

REPORT OF THE MEDICAL OFFICER OF HEALTH

The Guildhall, Grantham.

To the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors of the Borough of Grantham.

Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present the Annual Report on the Health, vital statistics and sanitary conditions of the Borough for the year 1971.

Infant mortality was about the national average, and as usual the majority of infant deaths were due to prematurity and congenital malformations.

The table of infectious diseases shows no very significant change from last year. The small number of cases of Whooping Cough is notable—probably this is because babies are generally immunised against Diphtheria, Tetanus and Whooping Cough at the same time. On the other hand, Measles is still fairly prevalent, although immunisation against this disease is available.

The number of deaths from Lung Cancer was the highest since 1960. I am sure that by now everyone is aware that this horrible and usually fatal disease can be prevented by the avoidance of tobacco smoking. "If preventable, why not prevented?" Let smokers ask themselves that question, and think also of the disastrous example they are showing to the young.

No action was taken during the year under Section 47 of the National Assistance Act, 1948.

The following paragraphs are included by direction of the Department of Health and Social Security.

Water Supply: (provided by the Kesteven Water Board).

This is adequate in quantity and satisfactory in quality. Twenty-two samples were taken from the Town mains and found to be satisfactory on bacteriological examination. Regular random samples of the raw water were taken by the Water Board's staff and found to be satisfactory. One chemical examination was carried out during the year, and the result is shown on page 11. The water was found to be satisfactory. The most recent estimate of fluoride content showed a level of 0.08 parts per million. Unfortunately it has not yet been possible to proceed with the fluoridation of Grantham water supply. No evidence of plumbo-solvent action is known. No action was required in respect of contamination. All houses in the Borough are supplied with water direct from the mains except for two which are supplied from shallow wells.

Public Swimming Baths:

There were two open air swimming baths in the Borough, in Dysart Park and Wyndham Park (these were open only in the summer). Both were filled with water from the River Witham. The water was filtered and chlorinated and pumped through continuously Ten bacteriological samples were taken, five from each bath and two from each bath proved to be unsatisfactory. Steps were taken immediately to bring the water up to a satisfactory standard.

The new indoor swimming pool in Union Street opened on 4th November, 1971 and one sample of water taken in December was satisfactory.

Sewerage:

The sewage works was operating throughout the year. The majority of houses in the town are connected to the public sewerage system, but a small number dispose of their sewage by septic tanks.

Common Lodging Houses:

There are none in the town.

A comprehensive account of the Department's work in the fields of housing, food hygiene and other environmental matters follows in the report of the Chief Public Health Inspector.

I have to thank all members of the Council, colleagues in other departments and all in the Public Health Department for their continued interest, courtesy and unfailing help throughout the year.

GENERAL PROVISIONS OF HEALTH SERVICES IN THE AREA

NURSING IN THE HOME

Home nursing and domiciliary midwifery is carried out by the District Nurses. Arrangements are made through family doctors or through the office at 40 Westgate.

HOME HELPS

Help in cases of illness and maternity cases is provided through the Social Services Department, 22 London Road.

GENERAL HOSPITALS

The Grantham General Hospital and the Hillview Hospital, Dysart Road, cater for the needs of the area.

MATERNITY HOSPITALS

Maternity accommodation is provided at the above two hospitals.

ISOLATION HOSPITALS

There is no isolation hospital in the immediate neighbourhood; accommodation, when required, has to be sought in the neighbouring areas.

TUBERCULOSIS HOSPITALS

Sanatorium treatment for cases requiring it is arranged by the Regional Hospital Board, which is responsible for the diagnosis and treatment of Tuberculosis.

TREATMENT CENTRES AND CLINICS

(a) PROVIDED BY THE KESTEVEN COUNTY COUNCIL

Child Welfare

The Clinic, 40 Westgate — three clinics weekly, doctor in attendance Tuesday afternoons. Methodist Church Hall, Harrowby Lane — clinic every Wednesday afternoon, doctor in attendance once a month. The Clinic, Beaconfield — clinic every Thursday afternoon, doctor in attendance twice a month; also Mothercraft every Monday afternoon.

Diphtheria, Whooping Cough and Tetanus Immunisation

At the Westgate Child Welfare Clinic on Tuesday afternoons; also Beaconfield Clinic First Thursday afternoon in the month. Free immunisation can also be arranged with family doctors.

School Clinics

Beaconfield: doctor in attendance Tuesday from 9.30 a.m. to 12 noon. Specialist services by appointment.

Day Nursery

The Day Nursery, St. Catherine's Road provides for children of working parents.

(b) PROVIDED BY THE REGIONAL HOSPITAL AUTHORITY

Venereal Diseases

Sessions are held in the Out-Patient's Department of the Grantham Hospital on Wednesdays at 10 a.m.

Tuberculosis

Sessions are held by the Chest Physician in the Grantham Hospital Out-Patient's Department on Monday mornings and Thursday afternoons.

(c) FAMILY PLANNING ASSOCIATION

Beaconfield Clinic, second Tuesday of the month from 2 p.m. to 3 p.m. and first Wednesday and fourth Tuesday from 7 p.m. to 8 p.m.

LABORATORY FACILITIES

Bacteriological investigations are amply provided for by the Public Health Laboratory, St. Anne's Road, Lincoln. All necessary checmical analyses are carried out by the Public Analyst, Nottingham.

REPORT OF THE CHIEF PUBLIC HEALTH INSPECTOR

To the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors of the Borough of Grantham.

Gentlemen,

I beg to submit my Annual Report on the environmental circumstances of the district. Although the report is mainly statistical it does indicate the considerable activities of the department aimed at protecting public health.

WATER SUPPLY

Twenty-two samples were taken at regular intervals to check the bacteriological standard of the public supply and no adverse reports were received.

A chemical and bacteriological examination carried out by the Public Analyst was reported upon as follows:—

COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL OF REFUSE

The principal feature in connection with these services was the introduction and operation of a Work Study Based Incentive Scheme towards the latter part of the year. Early indications were that no difficulty would be experienced in maintaining a weekly collection service as hitherto, but not with the same punctuality, and although there would be a slight reduction in the labour force resulting in increased wages for the remaining men, there would appear to be no likelihood of any apparent financial benefit to the Council.

Refuse continued to be disposed of by tipping at Sudbrook, and in the early part of the year difficulties were experienced by the frequent breakdown of the loading shovel resulting eventually in complaints being received from the Ancaster Parish Council about the condition of the tip. A new loading shovel was purchased and every effort made to fully control the tip in the recommended manner. One appreciates the concern of local residents to a refuse tip in close proximity to their village, but when this site is eventually filled in and levelled it will prove to have been a valuable land reclamation scheme and a future asset to the locality

Salvage operations continued throughout the year, but owing to general trade recession, output and sales were lower than the previous year; but even so it still proved a profitable means of disposal of this type of waste. At the beginning of the year, a new five year contract was entered into with the Thames Board Mills, thus ensuring the Council of a continued and reliable outlet for waste paper and cardboard output.

CARAVAN SITES AND CONTROL OF DEVELOPMENT ACT, 1960

The number of sites now licensed within the Borough is three. A new licence was issued during the year for an individual caravan for a temporary period.

The site provided for use by the gipsies was fully occupied and appears to be presenting no problems, although complaints were received on two occasions that this type of itinerant dweller was stationed on an unauthorised site elsewhere in the Borough.

The residential caravan site on Spittlegate level is not yet

completed but it continued to be satisfactorily developed and at the end of the year there were some forty occupied caravans on site. The site operator maintains a high standard and will not tolerate unsatisfactory tenants.

RENT ACT, 1968

No Certificates of Disrepair were issued.

FACTORIES ACT, 1937

Details of inspections made and defects found are tabulated on Pages 8 and 9.

CLEAN AIR ACTS, 1956 and 1968

Smoke Control Order No. 17 (part Hooley Estate) came into operation in June, 1971, and Smoke Control Order No. 19 (covering the remainder of the Hooley Estate) was confirmed by the Department of Environment and should come into operation on the 1st October, 1972.

These are only small areas, but to make any real impact it is necessary that future areas be much larger, and to do this a much larger sum would have to be included in the annual estimates.

Three applications were submitted for approval of chimney

heights.

In spite of national publicity these days concerning the desirability for improving our environment and reducing atmospheric pollution, it was surprising to receive so many complaints of smoke emission, dust, effluvia, and offensive odours from various industries, and much time was spent in dealing with these complaints, some of which have not been completely resolved.

PREVENTION OF DAMAGE BY PESTS ACT, 1949

The Council renewed an annual contract with Rentokil Laboratories early in the year, and their Rodent Operator assigned to this district gave excellent service in dealing with 277 complaints of rat infestations, 49 complaints of wasps' nests and bees, and weekly treatment of the refuse tip at Sudbrook. He also carried out nine fumigations of dwelling houses.

The sewers were treated by expert staff twice during the year with Fluoracetamide and there is every reason to believe that infestation of rats in the sewers is being kept at a low level with these

repeated treatments.

RAG FLOCK AND OTHER FILLING MATERIALS ACT, 1951

The following samples of filling materials were taken and submitted to the Analyst who certified that they complied with the statutory standards:—one Algerian Fibre, one Layered Flock and three No. 3 Cotton Felt.

ANIMAL BOARDING ESTABLISHMENTS ACT, 1963

One licence was issued in respect of an establishment for the boarding of dogs.

PET ANIMALS ACT, 1951

The number of licences to keep pet shops issued during the year was four; one was for the sale of birds only from a market stall and one was for the sale only of tropical fish. No contravention of the Act was noted.

NOISE ABATEMENT ACT, 1960

Ten complaints of noise nuisance were received; these included four in respect of loud music, three in respect of barking dogs, and two arising from industrial noise. All were satisfactorily resolved without statutory action.

EXPLOSIVES ACT, 1875

The number of premises registered for the storage and sale of fireworks was thirty-four. Administration of this Act should in my opinion be carried out by the Fire Service and not by Public Health Officers who are not trained in matters concerning explosives.

OFFICES, SHOPS AND RAILWAY PREMISES ACT, 1963

The number of routine inspections made during 1971 was 510, and many of the premises are visited in connection with the administration of other legislation. Most employers of office and shop staff are now well acquainted with their obligations and problems of enforcement of the Act are relatively few; generally only minor and purely technical contraventions are observed. The legal obligation to register premises is still not observed and new premises or changes of occupation would not be officially recorded but for the routine checks made by your Inspectors.

Five accidents were reported during the year, four of which were of a minor degree, and none of which could be attributed to any neglect on the employer's part. The most serious accident was when an employee fell into an inspection pit during clearance of the

drainage system.
