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

OF THE

GUISBOROUGH URBAN DISTRICT COUNCIL

Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen,

I beg to submit my Annual Report for the year 1962, the contents and arrangements of which are in accordance with Circular 1/54 of the Ministry of Health.

During the year 46 cases of Infectious Diseases were reported and Measles once again accounted for the bulk of these notifications. It is worth noting that there were only 2 new cases of Respiratory Tuberculosis within the Urban District and no deaths occurred from this disease. The Mass Radiography Unit again visited the district and the population responded very well to the invitation to have their pictures taken.

A noticeable feature of the year was the outbreak of Smallpox in other parts of the country in the early months. Although this area was not directly affected there was a big demand for vaccination.

There were 132 deaths in the district and diseases of the heart and circulation accounted for the majority of these, with cancer a close second.

303 births were registered in the Urban District. This total gave a rate of 22.3 per thousand population which is well above the rate of 18.0 per thousand for England and Wales.

Attendances at clinics continued to rise steadily and the public took full advantage of the facilities offered.

In conclusion I would like to thank the Chairman and Members of the Health Committee; Mr. Beel, Clerk of the Council; Mr. Pallister, Surveyor and Public Health Inspector, and Mr. Ward, Additional Public Health Inspector, for their help and co-operation. I would also like to acknowledge the great help and hard work of Mr. Nuttall and Miss Fox in the District Health Office.

The number of births registered is 303, giving the birth rate of 24.2 per 1,000 population. Allowing for the differing age and sex distribution of the population in different areas, the birth-rate corrected by this comparability factor is 22.3 compared with the Registrar-General's provisional rate of 18.0 for England and Wales.

The deaths are classified under thirty-six headings based on the Abbreviated List of International Statistical Classification of Diseases, Injuries and Causes of Death, 1948. 132 deaths of residents gave a corrected death-rate of 11.6 per thousand of population as compared with 11.9 for England and Wales.

The General Provision of Health Services in the District

1. Laboratory Facilities

This work is now done at the Public Health Laboratory, Middlesbrough, only the biological test for tuberculous milk being carried out at the Public Health Laboratory, Northallerton.

2. National Health Service Act, 1946

With certain exceptions the Guisborough Area Health Sub-Committee of the Health Committee of the County Council exercises the functions of the Local Health Authority in supervising the day to day administration of the services provided under this Act. The Committee met every two months. It is composed of members of the County Council, of the three District Councils of Guisborough, Skelton and Brotton, and Loftus, and of certain co-opted members. Among the services administered are the following:—

Home Nursing

Prevention of illness: Care and After Care

re Health Visiting

Ambulance Service

Midwifery

Vaccination and Immunization

Care of Mothers and Young Children.

3. Guisborough Area Voluntary Care Committee

Inspection and Supervision of Food

Ice-cream

There are 38 premises registered for the storage and sale of pre-packed ice cream. These were inspected regularly.

Food Poisoning

No outbreak of food poisoning has been reported.

Bakehouses

There are two bakehouses. 9 inspections and visits were made and no defects found.

Fish and Chip Shops

There are seven. 15 inspections were made.

Food Hygiene Regulations, 1955

Informal action was taken on several occasions, the requirements asked for being provided.

Food Retail Premises and Meat Inspections

71 visits were made to food premises. 7 premises are licensed under Section 16 of the Food and Drugs Act, 1955 for the making of sausages, etc.

19 pounds of meat were voluntarily surrendered as unfit for human consumption and 197 tins of canned food weighing 480³/₄ pounds.

Drainage and Sewerage

With the exception of outlying farms and villages, the District is served by public sewers discharging into various sewage disposal works, with the sewers of the Wilton parish discharging into the sewers of Eston Urban District Council.

Normal extensions to the sewerage system in the District has taken place in connection with private and council house development.

The sewage works and sewer to serve Mount Pleasant was completed during the year.

The construction of sewage disposal works at Upleatham Village and the extension of Guisborough sewage disposal works, including the diversion and renewal of various sewers were commenced. Unsuccessful negotiations were held with Redcar Borough Council regarding the sewerage of Yearby Village and no further progress has been made.

539 inspections were made to old and new drainage systems, 477 tests being made to new sewers and drainage systems.

297 choked drainage systems and sewers were cleared during the year.

Closet Accommodation

6 sanitary pan closets were converted to water closets.

The whole of Guisborough is now on the water carriage system.

Several properties in Yearby Village still require conversion, the work being delayed owing to the lack of adequate sewage disposal facilities. Now that the works at Mount Pleasant have been completed and those at Upleatham commenced it is anticipated that conversions and improvements to the properties will take place during the coming year.

125 water closets were provided for new buildings in Guisborough during the year.

Public Cleansing (Refuse and Disposal)

A weekly collection of house and trade refuse is maintained throughout the District. Refuse is disposed of by means of controlled tipping.

Smoke Abatement

No complaints of smoke nuisance were received during the year.

Rodent Control

During the year the Council's sewers were treated twice in accordance with the technique recommended by the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food. Routine surveys have been carried out in connection with farms, business premises, dwelling-houses, etc. and at the year end 48 houses, and 8 other premises, including business premises, had been treated. The poison used has been 'Warfarin' which gives very good results and is used to deal with almost every infestation.

Caravan Sites

There are 5 licensed sites. These were inspected on 12 occasions.

Shops Act 1934, Sections 10 and 13 (3)

71 visits were paid under the above Act. Two unsatisfactory conditions were found; these were remedied by informal action.
