

TO THE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF GRIMSBY RURAL DISTRICT COUNCIL:-

MR. CHAIRMAN, LADIES AND CENTLEMEN,

I beg to submit my Annual Report on the Health and Sanitary Conditions of the Rural District for the year 1953, prepared in accordance with the Regulations of the Ministry of Health.

The health of the District, as shown by the statistics, was, in the main, satisfactory. There were 151 deaths registered, a death rate of 11.78 per 1,000 of the population. This compares fairly favourably with the rate for 1952 (11.03), and with that for England and Wales, of 11.4. Of the chief jauses of death, heart disease (32) and cancer (27) were again in the lead.

Deaths of infants under 1 year totalled 4, 3 less than in 1952. Compared with the Infant Mortality Rate for England and Wales of 26.8, the Rural District Rate of 20.10 is highly satisfactory, and represents the lowest recorded rate for this District since 1938.

The Birth Rate of 15.52 is fractionally less than the rate for last year of 15.8. The rates for England and Wales and the smaller towns were 15.5 and 15.7 respectively.

Of the 272 cases of infectious disease notified, measles accounted for about 75% of this total. The disease was mild, and no deaths resulted from it, or from any of the other infectious diseases notified.

There was a decline compared with last year, in the number of new cases of tuberculosis notified in the District, and only one death resulted from the disease during the year.

I should like to thank the Chairman and Members of the Health Committee for their help and co-operation during the year. I am indebted to the Chief Sanitary Inspector for his services, and for much of the material contained in this report.

SECTION 'C' - SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES IN THE AREA:-

WATER SUPPLY:-

This is (i) by constant supply from the Grimsby, Cleethorpes and District Water Board's joint undertaking, and is satisfactory in quality and quantity. Samples are taken monthly by the Water Board, and the results supplied to the Medical Officer of Health, and (ii) from deep bore wells in other cases not on the public supply.

In addition to the routine samples taken by the Water Board, 94 samples were taken by the Sanitary Inspectors from wells and bores, and 1 sample from the public supply. 2 bores were closed as polluted, and 4 new bores were sunk.

At the end of 1953, some 85% of houses in the Rural District were being supplied by the public supply, including the parishes of Habrough, Immingham, Stallingborough, Healing, Great Coates, Aylesby, Irby, Laceby, Beelsby, Hatcliffe, Barnoldby, Waltham, Humberston, Brigsley, Ashby-cum-Fenby and Bradley. Considerable progress was made during the year towards the provision of a public supply to Ravendale.

Extensive flooding of private bores took place early in the year as a result of the flooding of the sea defences, with consequent contamination of the water. Sampling of these bores took place regularly, and in all cases, prolonged pumping was sufficient to cleanse the supply.

DRAINAGE:-

Close attention has been paid to existing drainage systems, and as a result of these inspections, 10 systems were exposed and tested, 39 obstructions were removed, whilst 2 drainage systems were completely renewed. In addition, repairs were carried out to 18 waste pipes, rain water pipes, etc.

OFFENSIVE TRADES: -

There are 5 Offensive Trade premises within the District,
4 of which are connected with the Fishing industry. By the very
nature of their products, these premises call for frequent inspection,
and 58 visits were paid to the plants during the year. One contravention was discovered and investigated. This was a particularly
obnoxious smell emanating from consignments of partially decomposed
herrings which arrived from Northern Scotland after 10 days in transit.
The Chairman of the Health Committee inspected the premises at the time
of the nuisance, and found that the manufacturers concerned were
willing to co-operate to obviate the necessity for Statutory action.

All premises are controlled by Offensive Trade Bye-laws which are in force in the Rural District.

N.B. Sections 1 to 6 of the Act govern the standards of cleanliness, overcrowding, temperature, ventilation and floor drainage in factories, whilst Section 7 concerns the provision and maintenance of adequate sanitary accommodation.

SCAVENGING SERVICES:-

- (a) Refuse Collection: This service has been the subject of much consideration during 1953. The provision of a fortnightly refuse collection has been rendered impracticable by the widespread development of new dwellings, and the fact that the labour force has not been increased since the war. During 1953, the interval between collections was approximately 16/17 days in the larger parishes, and one month in the outlying districts. It was felt that, with the continuing expansion of private and Council building, this period would lengthen and, in order to prevent this, and to improve the existing service, some revision of equipment and labour would be needed. This was done, and it is hoped that the provision of new equipment early in the next financial year will alleviate the problem to some degree.
- (b) <u>Nightsoil Collections</u> Good progress in the nightsoil collection has been made in 1953. Firstly, the parishes of Irby, Beelsby, Hatcliffe, Ashby-cum-Fenby, Wold Newton and Ravendale, which had not previously been included in the collection, were regularly serviced, and secondly, the parishes of Humberston and Weelsby, Barnoldby, Great Coates and Healing previously serviced by a Contractor, were taken over by the regular service, the whole District being covered weekly. Arrangements were also made for the Council's employees to collect nightsoil from the Humberston Fitties and Holiday Camps during the 1954 season, until now collected by the Contractor.
- (c) Cesspool Emptying Service: This service has been in demand during the year, 214 cesspools being emptied on a repayment basis. In addition, regular attention has been paid to the Council's sewage tanks and cesspools. There is no doubt that the operation of this service has done much to alleviate the pollution of dykes in certain parishes.

SECTION 'D' - HOUSING :-

Remedy of Defects during the year without Service of Formal Notices:

26 defective dwellings were rendered fit in consequence of informal action by the Local Authority or their Officers.

New Houses Erected during 1953: A season and a season and

A total of 175 new houses were erected during the year, 116 by the Council, and 59 by private owners.

NUISANCES:-

A total of 243 nuisances were abated, 206 of them as a result of informal action by the Sanitary Inspector. 75 notices were referred to the Council for the service of Statutory notices, but in 11 cases it was not found necessary to serve the notices.

RODENT CONTROL :-

The Rodent Operator was kept fully employed during 1953. The service is available to private householders, Council properties, agricultural and business premises, the two latter being on a chargeable basis. The provision of a motor van for the use of the Rodent Operator has resulted in a marked increase in the number of infestations dealt with, 549 in 1953 and compared with 178 in the previous year. 15 of the Council's stores and depots, 476 dwelling houses, 40 farms and agricultural premises and 18 business premises were treated with excellent results. In addition, some 2,500 premises were surveyed for rat infestations.

SECTION 'E' - INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD:-

(a) Control of Milk Supplies:-

Although the control of milk production has now passed to the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries, the Council is responsible for the supervision of retail milk purveyors. At the end of the year, 36 distributors and 7 dairies were on the Register. These have been the subject of 103 inspections, and only one contravention was discovered. This was the regular occurrence of dirty one-third pint milk bottles in a school supply. The Dairy in question was kept under constant supervision, but the combination of possible causes precluded the isolation of any one particular item. However, the dairy in question ceased to operate, and no further action was necessary.

7 samples of milk were taken during the year, and submitted for bacteriological examination, 4 of them proving satisfactory. Samples were also taken by the Sanitary Inspector in connection with the Lindsey County Council's biological examination scheme.

Ice-cream:-

Only 4 ice-cream manufacturers now operate within the Rural District, whilst 41 retailers are registered. These premises were regularly inspected during the year without any infringement of the Regulations being discovered. 15 samples were taken and submitted to the bacteriologist, priority being given to those from manufacturers in the district.

(b) Meat and Other Foods: -

Slaughterhouses: - The only slaughterhouse operating in the District is at Waltham, where horses are slaughtered for human consumption. 41 horses were slaughtered during the year, and in every case, an inspection of the carcase and offals was made. 7 livers were condemned as a result of parasitic infection, and one hind-quarter was voluntarily surrendered as a result of a traumatic condition.

Bakehouses:-

The 5 bakehouses on the Register were inspected regularly during 1953, 23 inspections being made. All premises are well maintained, and it was not necessary to take action against any of the persons concerned.

Other Food Premises:-

Frequent inspections were carried out of the various food premises in the district. Generally, these were found to be in clean condition, although it was necessary to draw the attention of two persons to the condition of the decorations of walls and ceilings, resulting in the re-decoration of the premises concerned.

Articles of Food Condemned:-

A total of 1 cwt, 1 qtr, 15 lbs of miscellaneous groceries was condemned during the year.

SECTION 'F' - PREVALENCE OF AND CONTROL OVER INFECTIOUS AND OTHER DISEASES.

A total of 14 disinfections was carried out during the year, 8 following the removal of tuberculosis patients, and 6 following cases of other infectious diseases. It was not found necessary to disinfest any premises.

DIPHTHERIA IMMUNISATION: -

Immunisation of the child population was continued throughout the year. The Prophylactic used was Alum Precipitated Toxoid (A.P.T) with 4 weeks interval between doses.

During the year, a total of 150 children received complete initial immunisation. In age groups, the numbers are as follows:-

In addition, 146 children received re-inforcing injections.

No such cases were discovered during the year. In the event of such an occurrence, the following measures would be adopted.

The vessel concerned would be directed to designated mooring station for special medical examination of passengers and crew, and necessary disinfection of persons, clothing, bedding and accommodation, etc., carried out. If plague infested rats were found or suspected, the vessel would be boomed off, and thoroughly fumigated with H.C.N. During discharge of cargo, special watch would be kept for further rats. Moorings and gangways would also receive special attention.

SECTION XII - MEASURES AGAINST RODENTS IN SHIPS FROM FOREIGN PORTS.
