Lady & Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present my Annual Report on the Health and Sanitary conditions in the Grimsby Rural District for the year 1943.

The Vital Statistics for the year are satisfactory. The Birth Rate was 17.8 per thousand of the population; the rate for the country as a whole being 16.5. The Death Rate was 11.2 per thousand of the population, a decrease of 1.9 on the rate for 1942. The Infant Mortality Rate of 43.9 per thousand live births was higher than that for the previous year but lower than the corresponding rate for England and Wales (49). There were no maternal deaths during the year.

Heart Disease continues to be the principal cause of death in the Rural District, while deaths from cancer - the next most frequent cause - were considerably fewer than in 1942.

The number of notifications of infectious disease, (excluding tuberculosis, was higher than in 1942, due to the increased incidence of measles and chicken pox. Only 2 cases of Diphtheria in children under 16 years occurred during the year, and in neither case had the child been immunized.

No dwelling houses were erected during the year and no cases of overcrowding were known to exist at the end of the year.

I wish to show my appreciation of the interest shown in the work of the Department by the Chairman and Members of the Council and the Clerk. I am also indebted to my Sanitary Inspectors and other members of the staff for their assistance in compiling this report.

DIPHTHERIA IMMUNIZATION.

Throughout the year, the work of immunizing the child population was carried on; special attention being paid to the under fives.

Parents, Head-teachers and medical practitioners were circularised and special immunization sessions conducted at schools and welfare centres.

During the year a total of 593 children received a complete course of injections. In age groups, the numbers are as follows:-
