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

REPORT OF THE MEDICAL OFFICER OF HEALTH

The Guildhall, Grantham.

To the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors of the Borough of Grantham.

Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present the Annual Report on the Health, vital statistics and sanitary conditions of the Borough for the year 1972. This will be the last such Annual Report, since the office of Medical Officer of Health will be abolished as from 1st April, 1974. This Office has a long and honourable history, dating from 1847, and I am sure that its abolition will not be in the interests of the public. Certainly we are coming to the end of an era in Public Health, and perhaps one may record with satisfaction, that this was a field in which Britain led the World.

Infant mortality was slightly above the national average, probably a chance variation due to the small numbers involved.

The number of notifications of infectious diseases was much smaller than last year. This was mainly due to a large reduction in the number of measles cases, which must be attributed to the two-yearly cycle of this disease.

No action was taken during the year under Section 47 of the National Assistance Act, 1948, though as usual several cases had to be investigated in case such action might be required.

The following paragraphs are included by direction of the Department of Health and Social Security.

Water Supply: (provided by Kesteven Water Board).

This is adequate in quantity and satisfactory in quality. Seventeen samples were taken from the Town mains and found to be satisfactory on bacteriological examination. Regular random samples of the raw water were taken by the Water Board's staff and found to be satisfactory. One chemical examination was carried out during the year, and the result is shown on page 11. The water was found to be satisfactory. The most recent estimate of fluoride content showed a level of 0.08 parts per million. Unfortunately it has not yet been possible to proceed with the fluoridation of Grantham water supply. No evidence of plumbo-solvent action is known. No action was required in respect of contamination. All houses in the Borough are supplied with water direct from the mains except for two which are supplied from shallow wells.

Public Swimming Baths:

There was one open air swimming bath in Dysart Park, open only in the Summer, and filled with water from the River Witham, The water was filtered and chlorinated and pumped through continuously. Two bacteriological samples were taken, both of which were satisfactory.

The new indoor swimming pool in Union Street was open throughout the year. Eleven samples of water were taken, of which one was unsatisfactory.

When an unsatisfactory sample is found steps are immediately taken to bring the water up to a satisfactory standard.

Sewerage:

The sewage works was operating throughout the year. The majority of houses in the town are connected to the public sewerage system, but a small number dispose of their sewage by septic tanks.

Common Lodging Houses:

There are none in the town.

A comprehensive account of the Department's work in the fields of housing, food hygiene and other environmental matters follows in the report of the Chief Public Health Inspector.

I have to thank all members of the Council, colleagues in other departments and all in the Public Health Department for their continued interest, courtesy and unfailing help throughout the year, and indeed throughout my 18 years term of office.

GENERAL PROVISIONS OF HEALTH SERVICES IN THE AREA

NURSING IN THE HOME

Home nursing and domiciliary midwifery is carried out by the District Nurse. Arrangements are made through family doctors or through the office at 40 Westgate.

HOME HELPS

Help in cases of illness and maternity cases is provided through the Social Services Department, 22 London Road.

GENERAL HOSPITAL

The Grantham General Hospital, Manthorpe Road, caters for the needs of the area.

MATERNITY HOSPITAL

Maternity accommodation is provided at the above hospital.

ISOLATION HOSPITALS

There is no isolation hospital in the immediate neighbourhood; accommodation, when required, has to be sought in the neighbouring areas.

TUBERCULOSIS HOSPITALS

Sanatorium treatment for cases requiring it is arranged by the Regional Hospital Board, which is responsible for the diagnosis and treatment of Tuberculosis.

TREATMENT CENTRES AND CLINICS

(a) PROVIDED BY THE KESTEVEN COUNTY COUNCIL

Child Welfare

The Clinic, 40 Westgate — three clinics weekly, doctor in attendance Tuesday afternoons. Methodist Church Hall, Harrowby Lane — clinic every Wednesday afternoon, doctor in attendance twice a month. The Clinic, Beaconfield — clinic every Thursday afternoon, doctor in attendance twice a month; also Mothercraft Clinic every Monday afternoon.

Diphtheria, Whooping Cough and Tetanus Immunisation

At the Westgate Child Welfare Clinic on Tuesday afternoons; also Beaconfield Clinic first and third Thursday afternoon in the month. Free immunisation can also be arranged with family doctors.

School Clinics

Beaconfield: doctor in attendance Tuesday from 9.30 a.m. to 12 noon. Specialist services by appointment.

Day Nursery

The Day Nursery, St. Catherine's Road provides for children of working parents.

(b) PROVIDED BY THE REGIONAL HOSPITAL AUTHORITY

Venereal Diseases

Sessions are held in the Out-Patient's Department of the Grantham Hospital on Wednesdays at 10 a.m.

Tuberculosis

Sessions are held by the Chest Physician in the Grantham Hospital Out-Patient's Department on Monday mornings and Thursday afternoons.

(c) FAMILY PLANNING ASSOCIATION

Beaconfield Clinic, second Tuesday of the month from 2 p.m. to 3 p.m. and first Wednesday and fourth Tuesday from 7 p.m. to 8 p.m.

LABORATORY FACILITIES

Bacteriological investigations are amply provided for by the Public Health Laboratory, St. Anne's Road, Lincoln. All necessary chemical analyses are carried out by the Public Analyst, Nottingham.

REPORT OF THE CHIEF PUBLIC HEALTH INSPECTOR

To the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors of the Borough of Grantham.

Gentlemen,

I beg to submit my Annual Report on the environmental health duties carried out during the year 1972. The report is mainly statistical but indicates not only the considerable number of visits made but the wide variety of work entailed in the interests of the health of the community. In particular our attention has been especially directed to dealing with unfit houses and improvement of many of the older houses.

In submitting this report I take this opportunity of expressing my appreciation to the members of the Health Committee for their support and to the staff for their assistance and co-operation.

WATER SUPPLY

Seventeen samples were taken from the town's water supply; these were submitted to the Public Health Laboratory at Lincoln and were reported to be of satisfactory bacteriological quality.

A sample taken for chemical and bacteriological examination

was reported upon by the Public Analyst as follows:-

OBSERVATIONS:—

At the time of sampling this water satisfied the standard bacterial quality required by the Ministry of Health. This water was also of suitable chemical quality for human consumption, domestic use and dairy purposes.

COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL OF REFUSE

These services were well maintained throughout the year although there were more complaints concerning litter left behind by the refuse collectors. This may have been partly due to speeding up of the work caused by the introduction of a bonus scheme. Abolition of the 'skep' system for refuse removal is long overdue. Paper or plastic sacks for refuse storage should become accepted practice in the interests of hygiene. No complaints were made about the refuse tip at Sudbrook. There was an increase in the demand for waste paper and the following figures indicate the extent of our salvage activities during 1972.

CARAVAN SITES AND CONTROL OF DEVELOPMENT ACT, 1960

The number of sites now licensed within the Borough is three. A new licence was issued during the year for an individual caravan for a temporary period. The other sites licensed are the Gypsy Site on Spitalgate Hill and the Residential Caravan Site on Spitalgate Level. A licence issued for an individual caravan for a temporary period in 1971 expired on 30th June, 1972.

RENT ACT, 1968

No certificates of Disrepair were issued.

FACTORIES ACT, 1937

Details of inspections made and defects found are tabulated on Pages 8 and 9.

CLEAN AIR ACTS, 1956 and 1968

Smoke Control Order No. 19 (Covering the remainder of the Hooley Estate) was due to come into operation on the 1st October, 1972, but the date of operation was postponed to the 1st May, 1973.

Smoke Control Orders No. 20 (Greenhill Road) and No 21 (Earlesfield Estate) were confirmed by the Department of Environment and should come into operation on the 1st October, 1973.

One application was submitted for approval of a chimney height.

PREVENTION OF DAMAGE BY PESTS ACT, 1949

The Council renewed an annual contract with Rentokil Laboratories early in the year, and their Rodent Operator assigned to this district gave excellent service in dealing with 221 complaints of rat infestations, 35 complaints of wasps' nests and bees, and weekly treatment of the refuse tip at Sudbrook. Ten fumigations of dwelling houses were also carried out.

The sewers were treated by expert staff twice during the year with Fluoracetamide.

RAG FLOCK AND OTHER FILLING MATERIALS ACT, 1951

The following samples of filling materials were taken and submitted to the Analyst who certified that they complied with the statutory standards:— One Layered Flock and three No. 3 Cotton Felt.

ANIMAL BOARDING ESTABLISHMENT ACT, 1963

One licence was issued in respect of an establishment for the boarding of dogs.

PET ANIMALS ACT, 1951

Four licences to keep pet shops were issued during the year; one was for the sale of birds only from a market stall and one was for the sale of tropical fish only.

NOISE ABATEMENT ACT, 1960

Twelve complaints of noise nuisance were received and these included four in respect of loud music, two in respect of barking dogs, two arising from noise from motor vehicles on industrial premises, three arising from noise from commercial premises and one arising from noise from a mechanical hoist on a building site. All were satisfactorily resolved without statutory action.

EXPLOSIVES ACT, 1875

The number of premises registered for the storage and sale of fireworks was thirty-three.

Mr. Cooper states:-

"Warnings were given with regard to the labelling of a number of articles of food including meatless sausages and vegetable protein foods. A Grantham butcher was warned for selling pork sausages with a small deficiency in meat content, and for failing to declare the presence of preservative in sausages. In more serious cases prosecutions were taken.

A company of food importers were fined £40 for being the persons by whose default a Grantham retailer sold a can of pork luncheon meat containing a fragment of metal.

A company which supplies ice cream making machinery and ice cream making ingredients, were fined £60 for being the persons responsible for the sale by a Grantham cafe proprietor of ice cream of which the fat content was 94 per cent deficient of the statutory standard".
