Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting the annual report for the year 1960.

The Medical Officer of Health during 1960 was Dr. P. Brodabin who resigned from the appointment early in 1961.

During the year 38 cases of Infectious Diseases were noted and Measles once again accounted for the bulk of these notifications. However, even though the figures were down, it is worth noting that there were 6 new cases of Respiratory Tuberculosis within the Urban District. Tuberculosis, once known as "The White Scourge" and "The Chief of the Army of the Captains of Death" is now a curable disease, if diagnosed in time, and it is heartening to note that the Mass Radiography Unit visits the Guisborough district annually and that the population have responded very well to the photographer's invitation to have their pictures taken.

Dwelling on morbid statistics, there were 137 deaths in the district and diseases of the heart and circulation accounted for the majority of these, with cancer a close second. Here I would like to point out that no deaths were caused by Tuberculosis.

280 births were registered in the Urban District. This total gave a rate of 23.8 per thousand population which is well above the rate of 17.1 per thousand for England and Wales.

Attendances at clinics continued to show a rising trend and the public still availed themselves of the facilities offered.

In conclusion I recall with pleasure the courteous and kindly attitude of the public towards me since I entered their service in Guisborough. I would like to say "thank you" to the Chairman and Members of the Health Committee; to Mr. Beel, Clerk of the Council; to Mr. Pallister, Surveyor and Public Health Inspector, and to Mr. Ward, Additional Public Health Inspector, for their help and co-operation. I would also like to acknowledge the great help and hard work of Mr. Nuttall and Miss Fox in the District Health Office.

The General Provision of Health Services in the District

1. Laboratory Facilities

This work is now done at the Public Health Laboratory, Middlesbrough, only the biological test for tuberculous milk being carried out at the Public Health Laboratory, Northallerton.

2. National Health Service Act, 1946

With certain exceptions the Guisborough Area Health Sub-Committee of the Health Committee of the County Council exercises the functions of the Local Health Authority in supervising the day to day administration of the services provided under this Act. The Committee met every two months. It is composed of members of the County Council, of the three District Councils of Guisborough, Skelton and Brotton, and Loftus, and of certain co-opted members. Among the services administered are the following:—

3. Guisborough Area Voluntary Care Committee

4. National Assistance Acts, 1948 and 1951 — Section 47.

It has been possible to avoid advising the Local Sanitary Authorities to have recourse to the procedure laid down in these Acts.

Inspection and Supervision of Food

Ice-cream

There are 33 premises registered for the storage and sale of pre-packed ice-cream. These were inspected regularly.

Food Retail Premises and Meat Inspections

69 visits were made to food premises and 260 to slaughter houses, of which there are 5 licensed; 7 premises are licensed under Section 16 of the Food and Drugs Act, 1955 for the making of sausages, etc.

66 pounds of meat were voluntarily surrendered as unfit for human consumption and 79 tins of canned food weighing 198 $\frac{3}{4}$ pounds.

Drainage and Sewerage

With the exception of outlying farms and villages, the District is served by public sewers discharging into various sewage disposal works, with the sewers of the Wilton parish discharging into the sewers of Eston Urban District Council.

A branch sewer to serve South Lackenby was commenced and completed during the year.

Normal extensions to the sewerage system in the District has taken place in connection with both private and council house development. The proposed extension of the Guisborough Sewage Disposal Works prepared by the Council's Consulting Engineers, Messrs D. Balfour & Sons, has received Ministry approval but full details are still awaited.

516 inspections were made to old and new drainage systems, 454 tests being made to new sewers and drainage systems.

260 choked drainage systems and sewers were cleared during the year.

Closet Accommodation

13 Sanitary pan closets were converted to water closets under Improvement Schemes.

The whole of Guisborough is now on the water carriage system.

24 houses at Mount Pleasant, Guisborough require conversion, this work being delayed owing to lack of adequate sewage disposal facilities. Several properties in Yearby Village together with the whole of Upleatham Village also require conversion, again the work being delayed owing to the lack of adequate sewage disposal facilities. Although the branch sewer to serve South Lackenby has been completed, the conversion of approximately 43 houses and farms in South Lackenby cannot be proceeded with until the completion of Eston U.D.C.'s main trunk sewer.

264 water closets were provided for new buildings in Guisborough during the year.

1 new water closet was added to the existing sewerage system in Yearby.

12 new water closets were added to the existing sewerage system in Wilton.

Public Cleansing (Refuse and Disposal)

A weekly collection of house and trade refuse is maintained throughout the District. Refuse is disposed of by means of controlled tipping.

Smoke Abatement

No complaints of smoke nuisance were received during the year.

Rodent Control

During the year the Council's sewers were treated twice in accordance with the technique recommended by the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food. Routine surveys have been carried out in connection with farms, business premises, dwelling-houses, etc. and at the year end 46 houses, and 10 other premises, including business premises, had been treated. The poison used has been 'Warfarin' which gives very good results and is used to deal with almost every infestation.

Caravan Sites

There is one licensed site. This was inspected on 2 occasions.
