INTRODUCTION and GINERAL COMMENTS

To The Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors of the Borough of Gosport.

Mr. Mayor, Ladies and Gentlemen,

- 1. I have the honour to present to you this ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1954. It refers to, and records, the work carried out under the administrative direction of Dr. G.W. Fleming who retired in February 1955 when I succeeded him-
- 2. This opportunity is taken to express my APPRECIATION to DR. FLEMING for the courteous assistance given to me in the transfer.
- 3. The GENERAL PRESENTATION of this Report has followed the model of those of previous years. Certain alterations and additions have been made to assist in the use of the publication as reference to our services. The Index at the end will explain the new arrangement.
- 4. Gosport is growing rapidly in many ways as can be noted from a study of the General Statistics. TABLE 3 records this GROWTH of POPULATION from 35,000 in 1921 to over 60,000 in 1954.
- 5. TABLE 3 also records that nearly 3,000 of the inhabitants are over 70 years of age. This problem of OLD AGE and the care of these OLD PEOPLE is increasing year by year as the proportion to the total population increases. There are about 20,000 young persons under 20 years of age so that some 23,000 inhabitants are mainly dependent on the efforts of the remaining 40,000. A large proportion of these are women who are not out at work. The situation is that more olderly people are in need of assistance in some form or other than before and in proportion there are fewer potential sources of contribution to the public purse to provide the necessary financial help.
 - 6. From TABLE 4 it is noted that Gosport has a comparatively high BIRTH RATE.
- 7. TABLE 8 shows that Gosport is a healthy town judged by the DEATH RIFE which is persistently much lower than that for England and Wales as a whole.
- 8. THE INFINI MORTALITY RATE, although not as good as for the whole country, is reasonably satisfactory.
- 9. TIBLE 11 is of special interest in showing the changes which have taken place in our "HELLTH PICTURE" in the past 40 years. The comparison clearly shows that the Death Rate has fallen by over 30,, and that there has been a spectacular saving of lives of infants and young persons
- 10. TABLE 12 deals with INFECTIOUS DISEASES. A comparison between 1954 and 1953 is made to assist you in your appreciation of the situation. The outstanding features are the marked drop in most of the notifications and the rise in deaths from notifiable Proumonias.
- 11. Much interest has been demonstrated by you as a committee and the public of Gosport in DIPHTHERIA IMMUNISATION. The records of the situation have been set out in TABLES 14, 15 and 16. Whooping Cough protection has only been added to the official scheme in 1955 and there are no returns for any such immunisations which have been carried out by the family dectors.
- 12. TABLE 16 is a comprehensive survey of the STATE of PROTECTION ACCINST DIPHTHERIA among children of all ages up to school leaving age. This type of table is generally referred to as a "ladder". It records year by year, the numbers of children immunised in each age group. To appreciate the table it must be remembered that we have a natural increase of population by births over infant

deaths of about 1,000 children per year. Our aim is to have every baby immunised well before the first birthday with a full primary course and every child given a single booster or reinforcing dose at about school entry age. We are not reaching anywhere near our target. In 1954, dealing with primary courses, the protection was given to 57 babies born during that year and 537 babies born in 1953, the previous year. This is only about half of the potential mumber. Going a little further back to investigate a school entry age it is noted that in 1954, dealing with booster dosos only, protection was given to 321 children born in 1949. This is less than one third of the potential approximate 1,000 children. At no stage is the picture reasonably safe. For safety for the community at large no less than 70% of children in any ago group at any given time should be protected by immunisation as prescribed in the scheme. For absolute safety however, every child should be so protected. TABLE 14 records Immunisation activity COMPARISONS WITH OTHER AREAS in the County. We are neither top mer bottom. Farcham and Winchester for example show much more successful interest in this problem, but we are more active than the average for the County. 14. TABLE 17 deals with VACJINATION AGAINST SMALLPOX. Our main concorn is Primary Vaccination in Infancy and here Gosport is above the average for the Urban Areas of the County and the County itself. TURERCULOSIS is doalt with in Tables 18, 19 and 20. TABLE 18 deals with the TUBERCULOSIS RECISTER. As each new case is notified it gets added to the Register. The natural tendency is for the numbers thereon to increase year by year. Tible 19 gives greater details of AGE and SEX DISTRIBUTION of incidence and donths. The 48 Notifications of Pulmonary Tuberculesis and 8 of Non-Pulmonary Tuberculosis are marked improvements on previous years. The year shows little change in the number of deaths. TABLE 21 deals with NOTIFICATIONS of PULMOMARY TUBERCULOSIS from. 1949 for several areas worked out to the Rate per 1,000 population. Gosport for 1954 has a higher incidence rate than the County as a whole or the larger Western Area of the South West Motropolitian Regional Hospital Board which includes Hampshire, Dorset and Wiltshire. It's rate is however better then Pertsmouth, Southampton or Bournemouth. Looking back over this period Gosport has persistently had a higher incidence rate than the County or the Western Area. Bournemouth has always, with this 1954 emorption, shown a much healthier record then our own There has been no consistent superiority or inferiority in respect of Portsmouth or Southempton in these earlier years where the results have gone up and down.

- 19. TABLE 20 deals with the TUBERCULOSIS (ALL FORMS) DEATH RATE. Gosport has been persistently better than England and Wales as a whole since 1949. The Rate for the town has been as high as 0.99 in 1944, a War Year. Prior to 1939 it varied between 0.75 in 1934 to 0.50 in 1938. The table shows the unmistakable trend in improvement in the past few years. It has been reported elsewhere that Gosport is a "black spot" for Tuberculosis. This sweeping statement has no support in the facts as disclosed in Tables 20 and 21, nor is there any evidence of excessive incidence of, or mortality from, Tuberculosis in any particular occupation in the area.
- 20. SECTION D records the "SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES of the AREAR There is very little in that section which needs any special comment. The Sanitary Inspectors have carried out considerably more inspections in 1954 than previously and very much more "repair" or abatement work was carried out following informal and formal representations.
- 21. SECTION E deals with "HOUSING". Again the records show greater activity by the Sanitary Inspectors in their visits made and greater success in the results of their approaches.
- 22. SECTION F deals with the COMPROL OVER FOOD. Fewer samples were taken than in 1953. In my opinion it is necessary to carry out a comparatively high rate of sampling in order to maintain a safe level in respect of food as offered and sold to the public.
- 23. SECTION G Lists and briefly reviews some of the more important General HEALTH SERVICES in the area. These are mainly provided through the County Council. The information has been set out to serve as a reference.

- 24. I would like to conclude this introduction to my first Annual Report to you on a PERSONAL NOTE. The way in which you, and Gosport, have accepted me, and my family, into your activities and life has been much appreciated. We feel completely at home.
- 25. In conclusion it is a pleasure to record the great help which the staff has given to me in my task of taking over this department and in proparing this Report.

GEOGRAPHICAL INFORMATION Table I

The Borough of Gosport covers an area of 6,185 acres.

It is peninsular, being bounded on the land side to the north-west by Farcham U.D.C. and by the sea - the Solont (on the south-west from the western extremity of Loo-on-Solont past Stokes Bay and Browndown to Fort Gilkicker and on the south-east from Fort Gilkicker to Fort Blockhouse at the entrance to Portsmouth Harbour) and Portsmouth Harbour (on the north-east).

Its greatest length, east to west or south-east to north-west, is about 40 miles. Its greatest breadth, north-oast to south-west, is about 32 miles.

A priority System is in operation in regard to admission to County Council Day Nursories, and the Priority Cases are as follows:-

- (a) Children whose mothers are obliged to work as sole or main supporter of the family, i.e. unmarried mothers and widows, or cases where the husband is unable to follow full-time employment on account of ill-health.
- (b) Children whose mothers are ill or are unable, for some reason, to care for them themselves.
- (c) Cases of ever crowded or unsuitable home conditions, where it is necessary in the interests of the child on health grounds.

Children not coming within the above categories are admitted on the understanding that if the vacancy should be required for a priority case, the child will be withdrawn.
