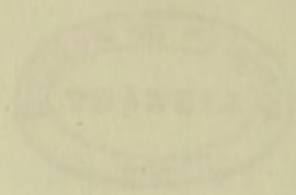
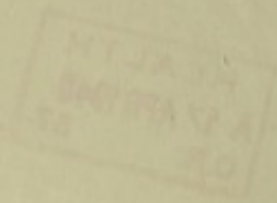

(c) Water boats and their Sanitary condition:-

There are three water boats in use and these are regularly inspected and kept in a fit condition for the carriage of drinking water.

It is pleasing to note that the chlorinated water supply is now available for washing out trawler fish rooms.

III. - PORT SANITARY REGULATIONS, 1933.

The information under these Regulations is as described in the Annual Report 1934, except in regard to paragraph 8 relating to examination of rats and paragraph 10 relating to Venereal Disease. Arrangements for the bacteriological or pathological examination of rats for plague has now been made with the Pathologist at the

Grimsby and District Hospital, Grimsby.

During the year a total of 369 attendances were made by 121 foreign seamen at the Grimsby Venereal Disease Clinic. Of this number 45 were found to be suffering from syphilis, 49 from gonorrhoea, and 27 were found not to be suffering from Venereal Disease.

THE ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CHIEF PORT HEALTH INSPECTOR FOR THE
YEAR 1944.

To the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors of the
County Borough and Port of Grimsby.

Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to submit to you my
report for the year 1944, this being my First Annual Report.

During the year a chlorinated water supply
was available for washing trawlers fish rooms, and there has been
a further hygienic step made on many of the trawlers in the
reconstruction of the fish rooms, by dispensing with timber
construction on the sides and bulkheads in favour of a new method
of insulation, - a local patent known as "Whitsulite". This
insulation consists of plastic cork, followed by a reinforced
portland cement rendering and finished with a supercoat of a 100%
waterproof white skin, which gives a hard impervious surface to the
sides and bulkheads of the fishrooms, which are thereby ^{easily} cleansed and
the keeping quality of the fish is improved. This patent
insulation has stood up, for the past twelve months, to bunkering
in the spare fish rooms without damage.

The "Warning system" brought in by the
Ministry of Food with the concurrence of the Ministries of Health
and Agriculture & Fisheries has resulted in better quality
Icelandic fish coming to the Port.

Several of the roads in the port area are in
a bad condition, and the Railway Company should have these
reconstructed in concrete or granite sets when labour etc.,

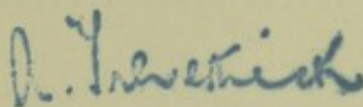
