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

#### Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen,

I beg to submit my Annual Report for the year 1963, the contents and arrangements of which are in accordance with the regulation of the Ministry of Health.

During the year Measles accounted for the great majority of the 87 cases of Infectious Diseases notified.

There was a slight reduction in the number of children immunized against the various infectious diseases and I would like here to emphasize the importance of immunizing children against every disease for which protection is available; too many parents fail to use the services offered by the local health authorities for the protection of their children.

There were 118 deaths in the district and once again diseases of the heart and circulation accounted for the majority of these with cancer taking second place.

In conclusion I would like to thank the Heads of Departments for their co-operation at all times. To Mr. Pallister, Surveyor and Public Health Inspector, and Mr. Ward, Additional Public Health Inspector, I am especially grateful for their help in all matters concerning the health of the District. Finally I would like to acknowledge the hard work and willing effort of Mr. Nuttall and Miss Fox in the District Health Office.

#### SECTION 1.

#### Statistics and Social Conditions of the Area

#### Population

The number of births registered is 279, giving the birth rate of 21.8 per 1,000 population. Allowing for the differing age and sex distribution of the population in different areas, the birth-rate corrected by this comparability factor is 19.2 compared with the Registrar-General's provisional rate of 18.2 for England and Wales.

#### The General Provision of Health Services in the District

#### 1. Laboratory Facilities

This work is now done at the Public Health Laboratory, Middlesbrough, only the biological test for tuberculous milk being carried out at the Public Health Laboratory, Northallerton.

#### 2. National Health Service Act, 1946

With certain exceptions the Guisborough Area Health Sub-Committee of the Health Committee of the County Council exercises the functions of the Local Health Authority in supervising the day to day administration of the services provided under this Act. The Committee met every two months. It is composed of members of the County Council, of the three District Councils of Guisborough, Skelton and Brotton, and Loftus, and of certain co-opted members. Among the services administered are the following:—

Domestic Help Service Home Nursing
Prevention of illness: Care and After Care Health Visiting
Ambulance Service Midwifery

Vaccination and Immunization Care of Mothers and Young Children.

#### 3. Prevention of Illness-Care and After-Care

The work previously carried out under this heading by the Voluntary Care Committee is now being undertaken by the Guisborough Area Health Sub-Committee. ## Inspection and Supervision of Food

#### Ice-cream

There are 41 premises registered for the storage and sale of pre-packed ice cream. These were inspected regularly.

#### Food Poisoning

No outbreak of food poisoning has been reported.

#### Bakehouses

There are two bakehouses. 12 inspections and visits were made and no defects found.

## Fish and Chip Shops

There are seven. 12 inspections were made.

# Food Hygiene Regulations, 1955

Informal action was taken on several occasions, the requirements asked for being provided.

#### Food Retail Premises and Meat Inspections

103 visits were made to food premises. 6 premises are licensed under Section 16 of the Food and Drugs Act, 1955 for the making of sausages, etc.

459 pounds of meat were voluntarily surrendered as unfit for human consumption and 161 tins of canned food weighing 231½ pounds.

# Drainage and Sewerage

With the exception of outlying farms and villages, the District is served by public sewers discharging into various sewage disposal works, with the sewers of the Wilton parish discharging into the sewers of Eston Urban District Council.

Normal extensions to the sewerage system in the District have taken place in connection with private and council house development.

The sewage works and sewer to serve the village of Upleatham was completed during the year.

The extension of Guisborough sewage disposal works, including the diversion and renewal of various sewers, is making satisfactory progress. Unsuccessful negotiations were held with Redcar Borough Council regarding the sewerage of Yearby Village and no further progress has been made.

The Wear and Tees River Board have deferred for two years consideration of the Council's application for a discharge from the existing septic tank at Newton Village. The Council's consulting engineers have been instructed to prepare a new scheme of sewage disposal for the village.

#### Closet Accommodation

37 sanitary pan closets were converted to water closets.

The whole of Guisborough is now on the water carriage system.

Several properties in Yearby Village still require conversion, the work being delayed owing to the lack of adequate sewage disposal facilities.

76 water closets were provided for new buildings in Guisborough during the year.

#### Public Cleansing (Refuse and Disposal)

A weekly collection of house and trade refuse is maintained throughout the District. Refuse is disposed of by means of controlled tipping.

#### Smoke Abatement

One complaint of smoke nuisance was received during the year and the necessary informal action taken.

#### Rodent Control

During the year the Council's sewers were treated twice in accordance with the technique recommended by the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food. Routine surveys have been carried out in connection with farms, business premises, dwelling-houses, etc. and at the year end 34 houses, and 5 other premises, including business premises, had been treated. The poison used has been 'Warfarin' which gives very good results and is used to deal with almost every infestation.

#### Caravan Sites

There are 2 licensed sites. These were inspected on 6 occasions.

## Shops Act 1934, Sections 10 and 13 (3)

103 visits were paid under the above Act. Three unsatisfactory conditions were found; these were remedied by informal action.

#### Mortuaries

One at the Admiral Chaloner Hospital.
