## REPORT OF THE MEDICAL OFFICER OF HEALTH.

TO THE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE  
GRIMSBY RURAL DISTRICT COUNCIL.

Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present my Annual Report on the Health and Sanitary conditions of the Grimsby Rural District during the period 1st January to 31st December, 1938.

The Birth Rate (15.52) and the Death Rate (9.91) are slightly increased on last year's figures and compare favourably with the figures for the Country as a whole, namely, 15.10 and 11.60 respectively.

The number of cases of Notifiable Infectious Disease, excluding Tuberculosis, was 53; that is a decrease on the number occurring in 1937.

Great progress has been made in the improvement of housing conditions in the Rural District. 18 Clearance Areas, concerning 51 houses, were submitted to the Minister of Health. An Inquiry was held on the 19th October, 1938, and Clearance Orders were made for all the areas submitted. A detailed report on the position existing at the end of 1938 is given on page 15.

I am indebted to the County Medical Officer of Health and to my Sanitary Inspector for their assistance in compiling this Report.

My thanks are due to the Chairman and Members of the Council, the Clerk and the staff for the interest they have shown and the support that has been accorded to me during the year.

### 1. Staff of the Health Department.

This is shewn at the beginning of the Report, page 1.

### 2. (a) Laboratory Facilities.

Specimens for diagnostic and other purposes are sent to the laboratory at the Cleethorpes Health Department, the County Laboratory, Lincoln, and to the Clinical Research Association, London.

Examination of rats from the Port of Immingham for the presence of plague is performed by your Medical Officer at the Laboratory, Cleethorpes.

### (b) Ambulance Facilities.

The Ambulance Service in the area is adequate.

Infectious Disease cases are removed by the ambulance receiving the case and the cost is included in the charge for treatment.

Accident cases and cases for treatment are removed by the Grimsby County Borough ambulance at a cost of 1/- per mile, paid by this Authority. Road accident cases are paid for by the Lindsey County Council. One ambulance is maintained at the Port of Immingham for the removal of Infectious Diseases to the Isolation Hospital, Port of Immingham.

### (c) Nursing in the Home.

Five District Nurses are stationed in the Rural District, one at each of the following places, namely: Great Coates, Laceby, Healing, Humberston and Immingham, and are under the supervision of the Lindsey Nursing Association. The services of an Infectious Disease Nurse and Health Visitors are provided by the Lindsey County Council, who administer the Tuberculosis, School, and Maternity and Child Welfare Services in this area.

(d) The Lindsey County Council, from the Clinic, St. Hugh's Avenue, Cleethorpes, provide the following specialist and consultant services:—

## V. MEASURES AGAINST RODENTS.

## (1) Steps taken for detection of rodent plague :—

## (a) In ships in the port—

The Port Sanitary Inspector is Rat Searcher.

## (b) On Quays, wharves, warehouses, &amp;c., in the vicinity of the port.

A Rat Searcher is employed by the Dock Company and Private Companies.
