It will be seen that a large number of cases of measles was notified, and this was by no means the full total of the cases occurring during the year. It seems doubtful whether any good result is to be gained by the notifying of this particular complaint.

There were eleven cases of Scarlet Fever, five of which received treatment at the Isolation Hospital, which also took three cases from West Kesteven.

Only one case of Diphtheria was notified. - a very satisfactory condition of affairs. ---

During the year a vigorous course of Prophylactic inoculation against Diphtheria was carried out in the borough and also the surrounding rural district. Every schoolchild, whose parents were willing, had the opportunity of receiving this treatment, and it is calculated that 70 per cent of children of school age and 40 per cent of children above the age of one but below school age, have received this treatment in the borough. Inoculation has been carried out over the whole of the country and it is hoped that there will be a great drop in the incidence of Diphtheria in future years.

There were seven cases of Cerebro-spinal fever, a number above the average. All these cases were sent to the Grantham Hospital and received skilled treatment on the most modern lines, and all made a good recovery.

are all testionals Nine cases of Pulmonary Tuberculosis and six cases of non-pulmonary disease were notified, a number below the average. There were eight deaths from the pulmonary and one from the non-pulmonary form of the disease, which are shown in tabulated form.

Orthopaedic Treatment.

Six children have been recommended to the Orthopaedic Treatment Clinic, Beaconfield. Of these, treatment was not advised in one case, one has attained the age of five years, two have sufficiently improved to discontinue treatment. The two remaining cases are progressing favourably.

Optical Treatment.

Twelve children have been examined by Dr.A.C.Reid, Eye Specialist at Beaconfield. Glasses were advised in six of these cases, and one was re-examined at a later date. No glasses were advised in two cases. The four remaining cases were wearing glasses and had been brought up for further examination.

Dental Treatment.

Twenty-four children were recommended for examination by Mr.H.Miller. Of these, fourteen were treated. In two cases treatment was not advised, and in the eight remaining cases the patients did not keep the appointment. One mother also recommended for examination received Dental Treatment.

A. Diphtheric Immunisation Clinic was commenced on the 18th. February 1941.

During this period 276 first injections have been given and 243 cases completed.

Thirteen mothers and children who had made good attendances at the Clinic during 1940 were presented with Certificates which were much appreciated.

The Sanitary Inspector reports as follows: -

WATER SUPPLY. The Water Undertaking is owned by the Grantham Water Works Co., and during the year fifteen samples of water were taken from the public supply. All samples were reported by the Public Analyst as satisfactory with the exception of one taken in November which was reported to be of unsatisfactory bacterial quality for public supply', faecal bacillus coli being present in 1 ml. and free chlorine absent. It was ascertained that the condition of the water was due to the absence of chlorinating medium, and steps were taken forthwith to remedy the matter.

In June it was decided to re-open the Conduit - a public supply in the Market Place - but in July the water was reported to be of 'unsatisfactory bacterial quality for human consumption and domestic use unless well boiled or adequately chlorinated'. In view of this adverse report the supply was discontinued.

In November a sample of . ter obtained from a disused well at the Granthan Hospital was reported upon by the Public Analyst as follows:- 'In my opinion this water is of unsuitable bacterial quality for human consumption and hospital use. It is also markedly hard'.

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SLAUGHTER OF ANIMALS ACT 1933.

During the year two persons made application to slaughter or stun animals in compliance with the terms of the above Act and were duly licenced.

MILK SUPTLY

One licence was renewed in respect of a 'pasteurising establishment.'

Ten samples of Pasteurised Milk were taken for bacteriological examination.

A number of samples of milk for biological examination were submitted to the Pathology Department of Sheffield University, on behalf of the Kesteven County Council.
