIFICATIONS OF INFECTIOUS DISEASES (Cont'd)

Tuberculosis notifications decreased from 106 in 1951 to 82 in 1952 and the deaths fell from 14 in 1951 to 8 in 1952.

NEW HOUSES The number of permanent houses built during 1952 was 311. This makes a total of 2,377 permanent houses built since the end of the war. In addition, 600 prefabricated bungalows have been erected during the post-war period and 170 war-destroyed houses rebuilt.

APPLICANTS FOR COUNCIL HOUSES The Local Authority housed 370 new tenants during the year and there were still 1,636 applicants for Council Houses on the waiting list by the end of the year.

DOMESTIC HELP SCHEME A total of 85 Maternity and 206 Other cases received help under this scheme during the year.

THE PUBLIC HEALTH The health of the public in 1952 was satisfactory as far as can be judged by the statistical and other information at our disposal.

In conclusion I would again like to express my thanks to the Members of the Council and especially to the Chairman and Members of the Public Health Committee for their courtesy and co-operation and to my Staff for their diligence and help.

SECTION C

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA

Water

The main supply is a typical chalk water remaining practically constant in quality, neutral in reaction and free from deposit on standing. It has no plumbo-solvent action. It is hard in character but is much softened on boiling. The water is chlorinated before it reaches the mains.

The supply has been satisfactory in quality and quantity.

Mosquito Control

Regular spraying of breeding places was continued during the spring and summer and did much to lessen the nuisance.

Breeding grounds on private premises are not under our control but the public is warned of the importance of giving proper attention to these sources of mosquitoes.
